
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

# INTRODUCTION.

In presenting this Boynton Genealogy to the public, the compiler does so with a great deal of diffidence, feeling her inability to make it what it would have been under the direction of the brain power that began it, but fealty to the dear departed has prompted its completion, and she sends it forth, trusting to the kindness of those who peruse its pages to overlook its imperfections.

In the arrangement of the genealogy she has striven to follow the plan considered best by the Historical Society in Boston.

In many instances records have been received with different dates, sometimes different names, or names meaning the same but spelled differently, in all such cases, after due deliberation those which seem most credible, have been retained, strict attention having been given at all times to verified records.

When the publication was begun, in the spring of 1897, it was with the intention of printing only the first five generations, with historical and biographical sketches, but when it was found impossible to complete it in season for the annual Boynton convention, it was deemed best to add enough to extend it to the present generations, and thereby make the book much more desirable. Many of the records were sent to Doctor Boynton in 1883 and 1884, and from a large majority of families no additions have been received, while in a few instances the last born has been quickly announced, therefore due allowance must be made for the lapse of a decade in some lines, that might otherwise seem a little mixed.

The "Arms de Boynton" is represented in true heraldic colors, and exactly as Sir Henry Somerville Boynton,—the present Baronet—is using it, save the "label" immediately beneath the helmet, which is omitted, as it was used simply to "distinguish the difference of the eldest son."

In the search for records many Genealogies and Town Histories have been consulted, and wherever the name Boynton found, it has been copied. In all such cases due appreciation has been felt, and is hereby acknowledged. The compiler embraces this opportunity, to extend her thanks to each, and all, who have in any manner encouraged and assisted in the work of compilation.

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

# English History and Genealogy.

---

Some fifty years ago, the late Edmond Boynton, of Boston, sent a man to Europe to collect what information he could concerning the Boynton's, and to establish the ancestral line of William and John Boynton, the emigrants, with the hope of publishing the genealogy of the same. His health failing he became somewhat discouraged in the matter, and some of the manuscript was destroyed or lost.

The following contains the direct line in England, which has never before been printed in this country. I transcribed it from the manuscript copy collected in England, which was loaned me by Mrs. Stevens,—a sister of the late Mr. Edmond Boynton; and believing this to be the proper time and place to present it to the Boyntons of America, I gladly do so, with the assurance I am carrying out the intention of the late John Farnham Boynton. C. H. B.

"In a sequestered, rural neighborhood, bordering on the town of Bridlington, and not far from the shore of the North Sea, in the Eastern part of Yorkshire, stands the ancient village of Boynton,


which derives importance from its having given name to the family of Boynton, and their principal seat for several centuries. The church was built in the fourteenth century. It is of stone, with an embattled tower picturesquely hung with ivy, and formerly contained monuments to the memory of the Boyntons. The last remaining one bore the following inscription, in old English letters: Hie jacet Thomas Newport et Elizabeth uxor eius filia et haeres Johis Boynton illia et heredis Do. Robt. Boynton, militis qu Thos. obit XV die Novembri A. D. M. C. C. C. XII quorum animabus propitietar Deus. Amen.

The manor house was from a very early period the residence of the Boyntons, but the present structure was built by the Strickland family, into whose possession the estate passed upwards of a century ago; the Boyntons having previously removed, first to Barnston, then to Burton Agnes, in the same neighborhood, which places they acquired by the marriage of Sir Matthew Boynton, in 1618, with Frances, daughter of Sir Henry Griffith, and where the present representative of the family, Sir Francis Boynton, Baronet, continues to reside. (Sir Henry Somerville Boynton, the present Baronet, 1898, resides in the same place. C. H. B.)

The family sent forth branches into the neighboring villages, at an early period. East Heslerton and Wintringham being the abode for several generations of that branch whose descendants William and John came to New England in the year 1637 and settled at Rowley, in Massachusetts. Sir Matthew made preparations for accompanying them, but the prospects of the Puritans becoming brighter in England, he remained at home, and was of great service to the cause espoused by Oliver Cromwell.

The first mention we have of the name as a surname, is **Bartholomew de Boynton**, who was seized of the manor of Boynton in 1067, and was succeeded in his estate by his son

2. **Walter**, who was living in 1091. After this we meet with Bruis de Boynton whose name appears on a document dated 1129. He was succeeded by
3. **Sir Ingram de Boynton**, Knt. who lived in 1159, and whose son and heir
4. **Thomas de Boynton**, had issue
5. **Robert de Boynton**, who flourished in 1205, and by his wife, daughter of Thomas Burgh, Esq., left a son Ingraham.
6. **Ingraham de Boynton**, who was living in 1235 and 1258. He married Margaret, daughter and heir of Sir Walter Grindall, by whom he had
7. **Walter de Boynton**, who lived in 1273, and married the daughter of Ingram Mounseaux, by whom he had
8. **Ingraham de Boynton**, who was living in 1272 and 1307. By his wife, a daughter of St. Quintine, he had

9. **Sir Walter de Boynton**, who was knighted in 1356, being in the service of the Prince of Wales, in Brittany. He married a daughter of William Alton, and left
10. **Sir Thomas de Boynton**, of Acclam, his son and heir, lord of the ancient demense in Boynton, of Acclome and Aresome, in right of his mother, and of Reuseby, Newton, and Swaynton by his wife Katharine, daughter and co-heir of Sir Gifford Rossells, of Newton, Knt. He was succeeded by his son
11. **Sir Thomas Boynton**, Knt, who by his wife Margaret, daughter of —— Speeton, of Sawcock, left a son
12. **Sir Henry Boynton**, Knt. He joined Henry Percy, Earl of Northumberland, who had taken up arms against Henry the Fourth, in 1405. They were defeated, and Sir Henry, with seven others, was executed at Sadbury, in Yorkshire, on the second day of July, 1405. He married Elizabeth, daughter of Sir John Merrifield, Knt., and by her had daughters Janett and Elizabeth, and two sons; Thomas who died at the age of twelve years, and
13. **William Boynton**, who married Jane, daughter of Simon Harding, and left
14. **Sir Thomas Boynton**, Knt., who made his will July 28, 1408, which was proved at York, on the 6th of the following September. By his wife Margaret, daughter of William Normanville, he had two sons; Henry, the eldest, and heir, from whom descends the present Baronet, of Burton Agnes, and
15. **Sir Christopher Boynton**, Knt. who was seated at Sadbury, in Yorkshire. He married the daughter of Sir John Coignes, of Ormesbury, Knt, by whom he left
16. **Sir Christopher**, of Sadbury, Knt. who also had estates in Heslerton and Newton, and in the parish of Wintringham. His first wife was Elizabeth, daughter of —— Wanford, by whom he had one son William, who died without issue. By his second wife Jane, daughter of Robert Strangeways, of Kelton, he had daughters Elizabeth and Jane, and two sons, Sir Christopher, whose male issue is extinct, and
17. **Robert Boynton**, of East Heslerton, who died in 1526, leaving by his wife, Agnes, sons John, of East Heslerton; Richard, of Newton, who died in 1539; William, a Priest, and
18. **James Boynton**, of Wintringham, who made his will in 1534, and died the same year, leaving a widow, Jane, and sons Roger, William and Christopher.
19. **Roger Boynton**, the eldest son, was also of Wintringham, and resided at Knapton, in that parish. He died in 1558. By his wife Jenet, daughter of —— Watson, he had sons James, Richard, William, Edmund, and a daughter Alice.
20. **William Boynton**, the third son of Roger, resided also at

Knapton, in Wintringham. He died in 1615, having made his will on the second day of July in the same year. He left a widow, Margaret, who was his second wife. Sons, Francis, who died at Knapton, in 1638; Daniel, of East Heslerton; John, and William, and daughter Anne, and Margaret.

- 21. William Boynton**, the youngest son, was executor of his father's will, and residuary legatee. He continued to reside at Knapton, where his sons William, and John were born, the former in 1605, and the latter in 1614. These two brothers, in the year 1637, joined the expedition which was fitted out under the auspices of Sir Matthew Boynton and others who had made extensive preparations for a settlement in New England. Sir Matthew remained behind and joined the fortunes of Oliver Cromwell. The remainder of the party embarked at Hull in the autumn of 1638, and arrived at Boston, in New England, the same year. Many of the families were wealthy, and with the means brought with them purchased a tract of land situated between the towns of Newbury and Ipswich, which they took possession of in April 1639, and called it Rowley in honor of their minister, Mr. Ezekiel Rogers, who had been sometime preacher at the village of that name in Yorkshire."

## English Wills.

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Translated from the Latin.

"**Sir Thomas de Boynton**, Knt. will dated July 28, 1408; proved Sept. 6, 1408. Desires to be buried in the Church at Aclam. Wife Margaret, sons Henry and Christopher, mentions his cousin John Boynton.

In noie dei Amen, in the year of oure lorde god a M. V. xliij, the xx tie day of Junii, in the yere of oure Sovaigne lord Kinge henrie thegght xx xiij King of England and of Frauncie and of Yrelande, defendor of the faith, supreme hefe of the churche of Englande and of Yrelande. Be it knowne unto to all men that ar present and to come, that I James Boynton, husbandman, of Wyntringham of the countie of Yorke, of holl mynde and goode memorie, dothe make this my last will and testament in this manner followinge:

I comende my soull unto Jhu my saviore, and unto the prayer of oure blissed ladie and all Sanctis, and I will that my bodie be buried as my executor thinks goode; and I give unto the power folks in

almes for my soulls' helth &c.; and I give unto Jane my wife all my parte and porcion of howsholde gere within the seller; and I give and bequest unto William Boynton my sonne, one cottage house lienge in the lordshippe of Wintringham, and doth surrender upo unto the lordes handes after the customs of the manner the same cottage house for the same William's profit and use; and I give and bequeath unto Christopher Boynton, my sonne, one cottage house lienge in the lordshippe of Wyntringham, and one cottage house lyenge in the lordshippe of Newton, with all and every thappurtennes pteyng to the same, lyenge in the lordships aforeside, after the custome and copies of the manner; and I do make of this my last testament and will, my full executour Christopher Boynton, my naturall sonne, of my pte and pts not ggyen and bequest, the lords rents and all dets paide; and the said Christopher Boynton to do and dispose as he shull thinke goode to be doyne for my soull's health.

Proved July 3, 1512. (The eldest son, Roger, is not mentioned in the will, as he was already provided for by entail and gift.)

In the name of god Amen, the second daie on Julie, 1515, I Willm Boynton, of Knapton, within the countie of Yorke, Husbandman, sick of bodie, but of good and pfect remembrance, praised be god Almighty, haith constituted and made this my last will and testament in maner and forme followinge.

First I give unto and bequeathe my soule unto god almighty, my maker, and to Jesus Christe my redemp, and to the holie ghost my sanctifier and comforter, and my bodie to be burried with in the pishe church earth of Wintringham.

- Item. I give unto Anne Boynton my sonne Frances wife five shillings.
- Item. I give unto Daniell Boynton my sonne, Tenne shillings.
- Item. I give unto Margaret Boynton my wife, one sheepe hogg.
- Item. I give unto John Boynton, my sonne, to William Boynton, Anne Boynton, and Margery Boynton, to every one of them one sheep hogg.
- Item. I give unto Margaret Sheareman & Anne Sheareman, to either of them half a ston of string hemp.
- Item. I give unto Margaret Boynton, my wife, the lease of my house and farm hold dueringe her widowhood, to bring up my children. And if it happen that my said wife do marrie, then I give my said lease of my said house and farmehold unto my said children John Boynton, William Boynton, Anne Boynton, and Margery Boynton, to be divided equallie amoung them. The rest of all my goods, not bequeathed, my debts

paid and fumall discharged, I give unto William Boynton,  
my sonne whome I make my full executor of this my last  
will and testament.

### SIR MATHEW BOYNTON'S SECOND LETTER TO JOHN WINTHROP JR.

To my uerie worthy friend John Winthorpe the yonger Esqr: att Ipswidge present this.

Sir -- I haue now accoordinge to my former intendment sent ouer two seruants, tenn ewe sheepennd a ramme. I haue directed them to your father, because, I suppose, you will be eare this, att Connecticutt. Twentie goates I haue alsoe sent with them, and a bucke: I haue written to your father to enticate him that they may be conneyd to Ipswidge, as soone as they may conuenientlie be remoued without dringer, because I perceyue by your letter that the cattle are theyr. Sir, you know what neede theyr is that seruants should haue eyes ouer them, espetiallie when they are att soe far a distance from theyr maister, tho, I hope the menn be honest, yett, I pray you theyrfore that you, haunging occasion your selfe to be absent, you will be pleased to intreate some ffriends of yours att Ipswidge, that they will both aduise them and examine them & direct them. I pray you lett me haue notice from you of what you shall conceyue shall be expedient for me to send ouer for my prouision. I would be glad to heare from you as often as you cann, & how you like of the country aboute Connecticutt, & how our businesses goe on theyr. I wrigg to you by the first shippes that went from hence this yeare, that I intended by all meanes to preserue the increase of my cattle, & now I haue, for that purpose, sent ouer these seruants: I intend (God willinge) to send ouer by the next shippes that come, twentie goates more, which I haue alreddie bought, & would haue sent them now, if I could haue gotten them carryed as I was promised, but after disappoyneted. I haue noe more to say, butt to give you hartie thanks for all your lone & kindness, which shall ener deeplie engage

London; ffrom Pauls Allie in Red Cross Streete Aprill 8th 1636. In-dorsed by John Winthrop, Jun., "Sr Matthew Boynton."

In Sir Matthew's third letter written "Aprill 13th, 1636," he writes, "I have sent by this shipp 23 goates, and two seruants."

To my uerie worthy friende John Winthorpe esqr att Boston in the Massachusetts Bay in New England present this.

Sir,—Itt will be a graete deale of charg to send ouer more seruants, or to make such prouisions as you speke of for carts and oxen, and theyrfor I thinke that will be my best way which you propound, to lett out my cattle, reseruing the whole increase, for that I desire to preserue. Sir, I will wholie relye upon you for your direction, since you haue giuen me leaue to be so bould with you, and what you would chuse to doe for your selfe, if your case were mine, is that which I desire you would direct for me, and if the Lord giue me leaue to see your contrie, I shall then endeavour my selfe to acknowledg all your kind nesses; in the meane while I rest

William Spofford I hope will be carefull ouer the cattle, if they be letten forth as you thinke itt will be conuenient.

Sir Matthew Boynton's sixth letter to John Winthrop, Jr.

To my uerie worthy friende John Winthropp the yonger, Esq. att Ipswidge in the Massachusetts Bay in New England, giue this.

Sir,—Hauninge considered the uneuantaintie of my condition, and the more, by reason of manie difficulties which I dayly meeete withall, my businesses alsoe, which are manie, beeing yett undisposed of; I haue thought itt nott conuenient to be att anie further charge with my stocke, butt ame upon these considerations fullie resolued to lett them out to be kept for me a third parte of the increase, which I haue heard to be the usuall rate of the contrie, butt if I be mistaken therein, I refer itt to your selfe to make such an allowance out of the increase of the cattle, I mean my whole stocke, as you shall judge to be equall and proportionable; and because theyr will be noe employmant for my seruants when my stocke is thus disposed of, I will leaue itt to theyr choice, whether they will returne into England, (the e)charge of which theyr passage I will uerie willinglie beare, if they thinke itt conuenient, whch notwithstanding I suppose they will not, (if they understand the condition of things here) or els to make use of theyr liberties for theyr best aduantage in the place where they are.

Your kindness in the disposing of my business for me shall much engage

London April 12th, 1637.

I haue se (nt) eyther of my seruants halfe a yeares wages by Mr Hopkins, which I pray you deliuier to them. I haue heard nothing from you nor them since the last yeare; soe that I know nothing how my stooke prospereth: I haue givien your vncle Downing satisfaction for thirtie pound, concerning which you writt to me. I gaue my seruants a yeares wages before hand when I sent them ouer in May last. I haue alsoe intreated Mr. Hopkins to use his endeauoures for the disposing of stooke for my best conuenience, soe that I may be free from anie charge att all in keeping of them, and that itt may be alsoe in my pwer to deliuier them, upon occasion of anie prsent bargainto anie to whom I shall thinke fit to sell them here att home.

## Extracts from Neal's History of New England.

---

In 1637 the State of Religion in England was growing worse and worse; for the Arch-Bishop persecuted the Puritans with the utmost Rigour, oppressing them in all quarters of the Land, and encouraging the scum of the People to turn informers against them.

The Ecclesiastical Authority being screwed up to such a height, and the point of it directed chiefly against the Puritans, 'tis no wonder that vast numbers, both Ministers and People, transported themselves to New England, 'till the Government at length took umbrage at it, and published a Proclamation bearing date April the 30th, 1637, "To restrain the disorderly transporting of his Majesty's Subjects to the Plantations in Amerie without a Licence from his Majesty's Commissioners, because of the many idle and refractory humours, whose only or principal end was to live without the reach of Authority." And the next day an Order was made in Councell "That the Lord Treasurer of England should take speedy and effectual course for the stay of 8 ships now in the River Thames prepared to go for New-England, and should likewise give Order for the putting on Land all the Passengers and provisions therein intended for the voyage."

In these ships were Sir Matthew Boynton, Sir William Constable, Sir Arthur Hazlerig, Mr. John Hampden, and Oliver Cromwell, who with several other Gentlemen were removing to New-England.

**It is evident Sir Matthew Boynton intended to come to America to live, but we have been unable to find any evidence or proof that he did come.** In the first of a series of his letters to John Winthrop, Jr., dated "ffeb, 23th, 1635," he wrote, "I have removed my ffamilie out of the contry, and ame now constantlie att London." In 1637 he was already embarked, but the "ships were stayed, and all the Passengers and provisions ordered on shore." It is recorded his son Peregrine "God gave unto them when they were strangers in a foreign land," but a "foreign land" could mean Holland or some other European land as well as America. If a man of the importance of Sir Matthew Boynton, had settled in Amerien, after that attempt failed, our local history would likely have recorded it. Sir Matthew died at Highgate, in Middlesex, England, in 1648.

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**From the MAGNALIA CHRISTI AMERICANA, by Cotton Mather.**

We read: "Many prudent men in those times, foreseeing the storms that were likely in a few years to break upon the English nation, did propose New England for their hiding place. And of these, our Mr. Rogers was one, who had been accompanied by Sir William Constable and Sir Matthew Boynton also in his voyage hither, if some singular providence had not hindered them. Hither did the good hand of God bring him, with many of his Yorkshire friends, in the year 1638; ships having been by his discretion and influence brought from London unto Hull, to take in the passengers. Arriving at New England, he was urged very much to settle with his Yorkshire folks at New Haven; but in consideration of the dependence that several persons of quality had on him to choose a meet place for their entertainment in this wilderness, when they should come hither after him, he was advised rather to another place, which he was proffered very near his revered kinsman, Mr. Nathaniel Rogers of Ipswich."

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**CRESTS, MOTTOES, and HERALDRY, by William Newton, and others.**

"The heraldic appendages of a knight (considered as a military title) are the helmet, mantle, wreath, and crest, and these are admitted to appertain to knighthood under all its qualities and modifications. The helmet of a knight stands full-faced, with the vizor open, which, says Guillim, signifies direction and command, for that it is a greater honour to bear the vizor open than closed: the closed vizor signifying buckling on the helmet, as a preparation for battle: whereas the open vizor betokeneth a return from battle, with glory and victory."

The crescent, or new moon, has been an honorable symbol, employed by many of the eastern nations, and particularly by the Saracens and Turks. Hence, the conquests of the Christian leaders over the Mohammedans during the Holy wars have given rise to the assumption of crescents as heraldic insignia in our shields of arms. This form represents the new moon as she appears about the time of the autumnal Equinox, when seen in Syria and other regions near the northern tropic, that is, with her horns toward the Zenith.

In storming Jerusalem, the Christians, at length, by their undaunted valour, made themselves masters. This memorable event took place on Friday, the 15th of July, 1099, a day of the week, it appears, which in that superstitious age was considered to be of no small importance: for Adam was created upon the sixth day (Friday): Christ was crucified on a Friday, and on Friday was achieved the third important event in the annals of the world, the establishment of the Christian standard in the "Holy City." Undoubtedly the goat was assumed for a crest by the Boyntons during the Crusades, as indicative of their undaunted courage. Guillim wrote "the goat is not so hardy as politick, therefore, that martial man which useth more policy than valour in achieving his victory, may very aptly bear for his coat armour this beast." "It is probable that some peculiar virtue was implied by the erased head of the goat, for ancient heralds say, that alchymists asserted the blood of a goat would soften the diamond." Sylvanus Morgan says "The goat may betoken one who is willing to fare hard, so he may be in high employment honored."

## In Memoriam.

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The equinoctial storm of 1811 had just settled upon the quiet town of East Bradford, (now Groveland) Massachusetts, when Susanna Nichols, the energetic wife of Eliphalet Boynton, gave birth to her fourth, and last child. It gladdened her mature heart to learn the young charge was a boy, and as his paternal grandmother said the "exact image of his father." The weather prophets gauged the "line" storm to a day, as the youngster first breathed the free air of his native town on the 20th of September. He was the seventh generation of his name in this country; all of his Boynton ancestors had lived and died within a few miles of Rowley, where William, the emigrant, settled in 1638. He was his grandmother's pet, and she desired him named for her eldest son John, who removed about that time to the "far west," and settled in Bethany, N. Y. In those days there came an itinerant "minister," pointing out to those worthy sons and daughters of husbandry the "only road to salvation." He was very eloquent, and the good old grandmother said, "if they would call the young boy for him, adding the minister's last name to the John already mentioned, she would give him a sheep."\*

\*NOTE. Dr. Boynton told a friend who inquired the origin of his middle name. "My mother was a Nichols, and I ought to have been called John Nichols Boynton, and had I been there at the naming, and I now know, the eloquent Douglass Farham's name would not have been mine, and I should have preserved my mother's, for I believe a woman should not lose her name and identity, when she marries. I think this was rather a mutton operation, and I have always felt sheepish about it. Father kept the sheep for me, gave me credit for one half of the wool, and when the sheep were slaughtered, credit for one half of the mutton, and another took the place, so when I was twenty years of age my father presented me with twenty-six dollars, with which I bought a watch."

Between his father's house and the "old red school house" were immense boulders, cradle rocks and ledges, and from these expressions of Nature's travail—or the glacial period—he gained his first knowledge of Geology, which he so eloquently explained to thousands, a generation later. The first he knew that rocks had names, was one evening at the boys lyceum: they had engaged Benjamin Greenleaf, A. M. (author of the "National Arithmetic") to come down from the west parish and talk to them. Mr. Greenleaf took much pleasure in describing to their attentive minds the familiar stony products, and gave their varied names and classifications.

Young John was quick to absorb all the old mathematician told them, and gave much attention thereafter to the subject, until he became one of the leading geologists in this country. When twenty-one years of age he started westward, to learn something of the great world beyond his native state, and was not satisfied until he reached the Mississippi, a great journey for that period. Soon after his return he began the practice of dentistry, and here I will quote from a letter of his, written to a friend in 1884. "While visiting in Salem, Massachusetts in the thirties, I called on Dr. Peabody, who I think had just returned from England. He was the first dentist I had ever seen, and he kindly allowed me to examine his instruments, and witness his operations, saying he 'thought I would make a skillful dentist.' In a few days I returned to my native town, and assisted in the manufacture of a set of instruments. With these I operated for many years, and after I had obtained extensive sets of instruments, would frequently return to the old ones, as they would apply in many cases better than the new ones that others had made. Between 1835 and 1850 I operated in nearly all of the western and southern states."

In 1836 he married Miss Susan Lowell, of Buxton, Maine, and removed west, where he worked diligently at his profession, meanwhile studying medicine. In 1843 he

graduated from St. Louis Medical College, and immediately began to give public lectures, which profession he followed many years with great success, first on the "Human brain, Animal Magnetism, and Electro Magnetism," as it was known at that time. Between 1845 and 1848, on the "Electric Telegraph and Electro Magnetism." The subject announced was "Man a Living Galvanic Battery,—his brain a Magnet,—Electricity subject to his will, and Electricity the connecting link between Mind and Matter." These lectures were in the interest of Prof. Morse, and illustrated with his own previously invented electric telegraph, which was much more compact than the one Morse used. Dr. Boynton lectured in this cause in all the principal cities east of the Mississippi, and Morse sent men after him to lay the wires.

In 1847 his first born, a noble boy of ten years, was drowned in the Saen River. He was lecturing in New Orleans when the sad news reached him, six weeks after the event, so slow was mail transit fifty years ago!

In December 1848, a call from Washington made him bearer of dispatches to Commodore Jones, commander of the Pacific squadron, located at Monterey, whom he found in the bay of San Francisco, in June 1849. He was in company with Weller's commission to run the boundary line between the United States and Mexico. Mrs. Jessie Benton Fremont was one of the company who helped to "spice the hours, as they pleasantly glided over Pacific's mirrored billows." He remained in California about two years, during which time he cleared the hull, and raised—with submarine camels—the sunken ship Tonquin. In 1845 and 1846, he spent much time on Lake Superior, locating Government copper and silver mining permits for English and Americans, on the north and south shores. Sir William Logan, the Queen's knighted geologist crossed the wildest portion of the lake with him in his open top boat. After his return from Superior he bought an interest in the Randall and Stevens Solar Salt Works, at Syracuse, N. Y., and

after Randall retired, Lyman Stevens and Doctor Boynton continued the business under the firm name of L. Stevens and Company.

About 1851 he purchased four acres of land in Syracuse, north of James Street, facing what is now called "Highland Place." On this farm lot he set out one thousand pear trees, besides apples, plums, cherries, quinces and small fruits. The orchard was his pet, a haven when he needed rest. Here he raised some very fine seedling fruit, among which his "Boynton Beauty Pear," is particularly worthy of mention. It combines size, beauty, flavor, and good keeping qualities, and the tree is a strong grower.

Resuming his favorite profession, he took for his subject "Geology, and the Natural History of Creation." Of all who listened to those courses of lectures, who will ever forget his rendering of the "Nautilus and the Ammonite?" It was so indentified with his lecture on the period when they flourished, I think it fitting to reproduce it here.

"The Nautilus and the Ammonite  
Were launched in a friendly strife ;  
Each sent to float in its tiny boat,  
On the wide, wild sea of life.

For each could swim on the Ocean's brim,  
And when wearied, its sail could furl ;  
And sink to sleep, in the great sea-deep,  
In its palace all of pearl !

And theirs was a bliss more fair than this,  
Which we taste in colder clime ;  
For they were rife in a tropic life,  
A brighter and better clime !

They swam mid isles whose summer smiles  
Were dimmed by no alloy ;  
Whose groves were palm, whose air was balm,  
And life—one only joy.

They sailed all day, through creek and bay,  
 And traversed the ocean deep;  
 And at night they sank on a coral bank,  
 In their fairy bowers to sleep!

And the monsters vast, of ages past,  
 They beheld in their ocean caves;  
 They saw them ride in their power and pride,  
 And sink in their deep sea graves.

Thus hand in hand, from strand to strand,  
 They sailed in mirth and glee;  
 Those fairy shells, with their crystal cells,  
 Twin sisters of the sea.

But they came at last, to a sea long past,  
 And as they reached its shores,  
 The Almighty's breath spoke out in death,  
 And the Ammonite lived no more!

So the Nautilus now, in its shelly prow,  
 As over the deep it strays;  
 Still seems to seek, in bay and creek,  
 Its companion of other days.

And alike do we, on life's stormy sea,  
 As we roam from shore to shore;  
 Thus, tempest toss, seek the loved and lost,  
 But find them on earth no more.

Yet the hope how sweet, again to meet,  
 As we look to a distant strand,  
 Where heart meets heart, no more to part,  
 Who meet in that better land."

Of the more than four thousand lectures delivered by Prof. Boynton, he wrote but one, that was his last, on "Microbes, and their relation to Disease," which he delivered before the Medical Fraternity in 1887. This he dictated, sentence by sentence, while in the act of painting a room, and I copied it on the type writer. An eminent physician in New York told him in 1884, "If he had continued to write and lecture on that subject, (Microscopic life being the cause of diseases,) from the time he first talked with him about it, he would then, occupy a position before the Medical world, that Vanderbilt did before the Railroad."

It was his brain that devised the scheme by which the "Rebel ram Albemarle" was destroyed. Lieut. William Cushing became acquainted with Doctor Boynton's invention of the "Oil well Torpedo," therefore when President Lincoln sent for Cushing and told him he wanted him to destroy the ram Albemarle, Cushing replied he "would do it," but to the President's query "how?" he answered "I will let you know in ten days." On leaving Lincoln, Cushing went directly to Syracuse, to consult with Doctor Boynton, and while there they laid the plans which he returned to Lincoln.

After a few days Dr. Boynton joined Cushing at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and together they watched the construction of two armed torpedo boats, on the completion of which, the Doctor named one the *Manetta*, and his eldest daughter, Josephine, named the other the *Chautauqua*. They experimented with them in the Hudson and East rivers, to insure the practical working of the machinery and torpedoes, and when Cushing left the Doctor he said, "Well Doctor, in ten days you will hear the rebel ram Albemarle is destroyed, or Willie Cushing is no more! Good by."

Professor Boynton's brain was ever active. Between 1844 and 1890 he had granted him over thirty patents, beside many useful things invented that were not patented. The "Manual of Magnetism," published by Daniel Davis Jr. in

Boston, in 1847, second edition, illustrates several of Doctor Boynton's inventions: one on page 176, "Axial Revolving Bar;" one on page 221, "Electric Magnet, revolving on its axis;" and one on page 278, "Improved Magneto-Electric Machine." One of his first patents was "Improvement in Apparatus for Solar Salt Evaporation." His "Oil Well Torpedoes, first used with success, by himself, Refrigerator Cars or Tanks, for conveying vegetable or animal substances during transit." At that time the idea was so absurd to the majority, he could get no one to invest with him in introducing them! Now what would we do without them? He received more money from his "Improved Gaslight Multiplier," than for all the rest. He always spoke very highly of his "Anti Friction Oil," as a lubricator. His Improved Fire Extinguishers," have long been known as the "Babcock Fire Extinguisher." "The first process for converting cast iron into malleable steel was invented by him." "Improvement in Ornamentation of the Surfaces of Hard Materials, such as shells, pearls, ivory, bone, horn, marble, buttons, and glass," has been familiar to many who have used the pearl buttons of iridescent hue. He considered his "Method of extracting Gold and other metal by Chlorine, and the vacuum process, a very useful one. His "diving bells" and "Ingenius method of taking deep sea soundings," were also of much interest.

About 1888 he became interested in wall plasters and Hydraulic Cements. His "Alabaster Cement Plaster" was proven to be superior to any in use. In connection with that he invented an "Apparatus for Evaporating water from granular materials, as sand, mineral, and vegetable substances." He gave the electric light on the platform with his lectures twenty-five years before it came into general use. His last invention, an "Electric Motor" is lost to the world.

At times during his busy and varied life, he gave attention to the genealogy of his name, and his eldest daughter (Mrs. Brewster) recorded as he collected, but her sudden

death in 1880 checked his investigations, which were not renewed until the first of January, 1883. He called the first Boynton Convention to be holden in Newburyport, Mass., on August 14, 1883, and was very much interested in the cause the remainder of his life—travelling many thousand miles, and devoting thousands of dollars in collecting the genealogical records, which he intended to publish.

He was taken suddenly ill on the 18th of October, 1890, while at work in his laboratory, at Highland Place, Syracuse, and although his attending physician thought he would recover, his own diagnosis proved correct, even to the number of hours he could survive. His earthly light was extinguished about four o'clock on the morning of October twentieth, and his great soul—we believe—passed on to endless Worlds.

"He breathes not, yet he lives in thoughts."

CAROLINE (HARRIMAN) BOYNTON.

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The Saturday Globe of October 25, 1890, contained a long obituary, from which the following extracts were selected: "Syracuse, October 24.—At four o'clock Monday morning, Dr. John Farnham Boynton died at his home on Highland Place, after a very brief illness. By this death the city lost one of the most remarkable men that ever lived in it. September 20, 1811, at Bradford, Mass., was his natal day. Of old and prominent stock he took a deep pride in his family, and several years ago set to work assiduously collecting data with which to complete a genealogical history of all the Boyntons. An Association of the Boyntons was organized through his zeal and he was chosen the president. Dr. Boynton was a man of imposing personality. Tall, well formed, muscular, he was remarkably well preserved, and went about town up to within a few days of his death as spry as any one fifty years of age. Although he was nearly eighty years old his hair which he wore long,

contained few silver threads. It was the Doctor's knowledge of geology that enabled him to denounce the 'Cardiff Giant.'

"The Doctor was apparently in his usual health Saturday afternoon when he became suddenly ill, and throughout his illness he had no hope of recovery. He believed that he had burst a blood vessel in his chest, and that internal hemorrhage interfered with his breathing and his heart action. Drs. E. H. Maxon and H. D. Didama were called. The patient had the symptoms of slight congestion of the lungs. He had been a practicing physician in his early life and insisted that hemorrhage was the trouble and that he could not live long. He wrote a long letter to his wife, who left last week to visit friends in New Milford, Pa. The funeral was held at his home on Wednesday afternoon at three o'clock. All the old residents of the city were in attendance. Rev. E. W. Mundy officiated. Mr. Mundy's remarks were a splendid tribute to the ability of the deceased. Burial was in Woodlawn Cemetery. The bearers were Ex-Mayor Lyman Stevens, John E. Sweet, John W. Truesdell, D. F. Gott, Joseph E. Masters, and M. Fillmore Smith."

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High priest of Science ! her sacred lore

The treasures of earth's mighty heart.  
Unrole to us the heavenly scroll,  
Fling wide the gloomy folds apart  
And fill our souls from nature's soul !  
So whereso'er thy thrilling voice is heard,  
Thy name shall be a people's household word.

Resolved, That in the death of the late Dr. John Boynton, who was a devoted member of this club, we have lost a citizen whose wealth of scientific attainments, general knowledge and practical inventive genius were of the highest standard, duly appreciated by his many friends and devotees of science throughout the country. We sincerely deplore his departure from among us, feeling that few men possess the great knowledge he had acquired covering a period of more than half a century. We remember him as an original, vigorous, intellectual man, studiously devoted to science and the welfare of the human race; a friend of progressive agriculture and a lecturer of rare ability. As a tribute to his memory and praiseworthy efforts in behalf of practical science and invention, we deem it fittingly proper and expressive of our sincere appreciation of Dr. Boynton and his life work that this resolution of respect be passed by this society and spread on the minutes of the club and a copy be sent to his family.

A tribute on the life and character of Doctor Boynton was read by Frank M. Terry, of Liverpool. Mr. Tappan and others also spoke briefly and in the highest terms of him.

## John Farnham Boynton.

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### TRIBUTE TO HIS MEMORY BY F. M. TERRY.

"Dr. John F. Boynton dead! In the zenith of his fame and power he has reached his journey's end. In speaking words of praise and love above his dust we pay a tribute to ourselves. How poor this world would be without its graves, without the memory of our mighty dead. Our citizens should honor this brave and generous man. A millionaire in brains, the intellectual autocrat of his day. Fortune is the man great enough to know the great.

In the presence of death we should judge as we would be judged. We know that men are only fragments, that the greatest walk in shadow, and that faults and failures mingle with the lives of all. In the grave should be buried the prejudices and the passions born of conflict; charity should hold the scales in which are weighed the deeds of men.

John F. Boynton breathed the atmosphere of investigation. Nothing escaped his attention. Born a great man, his restless spirit led him into every field of science, art and letters. He relied upon evidence, on demonstration, upon experience. He endeavored to examine only that which was capable of being examined. He had a brain full of the dawn, the head of a philosopher, and his inventive genius led him into every field of scientific study. His attention was forever turned toward things that were to benefit his fellow men. Such men I love. In them we find the estimates of greatness, the deeds and lives that challenge praise and thrill the hearts of men.

As citizen of our county, he became a part of its growth and progress. His life and character have been woven and interwoven in her adversity and prosperity, from a village upon the bank of a canal to a city of affluence and power. In his and our lives have been the grandest years that men have lived. And when I think of a Humboldt, a Tyndall, a Huxley, a Spencer, a Darwin, a Mills, a Boynton, there are no words intense enough, with heart enough, with love enough, to express my admiration for those great men that have lived and labored for their fellow men. Nothing can be grander than to sow the seeds of noble thoughts, to earn the grateful homage of our race, and then in life's last shadowy hour, to look back over a well-spent life and know that the world is the better for our living. It is not my purpose to pronounce any extended eulogy upon the character and life and services of the man whose death we so profoundly regret. No eulogies, no words of praise, no arch of victory, no monumental pile to endear him to our people. The story of his useful and honorable life illuminates the brightest pages in our knowledge, and the fruits of his incessant labors, read and known of all men, give lustre to his name, and will perpetuate his memory. How much I have enjoyed his many discussions with our Farmers' club. He was always a welcome messenger and his words were full of scientific investigation. Not only may we associate his name with the great scientists of ancient and modern times, but we may more truly associate it with the great inventors of the nineteenth century. Few men possessed such a wonderful combination of brain. Few men stand a peer to John F. Boynton. He knew that science is knowledge of the laws of life, of the conditions of happiness, of the facts by which we are surrounded, means by which man subjugates nature and bends the elemental powers to our will, making blind force the servant of his brain. The Doctor was a chemist and in the crucible of science new truths were discovered, and by the microscope and telescope new worlds. Everywhere and in everything he found the infinite; in every direction he investigated and explored. He was the advocate of inquiry, the investigator of the unknown. He never stopped until he did know. What he knew he discovered by that dint of energy that knew no such word as fail. What he did not

know he had the courage to acknowledge. He mingled with his fellow men, always ready and willing to give aid and support, and with a charitable hand gave counsel and advice. His knowledge and experience made him a ready and eloquent talker. His enthusiasm stirred the hearts of men. His presence inspired in men a lofty character of study and investigation.

Words are inadequate to express the colossal ability of the man. Like the mammoth trees of the forest, he towered high above his fellow men and stood there the eloquent champion of thought and investigation. In the silence of his study, in the quietude of his home, in his laboratory his thoughts were moulded by the presence of a grand and noble wife; she who could see and encourage in him the fertile imagination of a great brain. She stood constantly by his side, and in words of help and encouragement became his constant and necessary adviser. New thoughts were in his brain, new hopes within his heart. Another heaven bent above his life. He saw in everything the everlasting picture of birth and decay. He measured life by that chain of relations and circumstances born of the infinite. From the cradled song of childhood's happy hour to manhood's growth, age and decay--forever the investigator of men and things. In the laboratory of his great brain, that world with one inhabitant sprang into being, speechless attributes human and divine. Few men knew and could measure the capabilities of this great man. Born in the childhood of our country, he added much toward her advancement. He took the thunderbolts from the hand of Jupiter and with them electric thought flashes under the sea and over the land in advance of time. He made the lightnings our messengers and brought the whole world at our door. He added much to the progress of the world. His restless spirit knew no bounds. And his last breath bore away into infinite space and glory—an electric motor just bursting into being.

Dr. John F. Boynton had within the last three years patented and applied for ten patents. Here we see that his intellect was brightening with age. During these years he devoted much time to the study of microbes. The exposure of the Cardiff giant was given to the world by a Boynton. Morse, the father of electricity, hired the Doctor to introduce his discovery, and our Doctor Boynton advanced his interests by the use of his own invention. In fact the discovery belongs to Doctor Boynton. Thirty inventions and patents have been the fruits of his labor.

When we look back over the pages of our cruel war we find Doctor Boynton at its beginning, lecturing through the South. It was at Petersburg where his property was confiscated. His batteries were used at Aquia Creek to convey messages to head quarters of the Confederate army. Afterward they were used at Bull Run, and at the second battle they were destroyed. His collection was valuable, his

loss great. Nothing could deter this great man in his advancement of science. He was a ready listener and a great helper. His spirit knew no bounds and his activity was restless as Old Ocean. In popularizing science he has no equal, living or dead. His lectures in New York were the most gifted success ever attended—one grand ovation." \* \* \* \*

Referring to the destruction of the ram Albemarle, he said, "All praise to the daring Cushing, his name was heralded far and near and goes down to posterity recorded. The great work accomplished, the master hand that built and invented received no praise. It was not for him to receive the plaudits of the north. Silent, and poised, this great man stood in the arena of action. But genius knows all time; for him the dead all breathe and act their countless parts again.

No one can overestimate the good accomplished by this marvellous, many-sided man. Great men are part of nature's self, kindred of all life, the gradual growth of countless years. There was within his words the subtle spark of the season's change, of everything that is, of everything that lies between the slumbering seeds, that, half awakening by the April's rain, have dreams of heaven's blue, and feels the amorous kisses of the sun, and that strange tomb wherein the alchemist doth give to death's cold dust the throb and thrill of life again. And while the wintry snows of age were falling on his head, spring, with all her wealth of bloom, was in his heart. The memory of this ample man is now a part of nature's wealth. He was one of the foremost thinkers of our age. He believed in immortality; nothing created, destroyed. He did not fear to stand alone. His brain took counsel of his heart. And so, with reverent hands, I place this tribute on his tomb."

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A testimonial prepared by a chosen committee was read in the Boynton convention, at the close of which the President, Marcellus Boynton, presented the following:

"It is with pleasure that I add my testimony to what has already been said in regard to the many high and noble qualities of our deceased brother and kinsman, John Farnham Boynton. Although my personal acquaintance with him was not so long as with many of you, yet there were in it many pleasing features. Mutually attracted towards each other in the beginning, by both being interested in the genealogy and history of our people, the bond of friendship grew rapidly until severed by death. Ripened in years, and fully prepared for another state of existence, he has passed on to enjoy the reward of a well-spent life on earth. I shall ever hold in kind remembrance the warm and fraternal relations formed in our association with him.

He was devoted to our cause, and honored the name he bore, and it is through his untiring efforts that we are here assembled in re-union today. Let us hope and trust that in the golden summer of another life, we shall meet him in a sweeter reunion where parting is unknown.

He was one who could truly say if asked as to his stewardship, at the gate of the beautiful city above, I have not been idle. He was a man of noble impulses and of a high order of intelligence. His kind and generous acts won the hearts of our people and we mourn his loss today. But his life and example remain a precious inheritance to our Association, and the record of his faithful stewardship is a monument to his memory more enduring than marble."

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The name BOYNTON also appears under the form of Bayonton—Bianton—Bienton—Binton—Bointon—Boyanton—Boyenton—Boington—Boyinton—Boymeton—Boyonton — Boyton — Buinton — Buyington—Byanton—Byington—Byonton.

## EXPLANATIONS AND ABBREVIATIONS.

William and John Boynton, the emigrants, were the first generation; their children, the second; their grandchildren, the third, and so on. A small figure placed a little above and to the right of each name, designates the generation to which he or she belongs, thus David<sup>4</sup> on the eleventh page signifies he was of the fourth generation. The ancestral line in parenthesis follows the name of each head of the family. The small number placed at the left of the name refers to that one as the head of a family, which can be easily traced; thus 13. David on page five refers to 13 David on page eleven. Where a wife's name occurs in parenthesis the reader will understand that was her maiden name; thus Ruth (Kimball) on page seventeen was the wife of Joseph Hardy.

# Boynton Genealogy

As we have no further record of this John in Mass., it seems quite conclusive he was the progenitor of a large branch of the family in Conn., who still their names Byington, or Boyington.

As we find in the Reg. of Deeds in Alfred, Maine, one Caleb Boynton of York, Me., a "weaver," bought ten acres of land in York, July 6, 1725, and on Sept. 16, 1726, he sold ten acres in York, and his wife Christian, signed the deed with him. They also sold lands at different times in 1736; and in 1762, "Christian Boynton, spinstress, of a place called Wiscasset, Co. of York, Me., sold two acres of land lying in York." There seems little doubt this was Caleb Jr. (from Ipswich) and his wife, but we have not been able to establish the fact. We have a fragment stating "a Caleb Boynton was in Wiscasset in 1750; also one William Boynton in 1754." In the History of Ancient Sheepscot and Newcastle, Me., we find Caleb and William Boynton petitioners for the incorporation of Whitehaven, March 22d, 1740. Was not this William the brother of Caleb Jr., b. 1673-?.

"He was a man of many virtues and ever esteemed as a neighbor, friend and devoted Christian wherever he was known. He was, moreover, a staunch and sturdy lover of his country. Too old and infirm for service himself he furnished from his household three sons and a son-in-law in the late war, as volunteers in the armies of the Union. Some one of his family took a part in nearly all the great campaigns of the war." Some one of his children upheld the union cause in actual battle at Bolivar Heights, Winchester, Cedar Mountain, Antietam, Chancellorsville, Beverly Ford, Gettysburg, and Lee's retreat across the Potomac; at Shiloh, the siege of Corinth, the siege of Vicksburg, the Red River expedition and its battle at Fort de Russy; at Tupelo; in the march from Chattanooga to Atlanta and its battles of Dallas, Resaca, and Peach Tree creek; in the famous "march to the sea" and thence through the Carolinas and the battles at Savannah and Bentonville; at the battles of Nashville and Franklin; in the pursuit of Sterling Price through Missouri with its battles and skirmishes, and at the final storming of the forts at Mobile, besides other engagements and skirmishes too numerous to mention.



subsequently receiving the degree of A. M. from his Alma Mater. He began teaching in Mobile, Ala., where he remained several years in Barton Academy and a "High School for Boys." While here, in 1847, he was united in marriage to Miss Sarah Cleveland Cune of New York City, a lineal descendant of the original Moses Cleveland of Woburn, Mass., (1637.) In 1850, while Preceptor of Pepperell Academy, he accepted a position in the public schools of Lynn, Mass., where he taught with marked success for nearly ten years. In 1861 the military ardor which he had inherited from a soldier ancestry, burst into flame, and he joined the first Regiment, Mass. Volunteer Cavalry, and went "to the front." After two narrow escapes from death, by a fall from his horse and the malarial fever, at Hilton Head, S. C., in 1863, he received orders from Washington to join the U. S. Signal Corps. Having served three years he was honorably discharged at Boston, in Sept. 1864. After the close of the war he received a Diploma from the State, signed by the Governor and Adjutant General. "As a testimonial of the people's gratitude for your patriotism." He has been a resident of Swampscott,—originally a part of Lynn,—since 1850; has served both town and state in various offices, and has been a Justice of the Peace since 1871. He was remarkable in his younger days for strength and agility, and had when he died what few possess, a set of perfectly sound teeth. After the death of his wife he removed to Boston, where he resided with his son Nathaniel, until he was run over by a horse and carriage while on his way to church, and died from the effects of the shock, Oct. 7, 1823. Some of his descendants thought his name was Isaiah, instead of Nathan, but as all agreed as to the place, and manner of his death: we trust the above, copied from the Registry of Deaths in Boston, will be sufficient: cause in record being "accidental."—(C. On June 20, 1859, he married Annie Fieldl, in Cincinnati, in which city he settled. In 1862, after the war broke out, he returned to his native home in Mich., and soon after enlisted as a private in Company C, Eighth Michigan Cavalry. Before leaving the State he was promoted to First Lieutenant of Company L; in 1863 was promoted to Captain of his company, and in the winter of 1864-65 was commissioned Major of his regiment, making an honorable record as a soldier. He served under General Burnside in the East Tennessee Campaign, rendering efficient service. At Athens, in that State, he took possession of a printing office and printed one edition, which was call-

ed "The Athens Union Post." Lieut. Boynton was frequently detailed on staff duty, and filled a number of important positions on brigade and division staff. He was always a favorite with both officers and men. Although a strict disciplinarian, he gained the respect of those under him, and held the confidence of his superior officers. After a service of three years he was mustered out by reason of the termination of the war, and engaged in business in Marine city, where he held offices of trust until 1868 when he was elected to the State Legislature. In 1869 he removed to Port Huron, and engaged in the newspaper business, editor and publisher of the "Port Huron Press" until 1871. In 1874 he was elected mayor of Port Huron, and re-elected in 1875. He was also President of the Board of Education two years, and a member of the Board four years. He invented the Boynton Fire Escape and Hook and Ladder Truck, and the Boynton system of wire rope trussing for fire ladders. In 1879 he was given the general management of the Michigan business of Sheldon & Co. of New York, a large book publishing house. In 1883 his health failing he was forced to retire from that business, and since then has given all his time, energy, and ability to building up the Order of the Knights of the Maccabees, filling continuously both the office of Great Record Keeper, and the office of Supreme Record Keeper of the Supreme Tent. "He is a man of strong convictions, plain and outspoken, true to a friend as the needle to the compass, and knows no such word as fail."

Sarah, dau. of Jonathan Snow, as early as 1766, for on the 24th day of March in that year, she signed deed with Amos, both of Shrewsbury. He was a "Taylor." His name first appears in the church and town records of Fitz William, N. H., in 1774, but after the Revolution he moved to Windsor, Vt. He was Sergt. in both Capt. Whitecomb's and Capt. Clay's Cos. In Feb., 1777, Fitz William returned 8 men for three years, or the war: Amos Boynton was one, for which he was allowed "24 pounds Bounty." He was at Bunker Hill. In connection with his service under General Arnold, Capt.

Ward's Co., the following, copied from "Norton's History of Fitzwilliam" may be of interest: "In 1775 General Arnold was dispatched from the vicinity of Boston for the Kennebec River, and across what is now the State of Maine, with the hope of taking Quebec by surprise. Arnold's troops suffered terribly from hunger and fatigue, and many died from starvation and exposure. Mr. Potter, endured 15 days hard marching with no food but a part of a partridge and a quarter of a red squirrel! Amos Boynton—age 33—was in this expedition, but of his experience we have no record." He was gone seven days "on the alarm at the battle of Concord," and "on towards Royalston, State of Vt., with horses, four days, travelled 35 miles." Baptism of children recorded in Fitzwilliam, N. H., the births we glean from Southern records. He was 40 or 45 years of age when he died.

James Stoddard, lawyer and ex-judge, Griffin, Ga., son of Elijah S. and Elizabeth (Moffet) Boynton, was born in Henry County. His father was of English descent, tracing his lineage back to the Boynton knighted by William the Conqueror, was born in Vermont, came to Georgia when a young man, and settled in Henry County. His mother was of a South Carolina family of French extraction; his parents, though not rich, were in moderately good circumstances. Judge Boynton grew up on the farm, and received only such education as could be obtained at the "old field" schools of the day, a few months each year after laying-by time. The hot blood of his youth was set on fire by reading of the heroic deeds of our chivalrous citizens-soldiery during the Mexican war, and he was inspired by an ambition to secure an appointment to West Point and enter the army. Accordingly, in 1849, he entered upon a preparatory course of study, but in November of that year his father died leaving him a patrimony of only 100 acres of land and one negro. Still intent on his cherished object, he chose for his guardian a gentleman able and willing to assist him. But in 1851 his friend and guardian died, by which all hope was destroyed. Still bent on a military career, with the consent of his newly-chosen guardian, he sold his land with the view of attending the Georgia Military Institute at Marietta. On application and inquiry there he found the money he had barely enough to support him two years, while he could not graduate in less than three years. This was a crushing blow to his ambition, and he abandoned his object. His thirst for knowledge and higher and nobler aspirations of his nature never deserted him. Going to Cave Springs, near Rome, he entered Hearne's School and remained there until his exchequer was exhausted, when he was compelled to lay aside his books and seek employment. Returning to McDonough, he accepted a proposition made by Col. L. T. Doyal, then one of the most distinguished lawyers in that circuit, and read law under him. His ambition and industry, and the wide scope and strong grasp of his mind were such that in the unparalleled short time of seven

weeks he mastered the principles of law and at the October term of court (1852, Judge James H. Stark presiding) he was admitted to the bar. Nov. 15th following he opened an office in Monticello, Jasper County, Georgia, only nineteen years old, a stranger among strangers, and imperfectly educated. Yet he succeeded. In 1858 he went to Jackson, Butts County, Georgia, and entered into partnership with Col. James R. Lyons and rose rapidly in his profession and in good opinion of the people. In 1860 he was elected ordinary over a strong and popular member of the dominant party, administering the office with unusual acceptability. Although opposed to secession, and by virtue of his office exempt from military service, in response to his patriotic impulse he enlisted as a private in the Thirtieth Georgia regiment and served as such seven months. On the re-organization of the regiment in 1862 he was elected major, and in December following was made lieutenant-colonel. His regiment served at Savannah, Charleston, Wilmington, Pocotaligo, and Jacksonville, and then in May, 1863, he was ordered to Jackson, Miss., and went through the arduous campaign in that State. During this campaign Col. Boynton won a high reputation for courage and ability, and in general orders issued by Gen. Walker, was specially mentioned for gallantry. His regiment was always where the battle raged the hottest and fiercest, and there Col. Boynton would be found, coolly and courageously leading and encouraging his men. In the battle of Chickamauga he lost forty-five per cent of his command in an hour and a half, Col. Mangum having been permanently disabled by wounds and retired, he was commissioned as colonel of the regiment, and shared the fortunes of the western army, participating in the battles of Chickamauga, Missionary Ridge, the continuous fights thence to Atlanta, and the battle around that city. Never did the Thirtieth Georgia go into action so long as he commanded it except under his intrepid leadership. While forty yards in front of his command, leading it in a charge at the battle near Decatur, Ga., July 22, 1864, he was stricken down and detained from his command until January 1865, when he a mere skeleton and just off crutches, joined it, but was unable to continue in active service. He suffered seriously from his wound many years after the war. In 1863 Col. Boynton removed his family to Griffin where, after the war, he resumed his law practice. In 1866 he was elected county judge and held the office until the court was abolished. From 1869 to 1872 he was mayor of Griffin, and then, for the next eight years he was devoted to his profession, quickly gaining a large and valuable clientele. In 1880 he was elected to represent the Twenty-sixth senatorial district in the general assembly, and was unanimously chosen president of the senate. This is believed to be the only instance where a member serving his first term has had so distinguished an honor conferred on him; and during a session of five months no appeal from a decision of his was sustained. In 1882 he was again elected to the senate, and again, unopposed, elected president. On the death of Gov. Stevens he was sworn in as governor by Chief Justice James Jackson, March 5th, 1883, and served until the

**election of Gov. McDaniel.** In November, 1886, he was appointed by Gov. McDaniel judge of the Flint circuit to fill a vacancy, and was afterward elected to fill the unexpired and succeeding full term, in each instance without opposition. In 1890 he was again elected for four years, this time over Hon. J. S. Pope. April 8, 1893, he resigned the judgeship and has since been actively engaged in the general practice of his profession, and as division council of the Central railroad of Georgia, embracing nine counties. October, 1896, he was elected to represent his county in the lower house of the General Assembly. During two sessions of that body he was recognized as one of the leaders in all important legislation. Judge Boynton was married Dec. 2nd, 1852, to Miss Fannie Loyall, by whom he had two sons, Jesse L.<sup>8</sup>, and Luther J.<sup>8</sup>. The estimable lady, by her cheerful and cheering devotion during his early struggles for recognition and distinction, proved to be a never-failing incentive and support to him. By her death in 1877, Judge Boynton sustained an irreparable loss. But sympathizing wisely companionship was a necessity, and on April 30, 1883, while Governor, he married Miss Susan T. Harris, daughter of James W. Harris of Walton County, Georgia. She is a lady of attractive manners and many accomplishments, and Judge Boynton was indeed fortunate in this marriage, realizing that ideal happiness which comes only with congenial companionship. Judge Boynton is an exemplary and influential member of the Missionary Baptist church. From whatever standpunkt viewed, a true and noble manhood is developed in the character of **JUDGE BOYNTON**. The sixteen year old boy, ambitious of military glory and fame, though thwarted then, ten years later proved on many a bloody battlefield, by his intrepid coolness, and courage seldom equaled, that it was no transitory boyish impulse, but the grander inspiration, that begot and fired the ambition. The nineteen-year-old, friendless and moneyless attorney has proved by his after success at the bar, in the halls of legislation, on the bench, and in the gubernatorial chair, that a strong and true self-reliant manhood was the deep and broad foundation on which **JAMES STODDARD BOYNTON** builded.

On August 19, 1885, he attended the "American Boynton Association," held in Worcester, Mass., and was unanimously chosen President of the Association.

"Job Boynton came from Mass. as early as 1780; walked the last 100 miles on snow shoes through the woods, and built the third house in Burlington. He, with his sons Jedediah, Elijah, John and Peter, built several vessels upon Lake Champlain between 1790 and 1815. Among them the "Burlington Packet," "Union," "Unetta," "President," and "Fair Trader"; the last two had just been launched at Essex, by Eggleston, and sailed to Burlington, when they were seized by MacDonough, while the Captains were at the Custom House getting the vessels registered, and taken to "Quaker Smith's Bay," in Shelburne, where with the "Eagle," which had been purchased by the Gov't., they were refitted into sloops of war. The "President" was MacDonough's flag ship the next year.

At the early age of nineteen he answered his Country's first call to suppress the late Rebellion, enlisting on April 22, 1861, again Sept. 1, 1861 for three years, and the third time on Jan. 1, 1863, as a Veteran Volunteer. He served with honor all through the war, never being captured or wounded, although three horses were shot from under him! He filled many places of greatest danger carrying dispatches through the mountains and valleys of Virginia and W. Virginia, which at that time were filled with Mosby's Bushwhackers. Often at night when so dark he could not see a foot from him he passed between the Union and Confederate pickets drawn up within a few yards of each other. One time when scouting they were ambushed, the

cowardly officer in command surrendered the guard, when H. B. Boynton, rather than surrender, leaped his horse over a precipice. He was followed by other brave spirits, then making a detour, they regained the mountain road and coming upon the 'Rebels' surprised and captured them, thus releasing their comrades. After the ever memorable Grand Review at Washington he was mustered out of service at Wheeling, W. Va. Returning home he entered college. After graduating he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Cook Hard, eldest daughter of William and Tryphena Hard, Dec. 21, 1867. She was a very beautiful woman and a noble Christian, having an unusually bright intellect. She was always affectionate and gentle, and well beloved by all her friends, which were legion. To this union seven children were given; all dying in infancy except Coren LeRoy<sup>8</sup>, b. April 16, 1871, and Elsie May<sup>9</sup>, b. April 11, 1877. Their mother died Sept. 13, 1883. They with their father then made their home with their Grand-parents (Mr. and Mrs. Hard.) H. B. Boynton died July 17, 1888. The children received their education, and both graduated in the public schools of Portsmouth, O. After graduating Coren L. attended the Ohio State University, expecting to become an electrical engineer, but getting emery in his eyes he was compelled to give up his chosen work. When quite young he learned the trade of nail making in his native village, and on the industry being abandoned there he worked at the trade in Providence, R. I., South Bridgewater, Mass., and lastly in Montreal, Canada. This industry of manufacturing nails now generally languishing, probably from over-production, he abandoned the trade permanently; taught school in his native village and vicinity for two years, and then went West, in Aug. 1861, for better opportunities to Brooklyn, Iowa. Near this place he taught school the first winter and on solicitations began the study of medicine. His studies were soon to be interrupted, as he could not longer resist his Country's calls, and enlisted as a private in the 28th Regiment, Iowa Vol. Inf. in August 1862. Shortly after enlistment he was appointed Hospital Steward of his regiment, which position he filled until his regiment was mustered out of service at the close of the war after three years arduous service. During his army service he felt imbued with the principle of human freedom. The father of this subject (Cyrus M.) was an American soldier of the war of 1812, between the United States and England. After his discharge from the army he returned to his native place in New York, and resumed the study of medicine and finally graduated from the Albany Medical College, Dec. 24, 1866. He opened his first office for the practice of his profession in the Spring of 1867, at La Porte City, Black Hawk Co., Iowa, where his older brother, (Flint S.) was engaged in the drug trade, and remained there until the summer of 1870—when he moved to Toledo, Tama County, Iowa, where he still resides, and was actively engaged in Medical practice until 1882, when, wearying of trying to forget boots and saddle, so he could sleep more soundly nights, he retired from active practice. The Doctor during his active practice was a member of the Iowa State Medical Society, and President of the Tama County Medical Society. Was United States Examining Surgeon for Pensions from 1872 to 1876—from 1889 to 1894, and is at this writing, Jan. 31, 1898, a member of the Pension Examining Board for his County. In the work of an examiner he takes a distinctive pleasure in being able to help deserving Veterans to secure their just dues. He also has served Tama County as County Physician, and as a member of the Board of Commissioners of Insanity. The Doctor, politically has always been a thorough Republican, but hardly enough of a politician. He was married Oct. 14, 1869, at La Porte City, Iowa, to Miss Ida Elwell, who was born in Ohio, coming with her parents to



He worked on the farm with his father until he was twenty-five years of age; then removed to Templeton, and engaged in the manufacture and sale of tin ware, until 1846. He represented Templeton in the State Legislature, but declined other public offices. After he retired from active business he removed to Athol, where he was the first president of the Miller's River Bank. "Mr. Boynton had long wished to do something for the cause of education. He was a man who had toiled in the work-shop. His wealth was the result of a life of industry and frugality. But, as it has happened in thousands of like cases, he was led by reflection upon his own limited opportunities for acquiring

knowledge in his youth, to think much of the needs of boys who cannot, or will not go to college he "wished to make the avails of his industry a permanent means of aiding the young in obtaining advantages and privileges in preparing for active life which had been beyond his reach;" therefore on May first 1865 he appropriated the sum of one hundred thousand dollars for the establishment of a School of Industrial Science, in the city of Worcester, which is called the "Worcester County Free Institute of Industrial Science." The income on the appropriation by the time the school was opened, amounted to \$26,469, which was to be devoted to the purchase of apparatus for the school. The instructions which accompanied his gift, state the "aim of this school shall ever be the instruction of youth in the branches of education not usually taught in the public schools, essential and best adapted to train the young for practical life, especially those intending to be mechanics, or manufacturers, or farmers." He also directs that the school should be free to all residents of Worcester County, and that scholars from abroad should be received at a moderate tuition." The principal building, which is properly called Boynton Hall, is located upon a beautiful and commanding eminence, embracing an area of about eight acres; it is one hundred and forty-six feet long, by sixty-one feet wide; the tower is eighty-five feet high. The external walls, are made of the common granite from Millston hill, than which it would be difficult to find a more beautiful and effective material for such use; its dark and variegated colors forming an agreeable contrast with the lighter shades of the Uxbridge granites of which the trimmings are made."

Mr. Boynton made no provision and no suggestion for his personal advantage or distinction, or for the honor of his name. No grain of selfishness tarnished the beauty of his noble benefaction. After giving to his relatives such donations as he judged proper and sufficient, he transferred the one hundred thousand dollars before mentioned. He reserved for himself a small amount of property, sufficient for his frugal habits and simple tastes in the residue of his life. Several years before (in 1856) he gave, in his peculiar, quiet manner, ten thousand dollars for public schools in Mason, N. H., the place of his nativity.

Albert Grenville <sup>8</sup>, was born March 31st, 1837, at Bangor, Maine, and educated in the schools of that city, fitting for entrance as sophomore at Bowdoin College in the Bangor High School, then conducted by David Worcester, a brother of the lexicographer. His health failing he abandoned the idea of a college course and went to Montreal, Can., with an uncle, where he engaged in manufacturing building, among other things, the first collier dam used in the construction of the Victoria Bridge at Montreal. His leisure hours were devoted to the study of the law under the direction of a prominent law firm in Montreal. In 1859 his health being restored he went west intending to go to Chicago, but finding friends in Detroit, Michigan, he concluded to make his home there, and entered the law office of E. M. & O. B. Wilcox as a student. He was admitted to the bar in November 1859, and entered at once upon its practice, which he followed for eleven years, a part of the time in partnership with his preceptors the Messrs. Wilcox, one of whom, General O. B. Wilcox served with great distinction throughout the war of the Rebellion.

In 1869, Mr. Boynton was elected Police Justice of the City without opposition, and served in that capacity until August 1872, when he resigned to take the editorship of the Detroit Free Press, on the staff of which he had been since September 1869. His connection with the Free Press has been maintained since the date given and during most of the time he has been Vice-President of the Free Press Company.

With the exception of the Police Justiceship referred to, and a short term as assistant City-Attorney, Mr. Boynton has never had any political office, but was for one term President of the Detroit Young Men's Society, one of the foremost literary and library associations in the west in its time. He is a member of the Veteran Corps of the Detroit Light Guard, and now (1897) President of that organization for the second term. He is also a director in the Home Savings Bank, and Chairman of the Executive Committee, and a member of the Detroit Club, the Fellowcraft Club, and the Detroit and Lake St. Clair Fishing and Shooting Club.


In May 1862 Mr. Boynton married Frances Gertrude Patten, of New Brunswick, who is still living. He has four children living (two have joined the majority) of whom the three eldest are girls, and married. The youngest, a boy, is still unmarried. He has four grand-children, two girls and two boys, all of them belonging on the side of his mother to the fifth living generation. The two eldest children were also of the fifth living generation when born, as was Mr. Boynton himself. Since the above was written, Mr. Boynton has passed on to the majority, dying at the Alma Michigan Sanitarium, on Jan. 9, 1898.



Historical Society; member of the Maine Historical Society; the Historical Society of Pennsylvania; the Historical Society of New Hampshire; the Society of Colonial Wars; the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution; an honorary member of the Society of the Cincinnati; also an honorary member of the Grand Army of the Republic; and Lt. Colonel and A. D. C., National Guard of the State of Maine. He is an Episcopalian, being Senior Warden of St. Andrews church at New Castle; Trustee of Diocesan Funds; member of the Episcopal Club of Maine, etc., etc. He is a son of the late respected William T. Glidden, Esq., of New Castle, said William being a son of Sarah Boynton Shove, dau. of Jane Boynton, who was a dau. of William.

Colonel Glidden is descended in the 8th generation from Charles Glidden who came from Glidden, England (Hampshire) in 1656, and settled in Rockingham County, New Hampshire, where the family remained a hundred years (and where a branch now reside.) Colonel Glidden's ancestors served in the Colonial Wars at Louisburg and Ticonderoga, and in Canada; in the War of the Revolution, at Bunker Hill and Saratoga. His grandfather, Colonel John Glidden, served in the war of 1812, and was Colonel of the 2nd Maine Regiment until 1822.

One of his ancestors was the famous Reverend Robert Jordan, of Richmonds Island, Cape Elizabeth, Maine, born in 1598, a graduate of Balliol College, Oxford, who in 1640, by his marriage with Sarah, dau. of John Winter, became one of the largest landed proprietors of New England; and who was twice imprisoned in Boston by the Puritans of Massachusetts for baptising infants according to the ritual and practice of the Church of England. Colonel Glidden married, October 1869, Anna Warren, daughter of the Hon. Joseph Mabbatt Warren, of Troy, N. Y., by whom he has eight children.

Mrs. Glidden is a Colonial Dame by right of descent from one of the Colonial Governors of Connecticut. Arthur Boynton<sup>9</sup> Glidden is the fourth son of the above."

A party of Indians lurked in a barn near their place of labor, and as soon as the men had scattered in the prosecution of their toil, they were fired upon. Boynton unharmed, fled and sought conceal-

ment under a log covered with a brush heap. While thus hid from view, his dog, attracted to the spot by the scent of his master's body, stood over the place of his concealment, whining. The circumstance discovered his master's retreat to those who sought his blood, and Boynton was tomahawked!\*



Without a word she snatched his revolver from the table and stepped out upon a balcony just in time to face the soldiers as they were marching up the walk, for the purpose of tearing down the flag. She shouted 'death to the man that dares touch that flag.' They were then commanded to halt by their leader, followed immediately by a retreat, and the flag was left undisturbed from that time on. The workmen in

Colt's Armory sent her a lovely revolver, in an elegant case, appropriately engraved, in recognition of her bravery." "In 1869, Dr. Boynton was appointed by Grant, Pension Agent at Knoxville, which office he held until 1883. During this time he was responsible for many millions of dollars of public money, every dollar of which was accounted for, and his record is clean. Among the families we have thus far been unable to connect with the emigrants, William and John Boynton, is that of John Boyington of Wiscasset, Me., and his wife Temperance Hogdon, of Newington, N. H. We think he was a descendant of William, through Caleb of York and Wiscasset, but lacking the proof, will begin this series with the records as sent.

"Charles Brandon Boynton, D. D., was born in Berkshire Co., Mass., in 1806, and studied at Stockbridge Academy and Williams College, receiving the degree of A. M., there in 1839. He began life as a business man and was president of the first railroad in Berkshire Co., was a justice of the peace and a member of the legislature. While pursuing the study of law he became interested in religion, changed his plans, and began preaching at Housatonic in the autumn of 1840. In 1844 he was settled over the Presbyterian church in Lansingburg, N. Y., and in 1846 became pastor of the 6th St. Presbyterian church in Cincinnati. In 1857, he preached in Pittsfield, but went back to Cincinnati the next year. In 1865, he resigned that pastorate and sought recuperation from ill-health on a farm in Maryland. In the Autumn of that year he took charge of the newly formed Congregational church in Washington, D. C., and was a professor in the Naval Academy, and chaplain of the House of Representatives during the 39th and 40th Congresses. He ceased preaching altogether, for considerations of health, in 1877. Among other publications, his chief work was "A History of the American Navy During the Rebellion." He received the degree of D. D. from Marietta College in 1859. He died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. H. H. Lockwood, in Cincinnati, Apr. 27, 1883.

When the war of 1812 broke out, a Militia Company was formed at Machias, Me., which should be ready at a minute's notice to obey any command of the Captain. Stephen was one of the company, and he received a land grant for services rendered. The war caused a season of extraordinary scarcity so that the inhabitants of Machias were pressed for the bare necessities of life, in consequence of which he went to St. John's, N. B., to get work, and escape the hard times; he remained there until about 1820, when he returned to his old home. He died about 1876.



Benjamin<sup>5</sup> Boynton was born in Andover, Mass., July 18, 1817, being the eldest child of Benjamin and Belinda (Pearson) Boynton, and the 6th generation from William, one of the first settlers in this country. His great-grandfather, Benjamin Ames, was Captain of one of the Andover companies that fought at Bunker Hill, and his grand-father, Thomas Boynton, was a sergeant in the same company. He received a common school education, and in early life learned the shoemaker's trade. He devoted a part of his life to the manufacture of shoes, and a part to agricultural pursuits.

He was married, May 20th, 1851, to Sarah Bardwell Richards, of Oxford, Mass. She was born in India, her parents, James Richards, and Sarah Bardwell Richards, being among the first missionaries sent to that country. They had two children, Louisa<sup>6</sup>, who died in childhood, and Clara Richards<sup>6</sup>, still living; she is a teacher.

Benjamin Boynton was noted for his honesty and integrity, and had the confidence of his fellow townsmen to such a

# The Connecticut Branch or Boingtons and Byingtons.

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Referring to No 10, on page 8. The fact has not yet been established, but it seems credible, that the numerous Byington families in Branford, Ct., descended from John<sup>3</sup> Boynton, who was bapt. in Newbury, Mass., Apr. 19, 1676. He was probably the John in Branford, who married Jane Swain, therefore we will continue the generations from them. The names are copied as written on the Branford Church records of membership and marriages.

Jane Boington, who joined the church in 1708, was probably the wife of John. Mary Boington joined in Feb., 1710; Robert Boyington joined in 1715; Daniel Boington joined in Sept. 1718. These were undoubtedly children of John<sup>3</sup> and Jane, and as John Jr. was married in 1735, he was evidently the first son. There was also a Jonathan, a David and a Daniel, whose ages indicate they belonged to the same family.

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

Her father, Major Randall McDonald, a tall, dignified and "stately man of few words," was said to bear a strong resemblance to General Washington, and like him "his word was law."

As Mary, the oldest of three daughters, early showed a remarkable thirst for knowledge, reading and studying carefully the few books within her reach, she became the pupil of the minister of the parish, who gave her instruction in branches not then taught in the schools, and kindly allowed her the use of his library. At the age of sixteen, she became a teacher, and for many years, while instructing others was constantly adding to her own attainments, and fitting herself for the higher duties of life; so, when in after years the education of three boys, and three girls became the problem for her to solve, she was equal to the occasion.

Industrious, frugal, energetic, self-denying, prayerful, with small means and many privations, all were sent to school, neatly clad, provided with books, etc., Two boys were sent to Dartmouth College and two girls to the best female seminaries of the time, all of whom subsequently became successful teachers.

She was symmetrically developed, physically, mentally, and spiritually; worked hard but never worried. "It is all for the best." "The darkest day, live till tomorrow, will have passed away." "Not my will but Thine be done." Such were some of her favorite expressions, and in this spirit of "charity for all, and malice towards none" she won many friends, and left no enemies behind. To this unwavering faith, courage, fortitude, and a serene cheerfulness that enabled her to surmount every trial and affliction, we must attribute her long and useful life. She kept up her correspondence almost to the last, and on her one hundred and first anniversary wrote her autograph for several of her visitors. She died in Pepperell, April 14, 1882, aged one hundred and one years, seven months and four days.

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
