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


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

TO THE READER.

THE name Youghal is derived from two Irish words—Eo, which signifies a yew-tree, and Caille, a wood. It is situated on the west side of the harbour of that name, where the River Avonmore, or Broadwater, now the Blackwater, discharges itself into the sea, and divides the County Cork from that of Waterford. This river was anciently called Nemh (Ussher Primord., p. 493). (Niamh, in Irish, brightness.) The geological formation on both sides of the river is the same—viz., from Rencrew Bridge to the sea, upper old red sandstone, carboniferous slate, and carboniferous limestone. The strand of the western shore sometimes presents a curious appearance at low water, when the fine sand of which it is composed, disturbed by the action of the wind and waves, exposes the remains of the trunks and branches of a submerged forest. The low cliffs of the harbour are of marly clay, the navigation being rendered dangerous by a bar, which partly crosses it, composed of sand, concreted by carbonate of lime, held in solution by the waters of the streams which flow into it.

According to the "Annals of the Four Masters," the Danes entrenched themselves here about the middle of the ninth century, and a victory was gained over the fleet of Eochaill by the Deisi, and the fortress was

numerous applications made by Lord Inchiquin to the Mayor, for to support the army, must have pressed heavily on the inhabitants, whose continual remonstrance against such exactions was always unheeded. Some interesting letters to O. Cromwell, and his reply, will be found recorded here. The present Council Books are marked Folio A, Folio C, Folio D. Folio B is wanting.

In the commencement of Folio A are copies of a series of oaths, to be taken by the different Corporate Officers—viz., the Constable's, Attorney's, Freeman's, Sergeant's, Sword-bearer's, Porter's, Bayliff's, Mayor's, Recorder's, Grand Juror's. All these are very similar; and it is curious to observe the cancellings and interlineations that occur, according to the exigencies of the times. For instance, in the Constable's oath—"You shall swear to be faithful and true to our most dread Sovereign Lord, Charles by the Grace of God King of England, Scotland, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, and to his heirs and successors," &c. This is cancelled, and these words substituted—"His Highnes the Lord President, the State and Parliament of England." In the Freeman's oath, for the same loyal declaration we have—"To the Keeper of the liberties of England, by authority of the State and Parliament of England." For the word "King" is substituted "State," &c.

The Appendices will consist, 1stly, of a very full abstract which I made of the "Letter Book of Ld. Broghill, Gov. of Youghal, 1644—1649." This will form a valuable supplement to the accounts of the military occupation of Youghal. The summonses to the governors of the neighbouring

castles to surrender, issued by Lord Castle-Haven-Audly, are peremptory in the extreme. This MS is preserved in the Library of the British Museum, Add. 25287. The following mems. occur on the fly-leaf: "I bought this booke and another manuscript copy of Lett¹³. of ye same subjects out of ye Library of ye late Duke of Chandois. H. St. J."; and "This booke was delivered to me at Dublin by Mr. Joshua Boyle, Decemb. 1, 1655. T. L. J." Joshua Boyle was Recorder of Youghal in 1641.

2ndly. The Depositions of the adherents of Cromwell. These I transcribed from the originals in the Carte MSS. in the Bodleian Library, Oxford; they relate the measures taken to secure the town for the Parliament, and a full list of the names of those who were concerned in that undertaking.

3rdly. A Catalogue of the lands from which the Fitz-Geralds, Seneschals of Imokilly, seem to have been entitled to Feudal Services or Chiefries; part seems to have been taken from the finding of an Inquisition.

It is a transcript of a Parchment Roll, formerly in the custody of the Registrar of the Diocese of Cloyne. The original is 14 ft. 3 in. long, by 10½ in. broad, and consists of seven membranes stitched together. It is written in double columns.

The following narrative pedigree of this branch of the Fitz-Geralds is copied from the original MS., which was formerly preserved in the Registry of Cloyne:

"Richard fz. Morris, sonne to the Knight of Kerry, was the first man that ever came to the barony of Imokilly of the fitz Geralds, which Richard had to issue six sonnes—viz., Morris fz. R., the heir of Ballintier; Edmond fz. R., the heir of Curueveigh; Gerald fz. R., the Bishop of Cloyne; Garrett fz. R., the heir of Ballmctample; James fz. R., the heir of Ballynmullyn; and William fz. R., the heir of Incheyney-Crenagh, which Bishop gave Garrett, as I have credibly reported, Balliregane and Ardemullyne in his own life time, and after his death left him Kilbalerey, which he held in his possession during his life; which land

of Kilbalerey, Balliregane, Ardemullyne, and Crosscastle, with other mess., were after the death of the Bishop enjoyed by Garrett fz. R., his brother; and after the death of Garrett, his son Morris enjoyed those lands; and after the death of Morris, his sons Garrett and Richard, which is he in whose name the fee farm was passed; and Morris oge enjoyed those lands until old Sr. John's time, who did thrust out Richard's children after his death, being sole heir, for his elder brother Garrett died without issue; but Morris oge held the fourth part of Ballyregane and Ballytample, and his sonne after him James fz. M. enjoyed it. Gerald fz. R. never enjoyed a foot, nor his son Richard, who now lives. The aforesaid Bishop gave to his other brother, James fz. R., Ballymullyne, Carrige Cotter, two South Collmans and Barneynebrough, which he and his ancestors enjoyed until he was thrust out by ould Sr. John.

"After the death of the Bishop, his brother's son, John fz. M., was Bishop of Cloyne, son to Morris of Ballyntier, who likewise gave Ardenslanleynelisse and Cilbrey to his brothers, which they enjoy since. Balleynoe and Ballylawrlice was also rented by Richard fz. G., for a grote an acer, which Richard was son of Garrett of Ballintample; after the death of the said Bishop, came in as Dean of Cloyne Edmond fz. James fz. William, of Incheneycrenagh, which James was the third sonn of William fz. Richard, as is set down in the beginning of this writing; and after the death of sonne Edmond, his son Sr. John fz. Edmond came in as Dean of Cloyne, who likewise enjoyed the Bishop's land as his father Edmond did; and now this Sr. John doth likewise enjoy them. The lands of Balleygarney are held from the Bishops for four pence per acer, which land contains four score acre; and the better to manifest that it is Bishop's land, there stood a small church, in remembrance of some that are alive that did see part of it standing."

4thly. An account of the Burgage lands of Cloyne, alluded to at the end of the previous Roll. This MS. was also in the custody of the Registrar of the Diocese of Cloyne, and both it and the Roll are the work of the Fitz-Geralds, who seem to have been very jealous of their territorial rights in Imokilly.

5thly. Abstracts from a series of original letters from the Lord President to the Mayor, preserved in the Corporation chest.

6thly. Extracts from one of the volumes of the Records of the Privy

Council during the Protectorate, in the Public Record Office, London. They are labelled "Council of State constituted by Act of Parliament, Feb., 1649." The items are generally short, and contain a continuous record of the most important events of the year. The matters relating to both kingdoms are so blended together, that it would be difficult to separate them without breaking the thread of the narrative. King Charles was executed Jan. 30, and these minutes commence die lunce, Feb. 26; and as this was the year that Cromwell spent part of in Ireland, they will give a fair idea of what was going on in the secret council of the nation. Although they contain but few allusions to Youghal, yet their general interest may be a sufficient apology for being introduced here. My attention was called to them by my kind friend Mr. Hans C. Hamilton, F.S.A.

7thly. A list of the Sovereigns, Mayors, and Bayliffs of the Town of Youghal. For this very accurate list I am indebted to the Rev. Samuel Hayman, M.A., the zealous and accomplished historian of Youghal. To the same gentleman I am under obligation for the ancient map of Youghal, as well as for the loan of the beautiful woodcuts from which the seals, &c., have been taken, and which add so much interest to the present volume.

As there is frequent mention in the Council Book of the "Chantry Lands," the following finding of an Inquisition, dated 21 May, 31 Hen. VIII., Brit. Mus. Eg. 1776, will be sufficient to explain the nature and extent of these lands:

"Chantry, Youghall.—In the south wing of the Collegiate Church in this town was the chappel of S. Savior; and an inquis., 20 May, 27 Eliz., finds that John Bennet, called Bishop Bennet, being seized in fee to him and his heirs of a mess. in this town, called Bennet's great house, near the gate, on the north side of the town, of the annual value of 6d., Irish money, besides reprises; and of a toft adjoining the said mes., which toft runs from that mess. on the N. to the lands called Uniack's lands on the S., and from the town wall on the E. to the street called the Common Street on the W., and is of the añ val., besides

reprises, of 4d. Irish. Also another toft, adjoining said toft, and stretching from Uniack's land on the N. to Coppinger's land on the S., and from the town wall on the E. to the saïcl street on the W. of the town, and is of añ. val., besides reprises, of 4d. Irish. Also a large garden without the town walls, and not far from the north gate, Funning from the Abbey Lane on the N. to the street on the S. called the Common Lane, and from the highway on E. to the land called Galvin's on the W., and is of the an. val., besides reprises, of 4d. Also another garden in the Church Lane, stretching from said lane on the N. to Uniack's Lane on S., and from the land lately the Earl of Desmond's on the E. to the College lands on W., and is of the an. val., besides reprises, of 4d. Also a garden and a toft on the N. of said Church Lane, stretching on the N. from Collyn's land to the land of the church on the W., and from Patrick Walshe's land on the E to the said land of the Earl of Desmond on W., and is of the an. val., besides reprises, of 4d. Also a mess., called Morrisse's House, with a small mess. annexed thereto, stretching from Arthur's lands in the N. to Liston's land in S., and from the town wall on E. to the Common Street of the town on the S, and is of the an. val., besides reprises, of 2s. Also 2 mess. near the Key Lane, which stretch from said Key Lane on the N. to the land called Annia's land on the S., and from the town wall on the E. to the street called the Common Street, and is of the an. val., besides reprises, of 2s. And also a park or close lying between the hospital for sick poor and the land called Collyn's Park, and is of the an. val., besides reprises, of 4d. And the said John Bennet, being seized of the said mess., &c., did long after the Statute of Mortmain, and without obtaining the royal licence, enfeoff Walter Monvill, chaplain, and his heirs, to hold the same for the support of the chaplains of the Chantry of S. Saviour or of the Holy Trinity, adjoining the Collegiate Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and their successors, to celebrate therein the holy offices for ever, the said feoffment being in these words: 'Know all men, that I, Mr. Walter Monvill, of the town of Youghal, chaplain, have given, granted, and by these presents have confirmed, to the Chantry and the Chaplains of the Chapel of St. Saviour, adjoining the Collegiate Church, &c., all the mess., &c., which I enjoy by the enfeofment of Mr. John Bennet, &c., to have and hold all the said mess., to keep one chaplain to serve in the said Chapel, &c., for ever, in the usual and accustomed manner; and I, the said Walter Monvill, will warrant and support the aforesaid grant for ever. In testimony whereof, as the seal of —— is unknown, I have hereunto affixed the seal of the Mayor of Youghal. Dated at Youghal, 24th May, 31 Hen. VIII.' Note.—The said Premises were formerly held from the Earl of Desmond.

"Inqs. 10 Sep., 20 Eliz., finds that John Welsh, long after the Statute of Mortmain, endowed this Chantry with sundry lands, to the añ. val. of 6s, Irish money.—(Chief Rem.)"

An abstract of the particulars in all the Charters granted to the Town is also given, from the Murage Grant, dated at Westminster, 24 June, 1275, to that conferring on Youghal a staple of wool, 15 Jac. I. Several of these Charters are still preserved in the Corporation chest; the others are from the copies entered on the Patent Rolls.

The Annals will consist of a series of documents, which have been compiled from Public Records. In the Inquisition dated 1288, we learn who the inhabitants of Youghal at that early period were. Amongst the Betagii (in Irish, Biadtac signifies a grazier, or farmer, from biath, food), who in Imokilly seem to have been serfs of the Bishop, of Cloyne, we have "O Cunnys, O Kenachis, O Molondonys, O Glassmys." The services of these men are fully stated in the "Rotulus Pipæ Clonensis."—(inter alia). "Their lord (the Bishop) can take possession of their sons and daughters in all places, seize and sell their goods; they cannot make wills without his permission; they are to mow and carry away his hay; if they possess five or six hogs, they are bound to give him one, viz., the third best; and dying, they shall give as a heriot the best beast which each may have, or in lieu thereof the best robe" (p. 8).

The Betages amongst the native Irish appear from the Annals (Four Mast., sub anno 1225) to have been men entrusted with some authority, and held in respect. But within the English pale they were a very inferior class, corresponding to the English villani; this was confirmed by Stat. 5 Edw. III., which says that, "One and the same law shall be as well towards the Irish as the English, except the servitude of the Betaghes to their lords; this to be as in England with respect to villains." The quantity of land they enjoyed was called a Ballybetagh.

The principal inhabitants seem, however, to have sprung from other nationalities, as is evident from their names. We have Reginald, the Dane; Corgene, the Welshman; Gilbert, do.; John Penrys, Rys Maddock, Robert de Mareys, Nicholas de Inteberg; Tankard, son of Hugh; Jordan de Excetre, and Maurice Ercedekene, of an ancient Cornish family. "In 1302, Maurice, William, and Silvester de Ercedekene, probably sons of Stephen, are severally described as amongst the Fideles of Ireland."—(Maclean: Par. and Fam. Hist. of the Deanery of Trigg Minor, part viii. p. 253). Youghal was manifestly at this time an Anglo-Norman town, and the followers of Strongbow had firm possession of it.

In the Inquisition held 14 Edw. II., there is an interesting description of the domestic arrangements of the Castle of Inchiquin. It consisted of a "round tower, built of stone, besides a mansion house; and near the tower a court constructed of wood, new, with two chambers and a kitchen, also of wood, covered with straw, and a wooden bake house, with an oven, uncovered." This account agrees with the remains of the tower which still exist; the walls are of considerable thickness, about 30 feet in height, and 33 in diameter. It is about four miles S.W. of Youghal; the town land now contains 409 acres. In Irish, Inch-o-cuinn signifies "the island of Conn (or) & Quinn."

The following roll of the soldiers' names, horse and foot, and the nature of the arms with which they defended the Castles of Buttevant, Anagh, Castlelions—or Castle O Lethan, which, after the English invasion, belonged first to Fitz Stephen, and passed to him from Barry—Barry's-Court, Robarstone, and Dungorny (the last in the barony of Imokilly), is from the original in the Public Record Office, London. It was taken, Sep. 1598, by David Fitz James Barry, Viscount Buttevant, a man remarkable for his fidelity to the Crown, and one of the Council of the Lord President. He assisted at the siege of Kinsale, and performed other distinguished

services. The Castle of Barry's-Court was one of the principal fortified places between Youghal and Cork. The keep is at present in good condition, and contains a massive chimney-piece, set up by this nobleman, and inscribed "A.DO.1588.IHS.D.B.ET.E.R.ME.FIER.FECERVT." His wife was Ellen Roch, daughter of David Viscount Fermoy. All these castles had extensive outworks, the traces of which are in some cases still very perfect.

At pp. 373—6 (Council Book) are two Proclamations from the lately created Lo.-Lieut. Richard Talbot, Earl Tyrconnel, 8 March, 1686. In the first of these he severely reprimands those who from their Pulpits have aspersed the character of his Sacred Majesty, and charges all persons against using undutiful and irreverend expressions against the Government. In the second, he recommends the officers to pay their debts, and condemns in the strongest terms drinking, swearing, and other evil habits. As this nobleman acted a very prominent part in Ireland at the time, and much has been written about his history and personal character, it may not be out of place to introduce here the inventory of his effects, as those of an Irish Viceroy of the period, which were transported from London to Dublin, duty free, in Jan, 1686. The original is in the Public Record Office, London (Irish Book, 4):

- "My Lord and Gent. By order of the Lords Comrs. of his Majys. Treasury, I send you the enclosed list of goods belonging to the Rt. Hom. the Earle of Tyrconnell. And their Lordships desire you to give order to the officers of the Customes att Dublin to permit the said goods to be there imported custom free. I am, &c. H. Guy, Tre. Chamberlⁿ. 8 Jan. 1686.
 - "A particular of goods shipped for the Earl of Tyrconnell's use, on the Betty, of London, Charles Summers, Mar., bound for Dublin, Jan. 6, 1686:


The large quantity of the brass or gun money then in circulation in the country, may be inferred from the statement of Jane Langdon, 21 Oct. 1690, who complains "that for the last six months she received nothing but brass money out of the Ferry." This money, struck from guns and all kinds of old brass was minted at Dublin in 1689. The Proclamation was dated 18 June that year. With this kind of coin the soldiers were paid, and all tradesmen were compelled to receive it for their goods and debts. It is usually called the Gun money of King James. At the same time a project was set on foot to coin pieces of pewter, which were to pass current for a crown. But the departure of the King put an end to the further issue of these counterfeits.

In the first quarter of the last century, Youghal, from the Excise accounts, seems to have had a flourishing home and foreign trade. The principal ports of England and Wales supplied this town with the products of their different industries. Portugal sent wine, oil, and olives; Spain, iron, lemons, oranges, shumack; France, silk, salt, spirits, vinegar; Amsterdam, paper; Flanders, bark, tapestry and silk; Rotterdam, cider, coffee-mills, corn-powder, earthenware; Bremen, iron, oak-boards, and Rhenish window-glass; Norway, balks and deals; Drontheim, oars, spars masts, &c. Articles of luxury were imported in abundance; amongst other articles of fashion, we have "ivory combs, fans, head-rolls, masks, and papers of patches."-(Customs Book.) These black patches, used after a whimsical fashion to ornament, as was supposed, ladies' faces, were cut into grotesque forms, such as a coach and horses, owls, rings, suns, moons, crosses, &c. They were said to have been invented in England in the reign of Edward VI. In the Midsummer quarter of 1722, the duty on tea imported into Youghal amounted to 1s., that on wine to £145 8s. 10d.

Two buildings remain to be noticed, viz., "The College of Youghal," and "Sir Walter Raleigh's House."

The engraving here represents the College in 1681, when Dinely, in his Tour in Ireland, describes the edifice as having "two Courts, with a Fountain in one of them, fair Rooms with well-wrought ancient chimney-pieces. Its Garden is extream pleasant, being on the side of the mountaine, overlooking the whole town, Colledg and Harbour, with walks one above another, which Nature itself hath contributed much to, and stone stepps of Ascent to each. The uppermost walk hath also a spring at the end thereof, which it is sayd the Earle of Cork intended to supply fountaines with below, to form delightful throws of water." It was founded by Thomas,

eight (called *The Great*) Earl of Desmond, Lord Deputy of Ireland, and proprietor of Youghal, 27 Dec. 1464.



The Wardens, or Sir Walter Raleigh's House, is probably one of the most unique specimens of Elizabethan architecture in Ireland. It was in its mansion that Sir Walter is said to have resided during the years 1588—9, when he filled the office of Chief Magistrate of the Town; and here, in the latter year, he is said to have entertained Edmond Spenser, the Poet, previous to their embarking together from Youghal to England, to superintend the publication of the first three books of the "Faërie Queene," (Hayman). The magnificent wainscotting of Irish oak, with its rich carving, in the highest style of the art of the period; its elaborately carved mantelpiece, with its cornice resting upon figures of Faith, Hope, and Charity, and numerous other emblematical devices, whilst its luxurious

myrtle grove, as well as being the spot where the first potato, when brought from Virginia, was planted in Ireland, gives the place a peculiar historic interest.

The vicissitudes of this venerable mansion-house are many, and bear veritable witness to the conservative spirit of the several owners from time to time. After passing through the hands of Sir Walter Raleigh, it came into the possession of the Earl of Cork, from whom it was rented for a residence in 1616, by Sir Laurence Parsons, Knt., Attorney General



for the province of Munster, and Recorder of Youghal. In 1661, Jan. 17, Laurence Parsons, Esq., of Birr, in the King's County, grandson of Sir Laurence, conveyed for £135 the stone house, and malt house, &c., and the walls encompassing same, to Robert Hedges of Beacanstown, co. Kildare, Esq., for 1000 years, at a peppercorn yearly, with the rent reserved to the Earl of Cork, being a new Almanack yearly. On 24 Feb., 1670, William, afterwards Sir William Hedges, son of the above-mentioned Robert, sold the house for £340 to John Atkin, of Youghal, who, by will dated 20 Oct., 1705, demised the house to his grandson, John Hayman, M.P. for Youghal, in the possession of which family it continued until the death of Walter

Atkin Hayman, Esq., 5 June, 1816. It subsequently came into the hands of Mr. J. W. Pim, from whom the fee simple was purchased by H. E. Governor Pope Hennessy, K.B., now Governor of Hong Kong, whose estate it is.

For the use of these beautiful woodcuts I am also indebted to the Rev. Samuel Hayman, M.A., as well as for the perusal of the Cook MSS. and other valuable documents relative to Youghal, in his possession.

I cannot close these remarks without tendering my very best thanks to the gentlemen in the Reading Room of the Library of the British Museum, for the uniform courtesy I have received from them during my periodical visits for many years, and to whose kindness and readiness on all occasions I owe much that I have done towards editing from time to time many unpublished records relating to the history of the County and City of Cork.

48 EDW. III. 24 Jan. 1373-4. "Edward, &c. Considering why the Town of Yoghill and parts adjacent, through divers our rebels of the co. Cork, continually spoiling and slaying our lieges there, stand much impoverished, &c., have granted to the Sovereign, &c., by our Sheriffs, that they shall on no account be compelled to pay subsidies, or find horsemen or footmen, called 'kernes,' unless they consent; nor shall they attend along with the other men of the said county in the marches of said county, for defence of same, against their will; nor burdened by summonses; but they be bound to pay the subsidies granted to us in aid of our wars, and likewise cause to be defended the said Town against the malice of our enemies," &c.

49 EDW. III., 26 Jan. 1374-5. "The King to the Sovereign, &c., gives liberty to collect custom, as well by land as by water, in aid of the murage, pavage, &c., of the Town, until the end of ten years." [Then comes a list of the Tolls granted in the Charter 31 Edw. III.] "&c. So that at the end of every year

the money by you therefrom received, you render a faithful account before the Bishop of Cloyne, the Dean of the Cathedral Church of Cloyne, and the parson of aforesaid Church, and they shall transmit the said account to the Treasurer and Barons of our Exchequer of Ireland." Witness, William de Wyndesore, at Dublin, 26 Jan.

49 EDW. III. For the Sovereign, Merchants, &c. of Youghill. "The King to same. The Sovereign, &c., have shown us by their petⁿ. grievously complaining that although they have not hitherto laden any merchandize customable to our staple in any ships within the port, beyond the amount of one last of hides, yet they are daily compelled to come to our City of Cork, with the said ships, then to pay our customs due of the said hides, by the Mayor, &c., of said City, as well as the danger of the loss of our customs, through the casualties of the sea. We, considering the damage, &c., have ordained, that all customs due to us of wool and wool-fells, &c., laden in said Town, shall be paid to the Collector of our Customs in the ports of Cork, Lymerick, and Waterford, in the port of Youghill. Willing also that our seal, which is called Coket, may be had in same Town, one part to remain in the custody of the collector, the other part in that of the comptroller, assigned by us there, on the part of same Town, the letters of acquittance they may make under said seal from time to time."

3 Rich. II. 12 May, 1380. An Inspeximus of the Charter of 48 Edw. III. (Rot. Pat. pars. 3, mem. 16.) "Ratifying the aforesaid letters to the Sovereign, &c., so far as the end of fifteen years next following, &c."

Rot. Pat. 2, Hen. V. mentions an Inspeximus of a grant of customs made by his grandfather Edw., 49 year of his reign.

22 Rich. II. 9 May, 1399. "The King grants to Thomas Chambre the offices of Searcher and Water-Bailiff in the ports of Corke, Yoghle, Kynsale, Lep's ilond, and Dengle, and the Office of Chief Sergeant within said County, to have the fees, &c., provided these offices are not occupied by any one else, in virtue of a grant from us, unless by those who are rebels."

5 HENRY IV. 12 May, 1404. Henry, &c. "The Town of Youghill is on all sides surrounded by Rebels, who daily destroy said Town, and same is partly burned, so that our subjects dare not go outside the said Town without a strong guard. We, for their relief, have granted that the said Sovereign, &c., may treat with any English as well as Irish malefactors adjacent to the Town, and traffic for victuals and merchandize, and may retain in said town able men, as well English as Irish, horse and foot, although outlawed in our Courts, and that for all sums of money to our liege subjects due, arrest the debtors of such, and compel payment, and that the said Sovereign shall not be destrained by Sheriffs, &c., or by their mandates, except during the time that our Lieutenant, Chancellor, or Treasurer shall be present in the county, and by our special writs, and that the said Sovereign, &c., shall pass with their goods, &c., to whatsoever ports, being at amity with us they shall think proper, and that the Sheriffs, &c., shall not intrude within the bounds of said Town, but send their mandates to the Provosts and Ministers of the Town for executio n," &c. Witness, James le Botiller, Earl of Ormond, &c.

HEN. V. 3 Feb., 1414-15. Henry, &c., to the Sovereign, &c., of Y. (recites idw. III. and list of Tolls, also the Grant of 20 Rich. II. for customs for age, pavage, &c.).

HEN. VI. 4 Nov. 1431. Henry, &c., "grants to the Sovereign, &c., to collect custom and coket of all things customable to us for forty years for the repair he walls of the Town, and to have full power and cognizance of all pleas in said Town and liberty by Fresh Force, viz., within forty days, to be in after any one shall be ejected from his free tenement in the Town and erty, as well trespasses, debts, &c., also executions of the judgments of such s to be made within the Town, &c.; and that the Sovereign may intermeddle Regrators and Forestallers of victuals, &c., and if convicted committed to prison of the Town; and that no Foreign Merchant shall come to the Town i iron, salt, and wines except by license of the Sovereign, &c., or keep a Wine rn; and that they may exercise the assize of Bread and Ale, of measures, thts, &c., appertaining to the Office of the Clerk of the Market, and may punish sgressors of same; and they may have cognizance to do all that belongs to office of Escheator, or Admiral within the Town; and that all profits issuing the offices of Clerk of the Market, Escheator, and Admiral, shall be for the of the Town."

RICH. III. 17 May, 1485. Richard, &c. "We grant, &c., that all inhabiting admitted to the freedom of the Town shall annually on the Friday before festival of S. Mathew the Apostle, assemble in the Court to elect a Mayor two Bailiffs to have rule of the Burgesses, &c., and be pleaded and impleaded the name of the Mayor, Bailiffs, Burge, and Community of the Town, and y shall have jurisdiction of all manner of Pleas, Actions, Debts, Accompts, reements, Transgressions, Detentions, Assize of Novel Disseizin, Mort Dancester.

1584. Answer of the Lords of the Council of England to the Petn. and request of the inhabitants of Youghall:

"That touching a motion of theirs for the County of Cork to be divided into two parts, the one to be called the Co. of Cork, the other the Co. of Youghall, her Majesty is contented, but the manner of division and limits of both to be referred to your Lo'ps. and H. M. Counsell there. For the demand to have the Abbey of Molany in fee farm, it is not thought mete to be granted till your Lo'ps., &c., consider how the Abby may be serviceable to her Majesty. Touching their demand to have commission to seize their goods taken from them at the several times of their sacking, we think good not to be granted than by your order, or of the Lo.-Pres. on information where they shall find their goods.

"And for the donation of the Wardenship of Youghall, now escheated by the attainder of Desmond, It is thought meet to be continued in her Majesty, and the revenue employed in the well bringing up of children in learning, and the

maintenance of others according to the foundation.

"And as for the Castle of Lyffany, and the woods and lands belonging to same required by them for a rent, because these woods grow commodiously for her Majesty's navy, it is thought mete they should be reserved for that use.

"Touching their request to have their Quarter Sessions kept at Youghall, we

think it not amiss until the divisions of the counties be made.

"And where they have required to be free from town custom within all her Majesty's dominions, as Corck and Waterford, we think good they be free from foreign custom, as Waterford, &c., which, if you think good, may be inserted in their Charter.






MUNICIPAL SEAL OF YOUGHAL.



This Mace is 8 inches long, and has a silver bowl mounted on a turned mahogany handle; the bowl which is much battered is about two inches and a half deep; it is now an oval form, 4 in. by 3 in. The central portion, which is now lost, was said to have once contained the Arms of the Commonwealth.

There is no record of a grant of such arms having ever been made to the town, and how this baton came into the possession of the Corporation, there is no account. All these Maces with the Sword are now in the possession of the Duke of Devonshire, and preserved in Lismore Castle.

S. P. Ap. Parry to Crumwell. Waterford, Oct. 1535. Narrative of Lord Butler's Expedition to Dungarvan, Youghal, Cork, Mallow, &c. "The first night from Dungarvyn we went onward our journey to a town called Yowghol, where we had very good cheer, and honestly received, and there they did sell a gallon of Gasgoyn wine for 4d, ster. The second night we camped by a castle, the which is called Cahermon, and there my Lord James mustered his host, the which should onward with him that journey, and there he had with him 200 horsemen and 2, and 300 galoglass and 12, and 200 and 4 kernes, besides followers, as the fashion of the country is, and so had I 3 score and 18 spearmen, and 24 longbows, and 5 hand-guns, and every man well horsed. And so, forth on the next day to Corke. And upon a hill half a mile this side Corke, there my Lord James commanded me to put my men into array, and he likewise commanded all his captains to put their men into array. And upon a hill, half a mile or more, Cormak Oge was with his host, and so down came Cormak Oge into the valley with a certeyn, and my Lord James with a certeyn with him as there was appointed. And so they met together, and fell to parlying; and after they had parleyed, my Lord James went into the Town with all his host, and the Mayor of the town there did receive him, with his brethren, in their scarlet gowns and their tippets of velvet, after the English fashion, and was very glad of us Englishmen, and made us the best cheer that ever we had in our lives, &c. And so we removed from Corke to a place called Malaghe (Mallow), and there camped by the river side. And on the morrow we went to a town called Kylmalok, and lay there that night, and it was a very poor town, and the next day to Lemeryk. And so, in Lemeryk we had very good cheer, but nothing like the cheer we had in Corke." Vol. ii., p. 283-4.

- "It. After such praisement, that said goods be laid up in safety in the town of Y., to be forthcoming to her Maj⁷⁸. use, according to the inventory taken, and said ship to be safe placed till her Maj⁷⁸. pleasure be known.

"It. We authorize your Lo'p. to imprison all such persons as shall detain said

hulk, such persons convicted to remain in prison without bail.

"Finally. Within liberties and without, to search for any parcel, and in whose

custody such may be found, to take into your Lo'p's. charge."

This ship was laden at Lisbon, Portugal, and the following marks were used by the merchants on their respective goods. (See *Plate 9.*) For the subsequent entertainment of the passengers, &c., in Cork, and Sir J. Perot's appropriation of the Jewels on board, see "Council Book of Cork," p. xvi.

He makes his wife and daughters his executors, and bequieths to his brother Edmond his gowne of English cloth, and appoints the Senshiall and his unkle, Piers Forest, tutors of his son and children, to see their things bestowed be thadvise of his cozen Gerald Fitz James. Proved at Corke, 23 June, 1578.

1579. "The Earl of Desmond and his forces encamped before Youghal, and finally took that town, which at that time was full of riches and goods. The Geraldines seized upon all the riches they found in this town, excepting such gold and silver as the merchants and burgesses had sent away in ships before the town was taken. Many a poor, indigent person became rich and affluent by the spoils of this town. The Geraldines levelled the wall of the town, and broke down its courts and castles, and its buildings of stone and wood; so that it was not habitable for some time afterwards. This was done at Christmas," (Four Masters.)

Upon receipt of your Honour's letters and her Mairs, commissions for the meting and bounding into seigniories of her Majys, escheated and attainted lands, within this province, which came into our hands the second of the last month, we prepared ourselves to repair into these parts, and accordingly met at Dungarvan the 21st of the same. where we remained eight days in meting the one half of the lands we are informed to be assigned to Sir Chr. Hatton, and from thence departed to Lismore and Youghal, at both which places we have stayed these eight days more in meting and bounding such lands as we hear Sir Walter Rawley is to have. which hath been exceeding difficult and painful, by reason that the lands having been long waste, are generally overgrown with deep grass, and in most places with heath, brambles, and furze, whereby, and by the extremity of rain and foul weather, that hitherto we have found, we have been greatly hindered in our proceedings," &c.

"Certificate 14 March, 1587, of the lands within the counties of Waterford and Cork allotted to Sir Walter Rawley and his associates, sc., the Castle and Lands of Inchaquyne, the South Friars, otherwise the Grey Friars, near the town of Yoghall; the Castle and Lands of Ballynetrae, with Kyllnatora, the Castle and Lands of Shronecallye; certain lands of David McShane Roche and others, lying along the river called Bryde from the lands of Shronecally to the lands of Lesfynyne, on the south and southwest of the river Bryde, half a plowland lying on the north side of the river of Bryde, called Killnecarrigrie; the Castle and Lands of Lesfenyn, and the decayed town of Tallow, the Castle and Lands of Mogilla, and the Sheane, and the Castle and Lands of Kilmackowe.

"Further it is agreed, if the lands above mentioned do not amount to the full quantity or portion of the seignories of 12,000 acres apiece, and one seignory 6,000 acres, by estimation appointed for the said Sir Walter Rawlyghe, his associates and tenants that there they shall have of those lands hereunder specified so much as shall make up the said full number of acres for the said seignories, that is to say, the Castle and Lands of Mockollopp and Temple Myghell, the lands of Patrick Coondon, next adjoining unto the Sheane, four messuages or tofts in the town of Yoghall, with the patronage or gift of the wardenship of Our Lady's College of the same, Whight's Island, alias Ahavounan, and other the lands thereunto next adjoining in Imokillye."

Signed—"Christo. Hatton, Canc., Valentine Browne, Edward Fitton, John Popham, Richd. (?) Phitton, Henry Slingsbye, Arthur Hyde, Thomas Hanam."

Endorsed—"Mem., that the Friars' house, alias the South Friars, Yoghall, and the four messuages or tofts, with their appurtenances aforesaid, are not to be accounted a parcel of any seignory. Nevertheless, the same lying nigh to the seignories appointed for the said Sir Walter Rawleye are agreed by the undertakers to be granted unto him, and are surveyed at the yearly value of £3 13s.4d." (Cal. S. P.)

S. P., Aug. 1, 1586. "Orders to be observed and kept by the Tenants of

Mogely:

"Foreasmuch as the dwelling abroad in woods, bogs, glinns, and other like remote places giveth occasion of receiving and relieving of rebels and malefactors, and their stealths, be the persons that so dwell never so honest, as also of oppression of soldiers in their marches, especially when they go scattered or in small companies without commanders, and the like of Sheriffs' Officers, when beeves, garrons, or victuals are by them to be gathered or taken for her Majestie's service, or sesses laid upon the country, and that such persons so dwelling must of necessity be subject to these oppressions, as also to robberies and stealths, for that they (by reason of their weakness) cannot resist, but to the contrary are forced (for safeguard of their lives) many times not only to conceal such facts, but also to join with the malefactors, all which is only to be prevented by dwelling in towns.

"Wherefore no tenant belonging to the lands of Mogely shall henceforth dwell abroad, but all shall presently resort and dwell within the town, or depart from

those lands.

"And for that it is an ordinary custom (especially amongst the richer sort) to prevent Sheriffs and other officers, when by the Governor's warrants they are given to take up beeves and other provisions for the relieving of Her Majestie's forces, to hide and put their cattle, corn and other victuals into woods, bogs, and such like remote and strong places, as also to remove and send their cows to such as have been taken from, or made delivery of what is rated upon them, and also to convey their cattle into other sheenes, by which the prince's service is hindered and the burden laid upon the poorer sort. To prevent the one and the other, and that the rebel shall have no relief from the subject. No tenant of Mogely shall henceforth keep any manner of victuals abroad hidden in woods or bogs, or put any victuals in any other places to be kept, but shall bring all within the castle walls, or town, and shall also set their ricks of corn in such places near unto the castle, as may be commanded by the same. And to the end, the burden of such beeves and other provisions as shall be taken by the officers for Her Majestie's service or relief of the soldiers, may be indifferently charged upon every subject and tenant, according to his ability and proportion of the goods and cattle he hath, every tenant shall from time to time give a just note (which shall be kept in the rental book) of his cows, sheep, and garrons, neither shall be alter, buy, nor sell any without registering the same, nor receive any cattle to keep, or put any abroad to others, without leave.

"And for that idleness is the mother of all mischief, and engendereth a thousand evils, no tenant shall keep any idle persons in his house, nor any idle person shall be suffered to dwell within the town, but all shall employ themselves, either in husbandry or occupations, and shall give account how they live, and if any strangers do come to tarry of the tenants, be it either in the night or day, before they receive or lodge them they shall bring them to the Constable of

the Castle; neither shall any tenant depart the town without leave or pass-

port.

"And for that it hath been the custom to meet and parley with rebels or malefactors in woods and secret places, no tenant shall willingly meet or parley with any rebel or malefactor, or conceal their being in such places, but all shall give present notice hereof, as also of any treacheries or ambuscades, that by any means may come to their knowledge, and of any other matter that may tend to the furtherance or hinderance of Her Majestie's service. And altho' in all policy it were fit to suffer no arms in the town, but all to be brought into the Castle, yet for the better defence of the inhabitants (upon any sudden occasion), and safe keeping of their herd abroad, every tenant shall forthwith, for himself and his servants provide and have such arms as he or they can use, to the end that when occasions be offered all may be in readiness to defend their own goods and aid their neighbours; but notwithstanding any sudden cries that may happen abroad, either by day or night, no man shall depart the town or follow the cry disorderly without leave, but upon the sound of the drum all shall be in readiness, and with their arms shall repair to the Castle Gate, there to receive and follow what direction shall be given them."

S. P. O. (Ireland) 10 Sept., Esq., one of Her Maj^{ya}. undertakers for re-peopling the province of
Munster hath repaired hither with his wife, children and family, and
hath accepted lands by patent, and settled himself and tenants thereon; there hath

Barrie's country, Doualla, als. McDonogh's country, and so much of Glangibbon, als. the White Knight's country, as is not now in the Co. Tipperary, all of which are now members of said Co. Corck; and also the countrys of Coshmore, Coshbride, and Condon's country, now in Co. Waterford, and to meare same into one entire county by certain bounds, as convenient and competent to be made one entire shire, and to divide the same into several baronies, and to nominate the town of Youghall for the shire town, that a shire gaol may be erected within same, and also to divide the residue of the Co. Corck into one other entire county, and into certain baronies. The said commission to be returnable as soon as can be, and at the farthest in Quindena Hillarii next, and to send the same unto us, fair engrossed in parchment, under your hands. &c. Given at the Castle of Dublin, xii July, 1606.

In my master's absence, I thought it my duty, the rather for that the whole planks, one in the former account rated at but 49 ton and a half; the ship, by my account, after the rate paid for the carriage, hath in her but 35 tons \(\frac{3}{4}\), yet the skipper affirmeth he hath at least 50 tons in weight, after the rate of 2·100 to the ton; or otherwise, at his coming to London, he will abate after the rate agreed on, and that the timber is very green and massie, and for the remainder of timber, planks, and tressails of His Maj⁵. shall be safe laid up until your honor's pleasure be known.

The no. of planks laden for his Maj. in the 'Seamen of Camphire,' in Zealand, the 17 Feb., 1608, upon the river Bride, in the realm of Ireland. To Bastian Cornelius, of Camphire, in Zealand, Master of the good ship 'Seamen,' now lying in the harbour of Youghall, with the first wind to sail for the river Thames, the place of unlading. I acknowledge to have received into myship, by the delivery of Henry

Pine, Esq. and Henry Wright, servant unto Sir Richard Boyle, Knt., the number of 95 oaken planks, after my safe arrival, to deliver for the Lo. High Treasurer of England, either at Woolwich or Depfort, for which I am to be paid for my freight 40 pounds, also to be acquitted of all charges of said river. Whereas my ship is computed at 60 tons, accounting 2 100 to the ton, and I have promised to carry 50 tons, of which Henry Wright made doubt, if not, I should abate.

Paid Wm. Tilley, Rob. Comings, and Andrew Duffield, for 6 days each, about lading and unlading the lighter with planks into the ship at 10d. per day each, 15s. Paid Francis Powell, Richa. Hornor, John Hicks, and John Humphrey, for 6 days at 12d. per day each, £1 4s. Paid Rich. Atkin and Griffyn Baker for one day each, 2s. Paid four of the harbourmen for one night's work, to lade the lighter to get off the shallows, which was spent, 4s., and to three others of them, 2s. 6d.; in all, 6s. 6d. Paid Walter Shereland, lighterman, for 10 days' looking to the lighter and labouring in the said work, 10s. Paid for 10 days' hire of the lighter, at 18d. per day, 15s. Paid for half a hundred and ten pounds of iron, to make a great cross band along the timbering of the ship astern, which was cut for the lading of the planks, 7s. 2d. Paid the smith for making same, with bolts and spikes, 3s. 4d.; in all, paid 10s. 6d. Sum disbursed, £5 15s." (State Papers.)

Carte, vol. 62. Sir R. Boyle, writing to Lo. Chichester from Youghal, 11 April, p. 137. 1613, recommends Cloghnekilty to be incorporated. "For that is a most convenient place for a town, where I have already made a plantation of some hundred English families, that lying upon the sea-coast, where a ship of good burden may come up to the very town, and it will be the fittest place for a shire town when the Co. "Most parts of importance in Munster are well garrisoned with old soldiers, and those that arrived there this time twelvemonths, and other companies of the fleet that arrived here. It is a pity they are not supplied with clothes fitting soldiers, for the want whereof hundreds of them died. Much want, if any sudden occasion be, we have of powder and shot and other munition. Men are here, plenty of provisions, good returns, safe plans, unless by an accident of too much suddenness we be hindered from meeting together, for our English, unless in towns or new plantations, live scattered from one another. The Earl of Cork, kindly remembers him, and thanks you for your loving commendation. Of late there is begun at his Iron Works, at Cappoquin, the casting of iron ordnance, only four yet tried. The beginning of March here died a worthy gent., John Fitz-Gerald, lord of the Decies, Co. Waterford. A man nobly disposed unto the English, and of the greatest estate in that county. In the last rebellion, in all his country, called the Drum, from the Ferry of Youghal to and beyond Dungarvan, hardly one plough stood still." (State Papers.)

Brit. Mus., Eg., 80. Lord Corke to Earl of Warwick. My Hon. Lord and Brother.

"Yesterday they (Rebels) took eight of my English tenants and hanged them up, and bound an English woman's hands behind her, and buried her alive. My second son, Kynalmeaky, commands my new town of Bandon-bridge, where he hath found 500 foot and 100 horse, but no entertainment or pay. On 18th the enemies approached the Town Walls, whereupon my son issued with only 60 horse and 200 foot, charged them in the van, they had a bitter fight. Kynalmeaky, with his horse, closely compassed about the hill, charged them in the rear and brake them; there were 104 persons found dead upon the ground, whereof five were principal men of note, and leaders. There are many of them wounded; he took 14 prisoners, whom he hanged by marshal law at the Town gates. He brought home of the Rebels' arms 141, and two waynes drawn with 8 oxen a piece, laden with their carriage and provisions, which the boy bestowed amongst his soldiers, and lost never a man of his own, only two wounded; and now we have begun to blood ourselves upon them. I hope God will so bless his Majestie's forces here, as when I now write of killing a hundred, I shall shortly certify you of killing of thousands, for their unexampled cruelty hath bred such desire of revenge, as every man hath laid aside all compassion. I have, since the beginning of the Rebellion, at my own charge, kept 200 men here for securing the Town and Harbour; 100 horse and 100 foot at Lismore, which my son Broghill commands, and daily kills of the Rebels and takes prisoners and preys of them. And I pay another 100 at Cappoquin, and whereas before, my revenue, besides my

houses, demesnes, parks and other royalties did yield me 50li. per day rent, I have not now 50 pence a week coming in." Youghall, 25 Feb., 1641.

Ib. R. Corke to Dungarvan. "There came to this town yesternight Capt. Badnidge's officers and company, with some other of the Peasleys, about 140 in all. They landed in Corke, and were commanded hither, with a convoy of horse, but when they were drawn to the hill without Corke, and attended them for two hours for a convoy, a foot boy was sent to them, commanding them to march away weaponless, or else they should be hanged; so, with staves in their hands, they came hither safe, whereof ten horsemen might have cut them off, they were without money or victuals, and we have now 15 companies to feed, with no other meat than salt beef, bread, barrelled butter, and cold water to drink, which makes a rich churchyard and a weak garrison. I have removed all the impediments which hindered Lieut. Beecher getting the widow, for I have now publickly, in the church, given her unto him in marriage. He has gotten a very good wife and a rich fortune." Youghal, 4 Dec., 1642.

Carte Papers, tool. 68. Expelling the Irish from Youghill, 1644. "The Irish, in their objections to the settlement, proposed by the Agents of the Convention. As to that part of the King's Deelaration which concerns the

Corporations of Ireland we humbly offer:

"That after the many and unspeakable sufferings and miseries of the Inhabitants of the said Corporations, in the times they were besieged, he [Cromwell] took some by assault, and put all the officers and soldiers and Inhabitants to the sword, and others not capitulating till they were reduced to the extremest of miseries, were forced to accept such quarter as he was pleased to afford, which, in consequence, were none other than he to satisfy his enraged malice with the blood of the chiefest inhabitants, and causing their heads to be put up on the gates of their cities, for no other cause than their allegiance. And several other of the Corporations by sallies or otherwise, resisting so vigorously, until there was not remaining one-sixth part of the number of the soldiers and inhabitants which they had at first, being besieged. Yet did they not capitulate until, in a dire sense, their wants and afflictions and inevitable necessity did enforce them." (Read before Hill, and pleaded by Sir Nicholas Plunket on behalf of the Irish, anno 1660.)

Carte Papers. After charging the Irish of Cork with a design to betray that vol. 68, paper garrison to the confederates in 1645, which (as he alleges) caused 9. 1646. Lord Inchiquin to put them forth. 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T. Whetcombe to his brother, worthy Earl Castlehaven from Clonmel with near 4,000 horse and from Kinsale, foot intending to come to Imokilly, between Youghal and Cork, 13 May, 1645. where was great store of provision laid up for him. But my Lo. of Inchinquin sallied out of Cork with about 600 foot and horse, destroyed their provision by burning it, and slew 6 or 7 score opposers garrisoned in Barryscourt; the rest 200 or 300 forsook their works and fled to the castles adjoining.

About two days after he sallied forth a second time, and appointed forces from Youghal to meet him, which they did, and burning the rest of the country hindered Castlehaven's march, so that for six or eight days we heard no more of him. The next news we heard of him was, that April 16 he appeared before Youghall, and gave them summons, which was nobly answered by the Lord of Broghill; theirs thereto was, that mass should be said in their Cathedral within six days, but my Lord assured them, upon the price of 100 cannon shot, God should be worshipped in it these six months, in despite of his forces. The next day he marched from Pilltown to Cappoquin, where the castle surrendered without firing a shot, the commander of which was since put to death by a council of war. Lord Inchiquin, then gathering his forces, went to Tallow and Lismore. Leaving this quarter he besieges a castle near Barryscourt, leaving his cavalry at Tallow to watch Castlehaven, who on the 7th rose and took Mitchelston by assault. Same day Inchiquin obtained Barryscourt by quarter, and then lay down before Ballymartyr. Meantime Castlehaven crossed the river at Fermov, and met our men midway between that place and Castlelyons. Lo. Broghill came to them from Youghal with 5 or 6 horse, and falling on them, fought bravely for the space of one hour, at last the rebels took to a wood close by, and driving them to the river killed between 7 or 8 score of them; half of the slain were horsemen, and among them were divers eminent men, as Lieut.-Gen. Bourke, Col. Sulivan (?) the eldest son of Ballymartyr, and other Captains and gentlemen. They brought near 200 arms into Castlelyons, and several prisoners to Cork, amongst them one of the Condons, an arch rebel, who in the beginning of the wars set upon some horse belonging to the late Earl of Barrymore, which he most inhumanly abused, cutting out their tongues, noses, &c., and suffered them to die languishing. This was called since Condons Quarter. These prisoners say that their first intent was to fall on Youghall, which they are persuaded cannot hold out long. We lost in the battle ten stout men, and twenty more wounded, of whom special care is taken. For in Corke and Youghal they have surgeons, but in the garrison we have not any, young or old."—(Perfect Diurnal, p. 770.)

14 Nov., 1649. A letter from the Lo.-Lieut., with one enclosed from Col. Rob. Blake, from Corke Haven, of Nov. 5, 1649, another from the Mayor of Youghall, &c., of 7 Sep., 1649, were, this day (4 Dec.) read: "May it please your Ex. We have a long time been humble suitors to Almighty God for that happy success of your endeavours, which the access of the Lo. of Broghill and part of your forces here hath presented unto us; our humble suit to you is that we may possess your honour's favour and protection in our Charter, priviledges, lives, and estates.

"About a fortnight since I had some good assurance that Corke Letter read in the House was returned to its obedience, and had refused Inchiquin. Also that from the Lo.-Col. Townsend was coming to me with their submission and desires, Lieut, to but was interrupted by a Fort at the mouth of Cork harbour, but peaker Lenthall. having sufficient grounds that it was true, I desired Gen. Blake that he would repair thither in Capt. Mildmay's friggate the "Nonsuch," who, when they came thither, received such entertainment as the enclosed will let you see. Meantime the "Garland," one of your third-rate ships, coming into Waterford Bay, I ordered her, and a great prize lately taken in that bay to transport Col. Phaire to Cork with near 500 foot, and near £1,500 in money. And as they went for Corke they were forced by the wind to ride off from Dungarvan, where they met Capt. Mildmay returning with the "Nonsuch," and Col. Townsend aboard, coming to me, who advertised them that Youghal also declared for the Parliament of England, whereupon they steered thither, and sent for Col. Gifford, Col. Warden, Major Purdon, who, with Col. Townsend, had been active for the return of Corke and Youghall to their obedience, and the Mayor of Youghal aboard, who came to tender some propositions to me, but my Lord Broghill being on board the ship, assured them it would be more for their honour to desire no conditions. They said they would submit, whereupon Lo. Broghill, Sir Will. Fenton, and Col. Phaire went into the town, and were received with all the real demonstrations of gladness an overjoyed people were capable of. Col. Phaire intends, as I hear, to leave 200 men there, and march with the rest overland to Cork."

"Loughguier, March 24, 1650-51. To the R. H. the Lo. Dep.-Gen. of

Ireland with the Duke of Lorraine's Agent, who is again returning, all things being agreed between them. His monies, which is £20,000, ammunition and arms received. The Duke is to be their Protector. Fifty sail of ships promised to be sent to the coasts of Galway and Limerick, by the latter end of this instant, both which places he is to furnish with engines of war. They to be his magazines, with 10,000 foot and 5000 horse is to be here by the latter end of April, until which time their army is not to engage with us upon any terms, but to endeavour to guard the passages of the Shannon, but (says my intelligence) they do not a little fear we should attempt getting over before Lorraigne's arrival. The Duke of Lorraigne is to have Corke, Youghal, Kinsale, Bandon, and Dungarvan, in assurance of what he shall lay out. The Duke of York is to marry his daughter." (Proceedings in Parliament from 10 to 17 Ap., 1651.)

Abstract of Col. Plunkett's letter to the Abp. of Dublin, dated Brussells, Jan. 3, Lord Tang.

Jan. 3, Lord Tanff sendeth you the Abbot of St. Katarine's from the Duke of Loraine, with considerable sums of money, with large promises of future supplies, as well of more monies, ammunition, arms, and officers supplied, if need be.

"None is more willing and better able to defend than the said Duke, who assured Lo. Taaff, in Father Dillon's presence and mine, to venture his treasure, life and estate for regaining of that part of the kingdom which is possessed by the enemy, so you call him unanimously to your assistance.

"He protesteth under God he will settle religion in that kingdom in as ample a manner as it is exercised at Rome. Let none doubt whether the said Duke be able to do it, for he is a wise prince, very rich, and wants no good council nor commanders; hath a good army, and the best horsemen in the world." (1b.)

And accordingly the Remonstrance and Resolutions of the Protestant Army of Munster, now in Cork. Oct. 23, 1649:

"Surely the giving away of our churches and sites of abbeys in all parts of this land, except the counties of Cork, Waterford, and Kerry, gave but an introduction to the Irish to lay claim to the rest. How palpable experience teacheth us this truth, the sad occurrences of late can demonstrate, when as the only blood that must be expended against Droghedah, Trim, Kildare, &c., must be of the English Protestants, against persons of their own religion and nation, whilst the Irish must sit still at three miles' distance, in a secure posture, looking on Dublin. And when at the expense of their blood these places are gotten, who are confident to receive the guerdon of these men's labours but the Irish and papists, as Daniel O'Neile in Trim, and Sir Arthur Ashton in Droghedagh? The next design is to draw the rest of the English out of the garrisons, and to place Irish in them, to take care of their wives, children and estates, as persons not fit to be trusted with their own, lest thereby the drawing in of the French and delivering up those garrisons and the rest of the kingdom to them were a thing of small moment, which had really been a thing performed, if the embassy of the Lo. Viscount Muskerrie to that purpose had not by God's providence (making us instruments to preserve this place) been annihilated."

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[They declare they submit themselves to the power of their own nation in the Parliament of England, and to his Ex. the Lo.-Lieut. Cromwell, and hope they will be forgiven their former submission to Ormond, as they were seduced by the subtility and power of their late commanders]. Cork, Oct. 23, 1649.

Cork, June 4, Progress of the Lo.-Dep. and Council. "The Major-General and Clerk of the Council, [Col. Tho. Herbert], 30th [May, 1655], in the morning, came his Lordship and Council, and dined with the Earl of Cork. Little business then done, they came that night to Cork, twenty miles. Thursday, 31 May, the Lo.-Dep. and Council stayed at Cork, sat before noon and after. Friday, June 1, the Lo.-Dep. and Council, with all the officers, went from hence. (the Major-Gen. not being well) to Kinsale. Major Hodder, Governor of that place, had a gallant dinner provided in the Fort, where His Excellency and Council dined with all them that attended, only the Clerk of the Council, Scout Master-General, Col. Jones, and some of the clerks dined at Mr. Southwell's in the town. After dinner the Lo.-Dep. and Council did ride to Bandon, a fine English town, and stayed there that night. Sunday, 2 June, Doctor Worth, made an excellent sermon. After dinner they came to Cork again; little business was done at Bandon. Monday morning many petitions will be read; and in the afternoon the Lo.-Dep. and Council intend to quarter at Mallow.

In 1684, A beautiful and elaborately carved Sword canopy of oak was set up in the Collegiate Church of St. Mary, Youghal; it is surmounted by the Royal Arms, and in base the old arms of the town. (See *Plate 8.*) It still occupies its

place in the north side of the nave, near the Episcopal throne. The Cap of Maintenance, figured on Plate 6, used to hang near it.

1690. Capt. Thomas Ponel presented a "Loving Cup" to the Corporation, which is still preserved in their Chest. (See Plate 7.) Cook, in his MS. Notes, says, "1690, Capta. Thomas Ponel gave this Corporation a silver boat, weh holds three naggings, weh is to be drunk off full at the several feasts of the Mayor, by each of the company, with this Toast, 'Captain Ponel dead or alive.'" Harris says, "On 2 of August, 1690, the Town of Youghal surrendered to 50 dragoons, who appeared before it under the command of Capt. Pownal, who was then conducting by that road the garrison of Waterford towards Mallow. He gave the Governor to understand the certain ruin he would bring upon himself if he thought of holding out, and therefore advised him to surrender. The Governor took time to consider of the matter till 10 at night, at which time he marched out with 3 companies of foot, and gave up the possession of the Town, where were found, 14 guns mounted, two without carriages, (but neither powder nor ball), 350 barrels of oats, 215 stone of wool, and plenty of provisions of several sorts."— ("Life of King William III.," p. 285.)

The Garrison at Youghal, consisting of 50 foot and 36 dragoons, London Gaz., Aug. 25, 1690, hearing of the mischief the Rapparees did in the county, and that there was a number of them at Castlemartyr, marched to attack them, but the foot not being able to march so fast as the dragoons, the latter met near Castlemartyr 300 Rapparees, both horse and foot, which they routed, killing 60 and taking 17 prisoners. The foot being come up, summoned the Castle, which surrendered upon liberty to go to Cork, but without horses and arms. The soldiers took the horses and gave the arms to the Protestants hereabouts, and returned to Youghal. Meantime Capt. Price and Capt. Whetstone, Commanders of the "Bristol," man-of-war, then at Youghal, being informed that there were two, ships in Cork harbour laden with hides and tallow for France.

Wherefore by voices and election, according to the custom of the Town, for next year from Michalmas following.

Nicholas Gallwan, Maior; Piers Hoare, Patrick Collines, Baylyeffs.

29 Sep. 1610. The above Nicholas Gallwan received the Rodd, and with Piers Hoare and Patrick Collines after their accustomed oaths, sworn Justices of the Peace, according the point of Charter by His Majv. in that behalf granted.

By general consent it was concluded that the Maior shall deliver to the now Maior all the Charters, Towne ensignes, Seals, Writings and Muniments, and tender his accounts to the Auditors, to be considered, &c., and what shall be found from the Towne to be due, the now Maior shall give him an acknowledgement under the Common Seal, whereby he may receive the same.

Mem. According to the above entry, Mr. Averye delivered in open Court to the now Maior, Mr. Nicholas Gallwan, the particulars following:—Eight

Charters old and newe sworde and hat of Maintenance, three Sergeants' maces, three seals, viz. Common Seal, Mayoraltie Seal, and Cockett Seal, with five counterpanes of leases between the Towne and several parties.

Forasmuch as the Statutes of this Towne and Bye-laws, through alteration of times, are either for the most part imperfect, or otherwise quite out of use and likeing, to the disadvantage of the Towne and Corporation. It is by general consent of this Assembly thought fit, that the statutes, &c., of this Towne heretofore made, are frustrated and anihilated, and none of them shall be in force but only as followeth:

Imp. It is ordained, &c., That there shall be continued four special meetings, law days, Courts of D. H. yearly kept by the Maior, &c., for makeing good laws, rules, and orders for the better government of the Towne, viz., on the Friday next after the feast of the Epiphany, the Friday next after the feast of S. Patrick, the Friday next after S. John Baptist, and the Friday next after S. Michæl, as formerly it hath been accustomed. At which several times of Assembly, as also the Friday next yearly before S. Matthew's day, being election day of the Maior and Baylives, and likewise on the feast of S. Michæl the Archangel, afsd., and as often as occasion shall require, at which time, or at any of the said days limitted, every freeman being within xx miles of said Towne, shall repair to the Tolsel, or Court-house, in his gown or cloak to his degree befitting, and after his repair thither, shall not depart without the special licence of the Maior and Baylives, and if any shall make default, he shall by way of fine to the Maior and Baylives pay for the use of the Corporation the sum of 6s. 8d. For the levying whereof it shall be lawful for the Maior, &c., either to commit to prison without bail, or enter their houses and destrain, &c.

Item. Whereas the freemen generally of the Town, to whom only H. Majr., &c., have granted the benefit of buying and selling and useing the trade of merchandise, have complained that foreigners, such as be not free, do daily repair unto the Towne, and encroach upon the liberty thereof, selling and retailing all manner of goods, &c., to the hurt of the Towne and impoverishing of said freemen. It is therefore by the Maior, &c., enacted, that if any person not free shall sell any manner of wares within the Towne or liberties, &c., It shall be lawful, &c., for any person to seize on all such wares as forfeited, one half to the informer that maketh the seizure, the other to the Maior, &c., for the Corporation; and if any of the inhabit-

ants not free shall transgress, for every such offence he shall pay by way of fine to the Maior, 10s., to be levied as above, or the party imprisoned.

Item. Whereas in former times it hath been wrongfully used, that the Maior receiving into his hands during his Mayoraltie several customs and sums of money to the use of the Corporation, hath, after his office expired, kept same to his own particular use. Agreed that the Maior for the year past shall deliver up all his receipts to the Maior, &c., that shall succeed him, together with six of the brethren by the rest chosen, to be by them examined, on pain of 10ti. to be levied by way of distress.

Item. Whereas divers, not having undergone the charge and office of experience, have yet for gain of credit, priority of place, &c., laboured to become one of the council to the offence of others equally if not in rank before them. It is ordered, that from henceforth none be admitted as of the council but such as shall first have served the office of Baylive, nor yet these have admittance without the general consent of the Maior, &c., and that he receive the oath, &c., of a councillor before the Maior, &c., in that behalf prescribed.

Item. Whereas by ancient custom the most able men have been from time to time elected to bear the office of Maior and Baylives, from which election some have withdrawn themselves, in contempt the said election cast upon them. It is now agreed by this assembly that whosoever shall refuse to take upon him the office of Maior, being once elected, shall pay 10li, and for the office of Baylive so refused 5li, to be levied ut supra.

Ilem. Whereas by His Majys. letters patents, all fines, &c., accruing within the Town are given for the use of the Corporation; and that the Maior, &c., partly through mildness, but chiefly through remisness neglect the execution of their charge. It is therefore provided that whatsoever fine shall happen by presentment, &c., and by the Maior, &c., not levied, they shall make satisfaction accordingly.

Item. Whereas upon repair of shipping, goods, or merchandise unto this Towne, fit for common bargain, certain persons for their own private profit do secretly treat with merchants and owners thereof to the damage of the Town, &c. It is ordained that henceforth no person shall treat with any merchant foreigner for any wares brought to this town, without first acquainting the Maior, and having his consent, upon pain of imprisonment at the Maior's pleasure, and forfeiture of 40s., to be levied as afsd.

Item. Whereas oftentimes common bargains, customs and entry of

vessels have heretofore, by the Maior, &c., and inferior officers, privately made, &c., contrary to the course accustomed. It is ordained, that no common bargain be made, &c., but such as shall in open Court be concluded upon, neither any custom be made or received by the Maior, but in the presence of the Baylives or one of them, and three of the brethren at the least, with the Towne Clerk, who shall record the same, on pain of the Maior's forfeiting for every such default 201i., neither shall the Towne Clerk, Searcher, Waterbailiff, or any other officer take entry of any ship, barque, boat, or any other vessel, but in presence of the Maior and one of the Baylives, or forfeit 20s. toties quoties.

Item. Whereas divers merchants within this Towne, though never setting forth any adventure beyond seas, yet being from other ports and places of this kingdom supplied, do daily retail, &c., all manner of wines within the same, to the great grief of such as hazard themselves and their estates as afsd. It is therefore for their better encouragement, for restraint of these home traders, and increase of the revenue, enacted, That whosoever shall henceforth buy or cause to be brought out of any port or creek within this kingdom any wines into this Towne to be sold, shall pay the Maior for the use of this Corporation, as follows, viz.: Out of every butt of sack, 10s.; out of every of French wines, 5s., and so rateably out of every tun, pipe, hogshead, or runlett of the like. And that none shall land or seller up any wines before they have agreed with the Maior for the said, to be paid within one month after such landing; and whosoever shall land, &c., without agreement, shall pay by way of fine 40s., to be levied as afsd.

Item. Notwithstanding the plenty of all manner of corn and grain, as well malt as wheat, growing within this kingdom, and daily brought to the market, yet divers of the inhabitants do buy, bring over here, and retail such abundance of English beer, as not only the prices of ale and beer are much raised, but also the weale-publicque greatly wronged; for suppression hereof it is enacted, that none shall retail any manner of English beer, but he shall pay to the Maior, &c., out of every hogshead, 5s., and out of every barrel, 2s. 6d., every freeman's own adventure only excepted.

Item. Forasmuch as by His Majys. letters patent, &c., It is commanded that all ships, barques, boats, &c., going out or coming into this harbour, shall at the Common Key or porte charge and discharge their freight, and not elsewhere, upon pain of forfeiture of same. It is enacted, that the

Major, &c., shall not permit any ship, &c., to pass up into the river out of His Major, main porte here, for the discharging or receiving of any goods to be carried away, upon forfeiture of 20li.; and if any pilot shall presume contrary to this Act to carry up any such ship he shall forfeit 40s. totics quoties.

Item. Whereas by His Majys. letters patents no inhabitant of this Towne should sue or implead any other inhabitant out of the same, yet divers out of a turbulent disposition have, more for vexation than any just grounds, sued, troubled and impleaded their neighbours some time in one place, some time in another out of this Court, and whereas with more ease and less charge they might have law, equity, and justice at their doors afforded unto them, &c., it is therefore enacted that whatsoever town dweller shall from henceforth sue any other inhabitant in any court or before any judge than in the Court of Youghall, before the Maior, Recorder, and Baylives, contrary to this Act, he shall pay to the Maior, &c., by way of fine, the sum of 5li., to be levied as afsd.

Item. Whereas divers lewd and incontinent persons, not regarding God or goodness, do through their flatteries and wicked practices labour and endeavour the abuse and overthrow of young and silly virgin maids, to the great grief and discontent of the parents, and to the said young maids' often utter undoing. It is therefore by this general Assembly provided, that whosoever from henceforth so abuse and deflower any such young maiden virgine, being a Maior's daughter, shall forfeit to the use of the maiden so deflowed, 40li; an Alderman's daughter, 30li; a Baylive's daughter, 20li.; or any Freeman's daughter, 10li; and a Groome's daughter, 5li. To be levied by the Maior, &c., afsd., or the party so offending to marry the said maiden by him so deflowed.

Item. Whereas divers idle and lewd persons, being banished and as it were spued out of other good-governed towns, do oftentimes make their repair hither, where they presently obtain service or harbour under one or other landlord or master, under whose defence they live as libertines, without any account had or given of their lives and conversations. It is therefore enacted, that from henceforth no Townesman shall receive any servant or apprentice into his service, before he bring the said servant, &c., unto the Maior, and have him sworn to be true and faithful to His Majy and the Corporation, and have his name entered in the Town-book with his in-

dentures. And further, that no landlord sell or let any houses, taverns, sellers unto any person without bringing him before the Maior to be sworn, and to be liable to all tax, &c., on pain of the forfeit of 40s., &c.

Item. Whereas the Butchers inhabiting and using this Towne and Market, through liberties of price and market allowed unto them, have combined and enhanced the market, that they have drawn double the prices to be paid for their victuals formerly accustomed. It is enacted, that there shall be every D. H. appraisers chosen and sworn, who shall indifferently praize and set price of all manner of flesh, &c., by said butchers killed or brought to market, and every fortnight deliver a true account to the Maior, &c., with the names of such as buy the hides and tallow of all such beeves, &c., on pain of 10s., and if any such butcher shall sell or buy any flesh, &c., contrary to said appraisement, that said flesh shall not only be forfeited, but the parties pay a fine of 10s., and that said appraisers shall receive of every such beef so killed to be sold, one halfpenny; and for the augmentation of the revenues of the Town and reparation of the walls, there shall be paid the Maior out of every beef so sold three pence, out of every hog 2d., and out of every sheep 1d.

Item. Whereas upon the comeing in of any drover, or other fishing-boat into this harbour, with fish to sell and to serve the Town and Market, it hath been accustomed, every man to go and press into the same, and there buy and engross up the said fish, whereby the common market hath been left unfurnished and the subject much prejudiced. It is enacted, that whoseever shall from henceforth steppe or go aboard any such fishing-boat to buy or bargain for any fish, shall pay by way of fine 12d., and if any Town fisherman shall presume to sell any of his fish aboard or in any other place than the open market, he shall pay by way of fine 5s. viiid., to be levied as afsd.

Item. Whereas divers within this Corporation not having any ground or pasture, yet do keep cows, goats, garrons, hogs, sheep, &c., and so negligently that the enclosed parks and pastures about the town are oftentimes by them spoiled and broken down, to the damage of the proprietors. It is enacted, that whosoever shall from henceforth find and take within his orchard garden, pasture, &c., any garron, horse, cow, or hog encroaching, &c., it may be lawful for him to impound same until he be paid 12d. beside the damage. And as the keeping of swine and hogs within the Town, it is

It is enacted, that whosoever shall practice anything hurtful to the Town, shall, if he be a councillor, be degraded of his place; if a freeman, loose his freedom; if any other inhabitant, be removed and banished of said Town and liberties thereof, and farther pay a fine at the Maior and Brethren's discretion.

Item. Whereas divers deeds and writings of this Town, lands and rents, have been heretofore covertly carried and passed under the Common Seal, to the impoverishing the revenue of the Town, and the counterpaines of said deeds and evidences so loosely kept, that for the most part they are lost, &c., or in some private men's hands, whereby upon occasion it is unknown where to demand them. It is therefore enacted, that from henceforth no gift, grant, deed, &c., for conveyance of the Town lands or revenues shall be passed under the common seal of this Town of Youghall, without the assent of the whole Common Assembly in the open Court of D. H., drawn by the Recorder, engrossed by the Town Clerk, and by him, at the grantee's charge, in the Town book entred; and for better security of the premises there shall be a common chest with three locks, wherein the Town charters, common seal, and deeds, &c., concerning the Corporation, shall be put, and left at the Maior's house, and the three keys of the chest to be kept; one by the Maior, one other of the Council, and one of trust of the Commonaltie, so as no private person shall have access thereunto.

Item. Notwithstanding the statute of this kingdom, that no man should be admitted free within any Corporation without either his apprentiship therein served, or that he had long dwelled within the same, yet divers, through affection, &c., of friends, have within short time after their repair hither gained their freedom to the hindrance of such as by birth or service have attained thereunto. It is ordered, that from henceforth, no man (Burgesses' children excepted) shall be admitted free of this Town before suit and motion, either by himself or friends, be openly made three several Court days of D. H., and general allowance of the Assembly given for the same, &c., and be there sworn. And as the Town rents and revenues are but small, every freeman on his admittance shall pay towards the common stock besides one pound of wax; and that every freeman useing the merchandise shall pay custom out of all such hides and pipestaves 'pas he shall send beyond the seas, towards mending the Town walls.

We find that every Ald and Burg is to have free passage for their Christmas beeves, and for the Christmas corn; also that every freeman is to pay to the ferryman 3d every Christmas, in consideration afsd.

We find that every inhabitant is to pay 2d, every Christmas for the former considerations.

We find that every freeman is to pay out of every horse or cow for his passage one white groat, toties quoties.

We find for every horseload of corn, 1d., for every 2 bags of corn, 1d., so as they shall be brought to the ferry by Town inhabitants.

We find Trinity Castle, the Key Tower, and the Moores and Bogues called Moinroe and Moinbegge, to be the Town land.

For the highways, We find Capt. Edw^d. Baynard to have stopped up the highway of Knocyverrie above the Moore and other places.

We find that Mr. James Kearnye and Morris Dwyne have enclosed Glanbegge within their own land.

We find that Sir Richard Boyle hath stopped up the highway towards Ardenasack (as we take it), and the truth thereof to be found out by the Maior's perambulation.

(A leaf appears to be missing here.) And whosoever of the above-named Artificers, &c., shall demand more money than by these presents is set down, shall pay by way of fine to the Maior, 6s. 8d., and whosoever, owner of work, shall allow more than herein is set down, shall forfeit 6s. 8d., to be levied by distress or imprisonment, without bail, &c.

And if any refuse, the Maior shall deliver said scavenger a sufficient distress, &c.

By consent, John Fynne, porter of the South Gate, is to have the use of the lower room of the South Gate Castle during office, paying 5s. per ann., and to have it always ready for the Town service.

Upon due consideration had, it is thought fit that there shall be an yeeld of Innkeepers and Victuallers to the number of 12 of the most ancient Innkeepers and Alehouse keepers, dwellers within this Town, at the election of Maior, who shall pay 20s. per ann., and to keep their company never less than 14 or greater than 20, and to be bound in bond for good rule, &c.

Upon consideration had touching the setting up of a Market-house on both sides of the Cross, it is thought fit that the said house be altogether set on the south side of the Cross, the former grant and common seal notwithstanding.

Mem. Mr. James Kearney brought in two pieces of writing, Mr. John Forreste 3 pieces of writing, and Mr. John Golwan 24 pieces of writing, with one paper of Tickets, all belonging to the Town, which with the Charters, &c., were put into the Chest.

As there is a writ issued out of H. M. Court of Exchequer to the Maior, &c., on pain of 100li. to enrol the new Charter in said Court. It is agreed (in regard there is no revenue to defray the charge) that there shall be a tallage of 20li. laid on the Town, with the sum of 12li. yet unreared of last tallage, and that the Baylives with David fitz William shall divide same, to be speedily levied to present use.

Whereas a Bye-law was made, that there should be a scavenger appointed for cleansing and sweet keeping the street, which hath been neglected. It is agreed, that said scavenger, besides his yearly pay of 4d. out of every smoke shall have a penny offering at Christmas yearly out of every smoke, with every man's further pleasure.

Mem. That Robt. Babb, pavior, hath offered in open Court for the duty of scavenger's charge afsd., he was allowed by general consent.

 - It. That no masons have and take the same wages of (do.) 6d. and 2d.
 - It. That every common labourer have per diem, ut supra, 4d. and 2d.
- It. That the owners of boats receive not for the hire of their boat, for every voyage up the river to Tallow Bridge, said boat being of burden equal to Morris fitz John's boat, and so rateably, 2s.
- It. That no waterman take for any such voyage, with meat and drink, above 9d.

And whosoever of the above-named artificers, &c., shall demand more wages for the causes afsd. than is laid down or break assize, shall pay by way of fine to the Maior, &c., 6s. 8d.; and whatsoever owner of the work shall allow more than herein is set down shall pay 6s. 8d. to the use afsd., to be levied by distress or imprisonment, without bail, &c.

week day to the prejudice of the Corporation. It is therefore by the Mayor, &c., agreed, that from henceforth the ancient appointed market-days be duly observed; and that no corn, grain, &c., be brought within the Town, &c., on any other days, and that only between the hours of nine and three upon forfeiture of the goods, &c., and imprisonment of the party offending, during the pleasure of the Mayor, &c. (butchers' shambles and bakers' stalls excepted); and as through want of a common pound within the franchises, divers landlords, &c., taking distresses did drive them to some private place, or strong walled house or bawne, where the proprietors not being able to feed them, many of the distresses have miscarried. For remedy, it has been thought fit that Balthazar Portingall, one of the Sergeants, should fence in the ancient pound plot, &c., for all cattle distrained within this Towne, where all cattle shall be impounded on pain of 5s., and that said Portingall shall receive of any one proprietor for his distress so imnounded, being horses, cows, goats, or hogs, for one single head, not above 1d.: three heads, 2d.; ten heads, 4d.; seven head of sheep, 1d., on pain of 5s.

Whereas the benefit of custom and cocket by ancient Charter granted to this Corporation towards repairing the Town walls, which custom, &c., the Mayor for the time being did collect and convert to his own uses, without giving any account. It is therefore thought fit by the Mayor, &c., that the said Mayor shall not have the collecting of any part of said custom, &c., on forfeiture of 100li., but that the two Bayliefs shall collect the same, and have 2s. in the pound. And as for the Town rents, fines, &c., the Mayor shall collect same, and shall thereout retain unto himself for his yearly stipend 10li., with the head fish, meashe of herring, God's penny, and gate customs, and shall pay thereout to the Recorder for his yearly stipend 5li., to the Swordbearer do. 3li. 6s. 8d., to the Mayor's Sargeant, 20s., and for the rest be accountable before the succeeding Mayor, &c., within ten days after.

Agreed, that every Alderman of this Town who has not paid towards the common wax heretofore, shall immediately pay 18d., every Alderman's pier or councillor 12d., every freeman 6d., and for the better collection a warrant to be made to Mr. Thomas Ronayne, Mr. James Copinger, and Mr. Moris fz. Gerald, to collect same, and also to receive from every freeman that hereafter shall be admitted free one pound of wax, or 12d. It. That Balthazar Portingall make up the common pound by Easter, or loose the benefit thereof.

The Marshal or Gaoler's fee:

For any man the Mayor shall commit for felony, 1s. 6d. It. For all warrants issuing out of the Tollsell above 20s. the sum of 2s. 6d.; under twenty shillings, 12d. It. For any man that the Mayor or Ballives shall commit for their pleasure, 6d., with the beer accustomed to be paid for, &c.

Ordered, that the Water Ballive make a barrel of 36 Gallons of Winchester measure, one half barrel of 16 gallons like measure, and one hogshead of threescore-and-tenn gallons said barrell, at his own cost, before Shrovetide next, and the half-barrel and hogshead before Easter.

It. That Will. Mondaie is sworn a freeman at large, upon condition that he shall not buy any wines, hides, or tallow to the prejudice of the merchants of this town, &c. It. Raundell Bruen, his freedom, to be thought of next D. H.

12 April, 1616. As the common land of this Town hath been hereunto used, as the inhabitants had no comfort thereby, and that strangers, not liable to any daily charge, taxes, &c., made more profit thereout. It is thought good by the Mayor, &c., that for the augmentation of the revenue, &c., that said common land, except the Turf bog, the Faier Hill, the South Green, convenient highways and other greens within high water-mark, be set to quarterage grazeing, viz., for every collop that shall graze by the quarter, 14d.: Twelve pence to the Mayor for the Corporation, and 2d. to the overseers for their pains, who are to render an account of every collop, as well as those they shall find trespassing, and 2d. for every trespass, and that James Uniacke and Edmounde McShihie be overseers and collectors for one year. It. That Erasmus III, his wife, be allowed to continue her

brewing as formerly until Whitsontide. It. As in former times divers persons have attained to be freemen without any profit for the Town, and neither by birth or services. It is agreed by the Mayor, &c., for the benefit of the merchants, &c., that no person shall be admitted free of the Town of the trade of merchandise, except such as attain thereto either by birth or service, unless he pay the Town ten pounds.

It. Randell Bruen sworn free at large.

28 June, 1616. Curia le D. H. tenta apud villam Youghull, &c.

It is agreed by the Mayor, &c., that whereas divers holes and doors have been made in the East part of the King's wall, through which some of the inhabitants have been robbed, and ill-disposed persons pass in and out by night. Ordered, that said holes, &c., shall before 25 July next be stopped up with lime and stone by those who use them, on pain of 40s., to be levied on defaulter's goods by the Bayliffes, who are to survey said work, &c. It. That no more Inns or Alehouses be kept within the Town, but only 20 Innholders which are licensed under the seal, which number is allowed by the President and Council of this province. Also the Burgesses and freemen as have voices in this D. H. may freely keep Inns and Victualling houses within the liberties, provided they give two sureties to the Mayor, &c., for keeping good rule, &c., according to the conditions agreed on, that if any Innholder fail to give bond, he is to be put down by the Bayliff. It. That Christmas Harford and Edw^d. Goughe shall survey the Broad street and the lands of the Towne, and where they want paving to see same paved, and to cause any part of the street or lane to be broken up over against any man's house where they find such defect of paving, and every tenant who holds for a term of six years to bear the charge of such paving, otherwise the landlord to bear the charge, by way of abatement out of his rent, at the two next gales, according to the certificate of the surveyors, in default to forfeit 20s. to be levied off his goods. It. That some fit person be appointed to Scavenge the Town, and whosoever will undertake to carry away the filth of every house as well in lanes as in the Broad street, twice a week, viz., on Wednesdays and Saturdays, the same to be brought out to the scavengers, bringing their cart over against the house; that every family or smoke shall pay such scavenger 6d. every year, within twelve days of Christmas, the same to be granted under the seal of the Corporation, for the life of such scavenger, or in default of, 12d. as a penalty. The Baylives to deliver 9d. to the scavenger and 3d. to themselves for the pair. And if any inhabitant by building, &c., make extra rubbage, the scavenger is not bound to carry same away under his aforesaid wages, but to get the first offer, so as he will do same as cheap as any other. It. That Edw^d. Wallshe and James Holmes shall be dep. clerks of the market, dep.-seaymasters and dep.-guage masters taking such fees as are hereafter set down.

4 Oct., 1616. Curia le D. H., tenta apud villam Youghull, &c.

Mr. Mayor delivered in open Court the new Charter, with the exemplification, and an ancient warrant for non summons to Sessions, with the Mayoraltie seal, the common chest, the common seale, a box with nine old Charters and fifty-nine evidences and writings in the chest contained.

The matter in controversy touching the repairing of Jesus Chappel is deferred to the return of the Lord Boyle (who is upon his coming), shall be able to free himself from the repairing thereof; then Mr. John Galwane, to whom the chantry land was first mortgaged, is enjoyned (within one month) next after Lord Boyle's coming, to repair the said Chappel according to his command, on pain of 20 marks.

It. Mr. Rich. Bluet and Mr. John Wilson are appointed proctors for the Church for this year, and those of last year, on pain of 10li., to bring in their accounts on Friday next. It. The Collectors of the grazing for the Town land to bring in their accounts, on pain of 10li. It. All other matters, &c., are deferred to Mr. Recorder's return.

5 Nov., 1616. Curia le D. H., tenta apud villam Youghill, &c.

Whereas, the Port, Cities, Towns, and also the inland Corporations of this kingdom have heretofore challenged and had their freedom of petty custome within this Towne; but for anything yet appearing, no such right is to be challenged or allowed unto them. Ordered, that the collectors of the petty custom shall collect said petty customs from all persons without respect or allowance of freedom (this Corporation only excepted); and if any of the said cities, &c., shall prove, either by antiquity of Charter, or grant from this Corporation of their exemption from payment, they shall have full benefit thereof; and if any suite shall be brought against said collectors, they shall be maintained out of said petty customs. It. Whereas, it was thought fit that the Mayor should have the yearly allowance of 20li, towards his house keeping, &c., to be paid out of the fines of the Town, after his Mayoraltie determined; and as said Mayor hath daily occasion for disbursement of moneys in the behalf of the Corporation, ordered, that he have his yearly sum of 20li. paid out of the petty customs as he shall require; and also the Recorder's yearly fee of 5li., the Swordbearer's 3li. 6s. 8d., with the Mayor's Serjeant's 20s., paid out of said petty custom half yearly. And as for the Town rents, &c., happening within the Towne, the Mayor shall have the collecting as accustomed, and be accountable for all, the ancient duties allowed the Mayor with the faires and bloodsheds always excepted. It. Whereas, the Aldermen and others have challenged a freedom from the common watch of the Town, alledging it an ancient custom within other cities, &c. It is ordered that all householders, &c., shall be liable to the watch as other the inhabitants, &c. It. Whereas, the two ensigns or colours of the Town, heretofore bought by divers of the young men, &c., of the Town, through default of such as had charge of them, have been in pawn for 59s. Ordered, it be paid out of the petty custom in redemption of said colours, which are to be delivered to the Mayor, to remain with the other Towne ensignes, &c. It. Whereas, divers matters have passed under the Common Seal, without the consent of most of the Chief Aldermen of the Town, and that by reason the keys of the common chest have not been left in such men's hands as might have prevented same, ordered, that said keys be kept by the Mayor, Recorder, and Mayor of the Staple, and that no deed henceforth shall pass under the Common Seal without the test of the Mayor, two Bayliffs, with six of the Aldermen at least, Mem. That W^m. Llewelline, Thomas Houldship, and Randoll Bruyn, collectors of the petty customs, have given up their account, 28 Jany., 1614, until ——, 1616, amounting to ——, which has been allowed; they are to continue to collect said custom, at an allowance of 3s. in the pound, as formerly. It. That Thomas Houldshipp, Towne Clerk, hath surrendered in open Court his said office into the hands of the Mayor, &c., with the grant made unto him, to the intent that they should be pleased to re-grant said office unto Thomas Quinton, gent., whereupon he was elected and sworn. It. According to a former bye-law for the letting of part of the common land as may be spared, viz., the Whitebog, Clockeverry, Monypepery, and the common glynns, this day, by general consent, a piece of candle was appointed and lighted, during the burning whereof whosoever should bid most for said land should enjoy same for 31 years. Therefore there was first offered for said lands yearly rent, 3li. 10s., then 6li., then 8li., afterwards 9li., and after that as followeth:

Upon the said piece of candle being consumed, and no man offering more, W^m . Llewelline was granted a lease of said lands, at the yearly rent of 17i. for the above term.

It. Whereas, John Wilson, Key Master, being now to enlarge the western side of said Key, hath offered to build a convenient sailing alip against the Key gate, for the discharging of boats and small vessels, so as he might have some reasonable consideration, &c., ordered, that said Wilson shall make a good sailing slip or key well bound and cross layed with timber, against the Key gate, which shall extend in length from said new work 50 feet, and in breadth 20 feet, for which he shall have 61i., &c., out of the petty custom.

7 Dec., 1616. Curia le D. H., tenta apud villam Youghull, &c.

Whereas the Right Hon. Richard Lo. Boyle, Baron of Youghill, made a motion at this D. H. to have this Towne to be a staple town, and free of all staple commodities, and that there shall be certain London merchants

admitted to lay in a stock of money for the setting of poor people on work. It was, by general consent of the Mayor, &c., agreed on, that a patent be passed to that effect.

It. Whereas, by accident of fire happening in this Towne on Friday night, 6 Decr., 1616, the Town was in danger to be burned. It is ordered, to prevent the like general danger, that there shall be presently bought 4 great iron hooks, two long ladders, to be laid on the Market House side, and the leathers fastened with chains, and twelve leather buckets to be in readiness for quenching fires hanged up in the Towne Hall, and the keeper of the key to be answerable for them; and that there shall be no thatched house hence forward erected in any place within the Town walls; and that any persons as have a forrest chimney built with timber or wattles within the walls of the Town and suburbs thereof, shall, between this and Lammas day next, pull it down and build another with stone; and no person to make any fire in any house but in chimneys made of stone, in default to be fined 51i., and committed till he pay it or lose his freedom. And if any is a lessee of any house within the walls whose estate exceeds 7 years, he is to build the chimney at his own charge, if he be able—if not, the landlord to build it, and his rent to be increased after, 2s. to every pound disbursed; if his estate be under 7 years, the charge to be equally borne between him and his landlord, and the tenant to do the work and stay the landlord's part out of his rent; and if the tenant be but of will, or from year to year, yet he is to cause the chimney to be built, the charge to be defraied by the landlord, to be stopped wholly by the tenant out of the next rent. And hereafter that every one who shall be admitted free of this town, or of any particular company, shall, before he be sworn or take any benefit of his freedom, give to this town one leathern bucket, or deliver so much money as will buy such bucket, which are to have the arms of the Town set upon them, and be hanged up in the Towne Hall.

The rates for selling of Candles in this Town, according to the Chandlers' Charter:

Roofe tallow exceeding the price of 2s. 4d. to sell their candles at 3d. per lb. Roofe tallow exceeding 2s. 4d. and not exceeding 2s. 8d., then to sell their candles at 3½d. per lb. Roofe tallow exceeding 2s. 3d. and not exceeding 3s., then to sell their candles for 4d. per lb.

. And not to exceed the prices of 4d. per lb. upon any greater price of Roofe tallow, without the licence of the Mayor, &c.

To the Rt. Hon. Richard Lo. Boyle, and one of H. Majv. P. C. of Ireland, after my very hearty commendation unto you. I am informed that the block-house of that port is leased by the Corporation and converted into a store-house for a private man, and so unfitted for defence of the King's subjects or offence of his enemies, for which it was ordained; and that the ordnance which H. Maj. bestowed thereon is utterly unuseful, as well for want of carriages and munition as room, and an officer for managing hereof. I pray you to call that Corporation together, and to let them know that his highness and the Commonwealth have such interest in block-houses, bulwarks built upon havens, that they may not let them for private gain, nor to any other use than that for which they were ordained; and methinks that regard for their own safety should induce them to take this for Justice and reason, and therefore I require you, with all speed, you cause that block-house to be resumed into the hands of the Corporation, and that you see the ordnance fitted with sufficient carriages, munition, &c., on the common charge of the Towne, and that you appoint an able officer to be a gunner for the management and use of these pieces, and that the key of the block-house be kept by the Mayor, and at all times ready for His Majy, service and the defence of that harbour, provided that if the Corporation have leased the same to any man for valuable considerations, that you give him such composition as he may be no looser; and of the doing thereon I pray you certify me, that if you find any obstacle I may remove the same. And also I understand there are divers holes and decays in the King's walls of that Town; I pray you cause them to be suddenly repaired; and if any refuse to stop the breach which he made in the King's wall, I pray you bind him to appear before the Lo. President to answer And so I commit you to God. From H. Maj. Castle of Dublin, 28 Nov., 1616. Your very loving friend, Ol. St. John.

OL. St. John,—Forasmuch as divers persons in this kingdom, who formerly agreed with the then Deputies of Sir George St. Poll and Sr. Henry Yelverton, Kts., for licence to sell wines and make and sell aqua vitæ in divers towns, &c., in this kingdom, whose bargains for the net payment of the sums of money agreed upon became void, and the same let to others; and yet they have been importunate suitors unto us to be relieved in that behalf, which we could not doe, but with great loss of others who have taken licences since the forfeiture of these bargains. In consideration thereof, and to avoid the trouble of such suitors, and that the new Deputies have been willing to confirm such licenses as were honestly obtained of any of the former patentees, if the parties will come and pay their fines so agreed upon. We signify that if any persons that had formerly licenses do not pay their fines due within one month, we shall leave them to course of common law, and that the Mayor, &c., of any such towns where they retail wines, not having paid their rents, &c., are required to shut up the tavern and seller doors of all such, &c., and keep them shut until they shall obtain the licenses of the patentees or their deputies, and not to fail, according to the tenor of this proclamation; and these, or copie under the Clerk of the Council's hand, shall be sufficient noteice to all, &c. At H. Maj. Castle of Dublin, 21 Dec., 1616. To all Mayors, Sheriffs, Bayliffs, Portreeves, Sovereigns, Constables, &c. (Recd. and entered the above, 3 Jan., 1616.) This agreeth with the original ex. per. Willm. Usher.

10 Jan., 1616. Curia le D. H. tenta apud villam Youghull, &c.

Mem. This day Rob^t. Ill came into open Court, and deposed, &c., that the Company of Innkeepers took him into their fraternity for consideration of 20s. and a dinner, without the consent of the Mayor, &c.

It. Will. Uppington likewise came and deposed, &c., that he was admitted to be one of the Company of Innholders by John Chambers, then Master of the Company, for 27s., instead of John Dollock, who then went for England, without the consent of the Mayor. It. As there was a motion made same day to displace Thomas Reade, Swordbearer, and make election of Edwd. Walsh, gent., it was referred until my Lo. Boyle came home.

5 March, 1616. Curia le D. H. tenta apud villam Youghull.

Mem. Ordered, if any stranger bring any wine into this town and make sale thereof to any freeman, then the freeman shall pay (Bye-law, 5 Oct., 1610) the taxes thereon. It. By consent, &c., that the matters in difference concerning the wine brought to be sold in this town are wholly

referred to the Rt. Hon. Rich. Lo. Boyle, to whose order the Corporation are fully resolved to abide.

Richard Kearney, Patrick Collins, Will. Luelen, Tho. Holdship, Cessors. The Tallage, 118li. ster. The payment, first day of Easter term. Edward Stout to pay towards the Talliage 46li. 8d.

The said undertakers to sue out the patent at their own charge, and to be freed of their part of the Talliage, and to accept the 18li. odd money already paid in part payment of the 118li., which 18li. is to go in part payment of such sums as each of them shall be rated at; all demands of the undertakers amounting unto 211li. to be reduced to this talliage of 118li. The 18li. paid already, and what other moneys shall be levied by this talliage, to be repaid by the day, and the bargain go not forward.

14 Nov., 1616. Articles of Agreement between Samuell Smith, assignee of the moiety of the fifth part of the benefit of the licenses hereafter mentioned, and deputy for the Rt. Hon. James Haye, Sir Geo. Yelverton, Knt., and George Richards, deputy for said Lord Haye and Sir Henry Yelverton, on the one part, and Henry Avery and Nicholas Nagel, of Youghal, merch^{ts}., on the other:

Whereas the King's Majie, by letters patent, dated Westminster, 22 March, An. regni VII., for considerations mentioned, have given, &c., to Sir George St. Poll, Knt., dec., Sir Henry Yelverton, their executors, &c., full power during 21 years, and to appoint any one such person for the term of his life in the first place, in the second place after his or her decease. one other person, being the husband, wife, child, or kindred and of such person first nominated during his or her life, and to keep during their lives successively such tavern or taverns within every of the cities, boroughs, towns, &c., in Ireland, with divers other liberal clauses therein contained. &c., and other benefits granted by said Poll and Yelverton to one George Pennye, Esq., for considerations expressed and sithence conveyed, &c., unto said Samuell Smyth, &c. And the said Yelverton and Smyth have, in recompense of such loss as said Lo. Haye, &c., hath or shall sustain by any less quantity of wines brought into this kingdom by reason of settling said grant for licenses of wines granted or assigned over unto said Lord Have. the moiety, or half part of all such moneys, &c., unto them by reason of any licence for selling, &c., any wine or keeping any tavern, and by virtue of said letters patents as by several deeds may appear.

It is agreed between the said parties to these presents and the said Samuel Smyth and George Richards for themselves, &c., do grant to me. with the said Henry Avery and Nicholas Nagell, and that in consideration of a fine of 25li., paid by said Henryand Nicholas in full satisfaction of their arrears of rent ending Mich. last, and for the yearly rent of 10ti. to the use of said Lo. Haye, Sir H. Yelverton, and Sam'. Smyth, &c., in such manner as is expressed. That said Smyth and Richard shall procure a sufficient warrant from the Rt. Hon. the Lo. Deputy of Ireland, to be directed to one of H. Maj. council learned in the laws, to whom it shall appertain for the drawing of a license under the great seal, at the cost of said Henry and Nicholas, and for said Henry's assignees during his natural life, and after his decease to and for said Nicholas Nagel, his assignee during his natural life; in the second place, to keep as many taverns as they shall think fit within the town of Youghull and the parish and precincts thereof, and in the same to sell, by gross or retail, all sorts of wine or wines at any price to the best profit of the said Henry Avery and Nicholas Nagell, or their assignes, according to the intent of H. Maj. said letters patents granted to Sr. Geo. St. Poll & Sir H. Yelverton.

And the said Henry Avery and Nich. Nagell for themselves, &c., do grant to, and with the said Samuell Smyth and George Richards, that they, said H. and N., will during their natural lives pay said Lo. Haye, Sir Henry Yelverton, and Saml. Smyth, &c., the rent of 10li.; that is to say, to Lo. Haye 5li., and Sir H. Yelverton 4li., and Saml. Smyth 20s., at the place that shall be used for the composition of licenses of wines and aquavite, kept in the City of Dublin, at the two usual feasts, &c.

And said Sam! Smyth and Geo. Richards for, &c., do grant to, and with the said Henry Avery and Nich. Nagell, &c., that they, the said S. and G., nor any of the deputies of said Lo. Haye and Henry Yelverton, shall during the natural lives of said H. and N. grant any more licenses or warrants for passing same to any person for the keeping of any tavern, &c., or selling or retailing any wine in any part of the town of Youghull and the parish thereof, and that said H. and N., &c., shall have free liberty, during the natural lives of the survivors of them, to sue for and take to the proper use

of them all such fines as shall be forfeited or imposed on any person for buying any manner of wine within said town of Youghal, without the consent of said Henry and Nicholas, &c. Provided that if said yearly rent of 10li. shall be unpaid by the space of 21 days, that then the license herein covenanted be frustrated, &c.

Boyle shall dispose otherwise. It. That Thomas Read is Swordbearer for 40s. per ann. to be paid (ut supra). It. Of all foreigners that shall be sworn to the Corporation the Swordbearer is to have 12d. It. Of all goods to be praised or sold within the Town upon execution, the Swordbearer is to have 6d. in the pound, except such as are free. It. Jasper Walsh is to have 20s. for the arrears of his fee. It. That every weapon that shall be proved to be first drawn to assault any of the king's subjects within the Corporation, shall be forfeited to the same. It. By consent of the whole Town, it is allowed, that Valentine Vale be free of the trade of a barber, so long as his family remain in the town. It. That it is some bye record, that Thomas, father of Edward and Thomas Stoote, by which they now attain to the same by birthright, are allowed freemen at large on condition they pay such scot and lott as shall be allotted them, and that they pay towards the wine tallage as they be taxed by the wine taxers. It. Michæl Collins sworn a freeman at large.

27 June, 1617. Curia le D. H. tenta apud villam Youghull, &c.

Agreed by the Mayor, &c., that according to direction from the Lord President, that the Master and whole company of Innkeepers, and others, that retail beer within this Corporation, &c., are to come before the Mayor and enter into recognizances for the keeping of good order, &c. It. It is agreed by the Mayor, &c., that Richd. Bluett be proctor of the Church.

3 Oct., 1617. Curia le D. H. tenta apud villam Youghull, &c.

Mem. James Gough, Esq., late Mayor, delivered in open Court the seal and charter in a box with lock and key, one key of the Common Chest; there are the grants of the Records and Town Clerk's office, and other writing, whereby no rent is yielded to the Corporation, which bundle containeth 15 writings, one other bundle, 25 counterparts of the leases of the Chantry lands, another containing 20 writings concerning several leases, with the Common seal. Mem. Ordered by the Mayor, &c., that every man being warned to the D. H. and shall not make his appearance once at least in four Court days, shall be disfranchised of his freedom, &c. It. Agreed, &c., that as it is a very meet lodging over the Northgate for the porter of the same, that he shall pay during his year 5s. to the Mayor, &c. It. That Peter Marks, by virtue of a letter of attorney from the Mayor, &c., shall sue Mr. Burck for the Schoolhouse. It. That every Innkeeper, or who shall sell beer or ale, shall come to the next sessions, nor thence depart without license of the Court, and there enter into recognizances to keep good order, or give over selling any beer or ale. It. That Henry Avery be constable for the Northwest quarter, Edward Sheppard for the Northeast, Wm. Ashe for the Southeast, James Walshe for the Southwest, and Robert Eill without the South gate.

9 Jan., 1617. Curia le D. H. tenta apud Youghull, &c.

Ordered by the Mayor, &c., That there be a sufficient iron chain made to reach from the Key Tower to the Key head on the north side, to be paid out of the petty customs. It. That Thomas Reade have license to make a hole in the Town wall near the key, where it is already broken, and

there to make a door with lock and key into his house, and again stop up same before 24 Jany, next, mean time to deliver the key every night to the Mayor, Baylives, or Town Constables. It. That Mr. Thomas Harverd and Edw. Goffe be surveyors for paving the streets, &c. It. That John Mortimer, mercht, having petitioned three several D. H. and paid 10li be a freeman at large. It. Gregory Sugar having petitioned 3 Court days, was referred to the Mayor, &c., to mitigate the same; on due consideration the Mayor, &c. concluded that he pay 50s., so he was sworn a freeman at large. It. That Will. Ashe for the sum of — be sworn a freeman at large. It. That every plaintiff in any personal action in their Court of Record, against any defendant (so the plaintiff be a freeman or an inhabitant), shall pay such cost to such def, if the plaintiff be nonsuited in such action as shall be allowed by the Court; and that every plaintiff being a stranger, shall find sureties of the Town, against which sureties, if the plaintiff be nonsuited, every defendant in such action shall recover his cost allowed as afsd., and execution for the recovery thereof. It. That Thos. Quintyne, gent., Townclerk, shall have liberty to make a hole in the Town wall where he is about to build, and there to make a door with lock and key, for bringing in his timber or other provision to be made up again before ... next, meantime every night to deliver the key to the Mayor till it It. Mr. Llewellyn and his tenants for the Common land called Knockaverris, and Anstance Collins to make their appearance this day seven night before the Mayor, &c., upon their petition.

13 Feb., 1617. Orders made by the Vicar General for the diocese of Cloyne—sede vacante—and by the Maior, Recorder, and Bailiffs of Youghall, to be ever hereafter observed concerning Churchwardens for the parish church of the Town; and confirmed this 13 Feb., 1617, and publickly read in the church in time of Divine Service upon a Sabbath-day, being 1 March, 1617.

Imp. That none be chosen Churchwardens or Proctors but only conformable men, and as do usually resort to Church, the number never to exceed two, and also two sidemen, assistants to the Ch. Wardens, to be chosen in the same sort as the C. W.

The Maior, Recorder, and Bailiffs, or any two (whereof the Maior to be one) to have the election of one Ch. Warden and a sideman, and the War-

den of the College for the time being to have the election of the other.

The election of Ch. Wardens to be on the morrow after All Soul's day. And if either do not perform their election on that day, or five days after, being required, then the other party may choose both Ch. W. for that year.

That said C. W. are to receive all the chief rent and other duties belonging to the Parish Church, to receive payment for all such as shall be buried within the body of the Church, and so disburse same on the reparations of the Church, and that none be buried in the body of the Church but only by appointment of the Minister and one of the C. W.

That the C. W. upon All Souls day every year make up their account of their receipts and disbursements, before the Mayor, Recorder, Bailiffs, and Warden, or three of them, the Maior and Warden to be always two, if the Warden will come to the Maior's house, otherwise it may suffice before the Maior and Bailiffs, and if the C. W. have any of the Church's stock in their hands, they shall within one week deliver same to the new C. W., and in default the new C. W. to levy it on their goods by the assistance of the Maior, &c.; and if the parish be found in the C. W.'s debt, then the new C. W., by the advice of the Maior, &c., shall call unto them six honest men of the parish and make an assessment on the parishioners for the C. W.'s satisfaction, and the new C. W. are to pay over the same to their predecessors within one month.

That every Sunday and Holyday when Divine Service is read in the Parish Church, one C. W., one Constable, and one Sideman, by turns, do, after reading the first lesson in the forenoon, go together into the Town to see that good order be kept, and either to punish any they shall find misdemeaning themselves in church-time, or give notice of them to the Maior, &c., and if they neglect they shall forfeit 5s. to the use of the church.

That once in a fortnight one of the Bailiffes, for the better restraining of disorders, shall go forth with the Constable, C. W., and Sideman, and if they find any drinking in Taverns or Alehouses during Divine Service, they shall commit to the Marshal both parties so offending, and the householder in whose house the offence shall be committed.

It. That Edmond Piccott, taylor, upon his petition shall have the little room where the prison was kept of late, at the Northgate, paying 5s. per ann. during the pleasure of the Mayor, &c.

27 June, 1618. Curia le D. H. tenta apud Youghull, &c.

Mem. Agreed by the Mayor, &c., that the order for making the chain shall stand in force. It. That a well be made by the cage. It. That every person made free since the former Bye-law shall provide a leathern bucket before Lammas-day, or pay 10s. for their contempt.

It. David Connery, Edward Godwyn, clerk, George Houldshippe, Christ. Blewitt, John Wright, Vincent Gookin of Court M'cherie, co. Corke, Esq., sworn free at large.

Mem. Mr. John Avery, late Mayor, delivered unto Christmas Harford, now Mayor, the Seal and Charter in a box with lock and key and a chest, with the evidences, &c., of the Town. It. Agreed by the Mayor, &c., that all persons sworn freemen since 6 Dec., 1616, shall before the feast of All Saints next pay to the use of the Corporation unto Christ. Portingall, or Edward Goughe, one leathern bucket and a pound of wax, or 5s. 6d., or be dismissed of their freedom. It. That hereafter, no Mayor or Bayliff for the time being shall leave themselves one of the Eligees in the election of Maioraltie, with the purpose to be Mayor for the year following, on fine of 401i. to be levied by the Mayor and Baylives. It. That Richard Boyle.

Esq., son of Rt. Hon. Richd. Lo. Boyle, John Strongeman, paying such sum as the Mayor, &c. shall impose; Richard Marshe, John Smyth, Edmund Forrest and Mourishe Manfeild, be sworn freemen at large.

Constables sworn: James Welche, Henry Avery, John Fewell, Wm. Cornewell, and Thomas Jefferies.

The Proclamation against Usury.

By the Lord Deputy and Council. Oliver Saint John.

Although this realm of Ireland hath now for fifteen years enjoyed universal peace, whereby the commodotees of the land have been much improved, handicrafts encreased, trade and commerce, much interrupted by the troubles, more freely used, &c., yet hath there been one mischief suffered to continue in this realm, which hath greatly hindered the public weal, namely, the fretting canker of excessive usury, which by reason of the scarcity of money hath not only eaten up the poor sort of people, but ruinated the estate of many honest and industrious merchants, and overthrown the houses of many ancient gentlemen, in those happy days of peace, who for divers years past have endured the storms of wars, &c. without diminution of their revenues.

And albeit there is an express statute made 3 King Henry VII., for the suppressing of usurous contracts, whereby heavy penalties are inflicted upon the offenders, and by reason of the troubles of former times said law hath not been put in execution, but transgressors use their ungodly trade of usury to the hindrance of the commonwealth, and high displeasure of Almighty God; for remedy whereof we declare that it is H. Maj. express will, &c., that said act be put in execution, especially against such as shall make any contract upon loan of money or sale of commodoties, or take mortgage of any lands, &c., whereby they shall gain above ten in the hundred for one year for money so lent, and for shorter term accord-

ing to that rate. And further, his Maj. is graciously pleased that no usurous contract heretofore made and already redeemed shall be called in question, &c., and that such usurous bargains as are now in esse and undetermined, shall within six months accept only the principal sum lent upon said usurous contract, with such charge as they have been at in improving the land mortgaged, and shall deliver up such bonds, &c., together with the lands mortgaged, without claiming any further term, &c., and whosoever shall deal so with their debtors shall not be questioned or impeached upon said act, &c. Given at the Castle of Dublin, 3 Oct., 1618. God save the King.

At an account held at Christmas Harford's house, being Mayor, for the Town rents and petty custom, before the Mayor, Recorder, Bayliffs, and other Aldermen, 8 Dec., 1618, It was ordered, &c., that from Mich., 1617, the new Mayor shall receive all the Michas. rents belonging to the Corporation, and also the next Easter rents, and all other rents and duties of the Town, and no more, and account at the next Hollentide after he leaves his Mayoraltie. Mem. Same day, Mr. John Avery, Ald., was discharged of all accounts up to 1614, when he was Mayor. It. Mr. Richard Gough, Ald., was cleared for 1616. It. James Gough, Ald., do. for 1617. It. Mr. John Avery, Ald., do. for 1618, and stands in arrear 30li., which he is bound to Christmas Harford to pay him 1 March. It. That whereas John Willson did receive part of the petty customs for this Corporation, from 25 March, 1613, till Midsummer following, which by the books amounted to 101i. 1s. 9d. for which he never accounted; now as he swears that he received but very small portion thereof, and referred himself to our order, we agree he shall pay 40s, for clearance of same, and that he shall retain said 40s, till the Town redeem from him the Clock-house with the payment of 5li, according to Lord Boyle's order made in that behalf, said Willson to accept the 40s. in part payment, and 3li. from the Town; to which he assented. It. Same time, Wm. Lewellen, customer, Thomas Holdshippe and Randal Brian, searcher, made an account of the petty custom received by them from Mich. 1617, to Mich. 1618, which amounted in the outgate and ingate to 83li. 6s. 7d., besides 20li. 5s. which they owed, the whole 103li. 11s. 7d. These disbursements we perused, and with their allowance for collecting amounting unto 98li. 19s. 5d. Debt to the Town, 4li. 12s. 2d., which we received and disposed for the affairs of the Town. Therefore we discharge said Llewellen Holdshippe and Brian.

Christmas Harford, Mayor; Law. Parsons, Recorder. Jasper Walshe and Ran. Bruyn, Ball.; John Averye.

Also, the aforesaid Llewellen, Holdship and Bruyn did make their account of the petty customs from 28 Jan. 1614 to Mich. 1615, and from do, to Mich. 1616, which amounted to 136li. 16s. 6d. Whereof they made an account before the then Mayor, Recorder, Bayliffs, and 6 Ald., how they had disbursed for repairing the walls, &c., for the good of the Town, and making the gaol within the inner gate, 121li. 9s., so rested in their hands 151i. 7s. But before this time these petty customs were of small value, received by the Mayor for the time being, sometimes by the Waterbailiff, &c. But it grew to no value until the Lo. Boyle caused the foresaid officers of the Custom-house to receive for the town, and that I, the Recorder, drew it into this kind of account. Said parties made another account formerly of the receipt of these petty customs from Mich. 1616 to Mich. 1617, 891i. 12s. 7d., including the arreare of 151i. 7s. 6d. Also of the like disbursements 66li. 7s. 8d., so rested in their hands 23li. 5s., whereof 3li. was given to the Recorder for my pains for ballancing that account; and for 201i. 5s. they have accounted at Mich. 1618, set down on their next former lease. John Avery; Law. Parsons, Recorder; T. Houldshippe, Ball.

8 Jan., 1618. Curia le D. H., tenta apud le Youghall.

As Cornelius Lorgan, broguemaker, hath been long drummer of this Town, and whereas he hath been appointed of late by Christ. Harford, then Mayor, &c., to beat the drum at the hour of eight in the night throughout the Town, for the setting and calling the watch together, to undertake their charge, small allowance or none at all afforded unto him for his pains, beside his charge of finding lanthorn and candle light to carry about with him, insomuch he is discouraged to further serve therein, unless he be allowed wages, &c. It is by consent of the Mayor, &c., that so long as he shall continue his charge for beating the drum, and in his absence by his deputy he be paid 20s. yearly by the Mayor out of the petty custom, and be free from all tax and tallage, &c., the Corporation finding drum heads for his drum.

Mem. That a little hollow room, wrought and extended into the great wall underneath the pair of stairs leading to the ancient gealde hawle, near the North Gate, is demised, &c., to David fz. Morris, Ainster (?), broguemaker, for 31 years, paying per annum 2s. and a good watch hen at every Shrovetide to the Mayor. It. Michæl Boyle, gent., on his petition, admitted free paying 22s. It. Thomas Nugent, mercht., on do., for that he married a freeman's daughter, admitted free paying 40s. It. Alex. Hills, mason carver, in consideration of his making two sun dyals, each of the value of 40s., one upon the head of the Corn Market, the other upon the foreside of the Trinity gate, before Midsummer next, be admitted a freeman at large.

16 Jan., 1618. An assembly of the Mayor, &c., in the house of Mr. Christ. Harford, then Mayor, with their consent and that of Mr. John Wilson, key master, it was agreed, &c., on the behalf of said John Wilson and Hue Slyman, waterbailiff, that said Slyman shall have the benefit, &c., of all such timber, wood, and straw, besides the two sticks of wood, accustomable, that shall be laid upon the key for 24 hours together, from the North corner to the South corner next before the gate, after the rate of one penny per ton, &c., and likewise for such beer as shall be landed upon the before-named place at said key, in case same exceed not above 20 barrels, under condition that said Hue shall keep clean the said key by this appointment, from the South stairs unto the North corner.

Lismore, 24 Feb., 1618. On the matter of Controversy between the Corporation of Youghall and Ulick Burke, clk., touching the lease of the Spittle land (which, as well by the reference from the Chancellor, as by the consent of all parties is referred to me) on consideration I award, that Burke shall surrender his lease to the Town at the next D. H., and that the Mayor, &c. shall regrant unto him the same land and term now remaining of his former lease, upon these conditions, viz., that after Mich. next he shall yearly pay for the same the rent of 5li. to the Mayor, &c., whereof 20s. to be as a rent to the Town, the other 4li. to be yearly paid by the Mayor, as a stipend to some Schoolmaster to be provided by the Town, to teach the petty scholars, and make them fit for the free-school here; and that Burke shall within three years from Mich. next put such a sufficient

roof upon the old Lazar house walls near Youghal, as I shall think fit, to be put up and thatched at his own charge, except the town shall give him the carriage of timber from the Key where it is landed, and for non-performance his lease to be void, that he shall be discharged from keeping any school there from May-day next, and from any lazars or lepers, or repairing that house after it is once so built. (This order was made by Riche. Earl of Corke.)

9 April, 1619. Curia le D. H. tenta apud de Youghall, &c.

Ordered by the Maior, &c., that every housekeeper of the Town and liberties shall be provided of a halbert or a blackbill, to have in readiness, &c., to come to the watch at night, and not to come with sword or pike, for it is not sufficient weapon in peaceable tymes, &c.; each of them to pay 5s. to the Mayor before May day next, or their halbert and blackbill by Midsummer next, under pain of 6s. 8d. It. That every freeman that is clear of his master, and not 'prentice or partner with any man, shall watch when his turn comes, on pain of a noble. It. That every housekeeper before Midsummer shall provide sufficient weapon or munition for the setting forth of one man for the strength of the Town, to have a good sword by his side, a colliver or musquet upon his shoulder, powder and bullets accordingly; and every man that hath not a piece shall have a good sword by his side, a lance or pike upon his shoulder, on pain of 40s.

It. That every resident within the Town and liberties shall train and muster thrice a year for the good of the Town, viz., May day and Easter Tuesday, from the age of 16 to 50, Aldermen and those of the Council excepted, to be ready to accompany the Mayor, every man to have a sword by his side, and a pike or a sword, and a piece with powder, and if he fail, to pay 10s.; and it shall be lawful for a constable, with the Captain or officer authorised by him, to take their distress.

It. That Richd. Dixon, yeoman, be a freeman at large.

25 June, 1619. Curia le D. H. tenta apud villam Youghall, &c.

Whereas, upon a C. D. H., held 9 April, 1619, it was concluded, for the defence of the town, that every householder should, before Midsummer next, provide sufficient weapon for setting forth one man for the strength of the Town, to have a sword by his side, a musquet upon his shoulder, powder and bullets, or a good sword by his side. It is now ordered by the

Mayor, &c., with the advice of Richd. Lord Boyle, being present, that Mr. Nicholas Gallwaine, Ald., Tho. Ronane, Ald., Mr. Rich. Bluet, and Mr. Wm. Lluelline, gent., shall be commissioners to rate every householder of the Town for the finding of weapons before next D. H., to be in readiness on pain of 5s. Irish, &c., and that the commissioners come together upon St. Peter's day, on pain of 40s., and that the Town Clerk attend with the Roll of the townsmen's names, on like pain; and that all masters of companies for these three years past shall bring a note of all such as were admitted of their several companies on S. Peter's day, on pain of 40s.

Mem. Richard Lo. Boyle brought into Court these several writings, viz., Those that belong to the Common land, the Chauntry land, viz., the lease the Corporation made to W^m. Lluelline of the common land, the deed of mortgage which the Corporation made to John Gallwaine, the letter of attorney made under the Common Seal to Robt. Coppinger, &c., the rental of the Chantry land the now Mayor hath in his keeping, the deed John Gallwaine made to the Lo. Boyle, the counterpaune of a lease made to Henry Hazard for parcel of the Chantry lands, containing three little slips.

Freemen: Sir Will, Finton, Knt.; Thomas Francklen, Will Ronayne paid for his bucket, 5s.

This Indenture, made — June, 1619, between Christmas Harford, Mayor of Youghal, Jasper Walshe, and Randell Bruyn, gent., Bayl. and Burg., on the one part, and John Willson, mercht., and Grace his wife of the other. Witnesseth, that said Mayor and Bayl., &c., have granted unto J. W. and G., &c., every parcel of mess. or house room in Y. parcel of the Chantry lands within said town, from the Kings Street on W. and the Chantry lands on E. S. and N., now in the tenure of said Willson, for 59 years, yielding yearly to the Mayor, &c., 4s., &c.

To all people, &c., we, John Barker, Humfrie Hooke, and R ichard Long, of the city of Bristol, mercht., owners of the ship "Heveyn of Bristol," whereof George Edgill went master last voyage, and part laders of her, and John Whitson, John Tomlinson, Andrew Charleton, Humfrie Browne, and Thomas Rowland, of afsd. city, being also merchants, laders, &c., Greeting, Whereas the said ship and the goods laden were of late, by reason of tempestuous wind and weather, cast away near the bar of Youghall, and divers of her goods, munition, and furniture, were, as we are given to understand, afterwards carried ashore, all which belong unto us, Know ye that

we, said owners, &c., appoint our friends James Oliver and George Nethwaie, of afsd. city, merch¹⁵., our lawful attorneys to recover all such goods, &c., as belong to said ship which were saved; in which ship there were laden 10 butts of sack marked with this mark B, 108 butts marked oo, 30 butts marked AC, besides other goods, &c. In witness whereof we have put our hands, &c., 28 Dec., 1618, in the presence of Andrew Barker, Richard Ashie, Henry Crone, George Hartwell. And I, John Guy, Mayor of the city of Bristol, do make known that the afsd. names, J. Barker, H. Hooke, R. Longe, J. Whittson, J. Tomlinson, A. Charleton, H. Browne, and T. Rowland, are rightful owners, &c. In witness, and I have subscribed my name and caused the seal of the city to be affixed. (Copia vera.) Rich. Ronayne, Dep. Clk. Vill. Youghal.

Mem. 4 Ap., 1620. W^m. Bluet, Esq., Mayor, gave his consent unto Mr. John Wilson that the lease made unto John Bateman, waterman, dec., for 10 acres of the Town's common land, lying near Edw. Balies' (?) house, be made over unto Edw^d. Baynard, gent., for the remainder of the term. W^m. Bluet, Mayor.

6 Aug., 1619. At an assembly held by Christmas Harford, Mayor, Jasper Wallshe, and Randell Bruen, Ball, &c.:

Capt. Edw^d. Baynard brought into the Court a lease, dated 31 July, 1602, for the gardens of the Chauntrie lands made by Sir Daniel Sowlin, priest, for 31 years, for the rent of 8s., to Rich^d. Monsie.

It. Sir Walter Rawlie, Knt., Mayor of Youghull, John Forest, John Gitto, Ball., made a lease, 6 June, 1590, of the one half of the house parcel of the Chantry lands, to Will. ——, and Johan his wife, for 59 years, for the yearly rent of 3s. 4d. It. 10 Jan., 1594. Oliver Grandisone. - Whereas it is grown more frequent of late than former times within this Kingdom, amongst all sorts of people, as well noblemen as others, to send their sons to foreign countries to be brought up in Schools and Universities, &c., beyond the seas; and it is observed by daily experience, that learning without true religion doth but arm the minds of ill-affected persons to the bolder undertaking of any seditious enterprises. Because we find, as well by advice given us in law as by experience, that thorough toll of any goods, &c., coming to the market, taken at the gates or in the street, is oppressive, especially where there is no bridge to be maintained, and that the same is a great hinderance to the market, therefore, altho' the taking thereof hath been a custom in this town, It is agreed, for the encouragement of the country to resort to the market, that no such thorough toll shall hereafter be taken by the porters or any other—except only 1d. for every beast, horse, or garran coming to the market to be sold, or for any cart or wain that comes or goes laden in or out of town.

It. That the foreign butchers keep their meat covered and not sell any until after the first ringing of the market bell, about 9 of the clock, and continue no longer, until said bell be rung again, about 4 of the clock, and the like course to be observed by foreign bakers, shoemakers, glovers, and on pain of forfeiture as aforesaid.

It. That the Clerk of the Market shall see that no person buy any com in market to sell again, nor any more than may reasonably serve for his own provision, and to make known to the Mayor the buyers of any great proportion, or any person that shall buy anything coming towards the market; that no common baker, brewer, or victualler shall buy or give earnest for any corn out of the market, till after three of the clock in the afternoon; that the commons and poor people of the town and liberties may be first served; and further, that no bag of corn shall be opened to be sold in the market till after the first ringing of the market bell about 10 of the clock upon pain of forfeiture and seizure. And if any poor people come to be served after 3 of the clock, the clerk of the market shall see them supplied out of any corn bought by a common baker, brewer, or victualler paying rateably for same.

It. That every butcher—shall for the public good—bring to the market the hide and tallow, with the flesh, to be sold there, that the hides and fell may be seen if the cattle were stollen or ill-come by.

The duty of the Clerk of the Market and his fees, who is to be appointed by the Maior:

Mom. Whereas 13 Oct., 1620, Wm. Llewellen, Esq., then Mayor, John Coppinger and Teige O Dawe, Ball., &c., in C. D. H., made a bye-law, that no freeman, &c., should buy or send into England for any Ale, Bristow, or English beer to retail same within the Town, &c., by the whole vessel or smaller measures on pain of 10s. for every barrel so bought, which bye-law hath been discontinued with much prejudice to the Corporation, so that there is no utterance of any Ale or beer brewed within said Town (how good soever it be), or malt uttered from the townsmen, and long tolerating the innkeepers, &c., to buy the Bristowe ale and beer that comes out of England in that daily abundance, as now they do. For prevention, &c., the Mayor, &c., at the C. D. H. held 29 April, 1627, agreed that the above order shall stand, only the penalty of 10s. to be 5s. upon every barrel of ale or English beer. [On margin—Referred to the Earl of Corke and allowed by him.]

It That no freeman or other inhabitant within Y. shall buy or agree with any farmer for any stacks, ricks, or mowes of corn or grain coming to the market, to augment the prices of same on pain of 5li., but whoever will traffic shall take same when it comes into the market to be sold, at the days and hours allowed by law. It. That Chrismas Harford, Ald., in case he be molested by Tho. Ronayne, Ald., touching a parcel of land called Glawnebegg, which he holds for a yearly rent (that said Ronayne lays a kind of claim upon), then said Christmas shall have a lease for his quiet enjoying same. It. At last C. D. H., 7 Jan., 1624, it was ordered, that James Walshe, gen., should have a letter of Attorney to enter the Town lands, &c., and take distresses, &c., which order it hath pleased the Mayor, &c., to take from said Walshe and confirm upon Christmas Harford, Ald. It. That the mortgage concerning the Market-house shall be perfected to Nich. Gallwan, Ald., the old lease to be delivered up and Rich. Goughe, Ald., is attorney to deliver possession. It. A Proclamation concerning Warlike Munition and wearing Mantles, Trouses, and Skeines.

By the Lord Deputy and Council of Ireland.

Henry Falkeland.—Whereas for the prevention of rebellions, &c., as might grow by disloyal people having means to arm themselves, &c., against his Majr., and divers proclamations have been published by the Lo.-Deputy, &c., commanding that no master of any ship, &c., or any tradesman, &c., should bring into this kingdom, without special license of the Lords of the Council in England, or hire any gunpowder, musquets, Cullivers, hand-guns, pistols or Peeces, morrions, headpeeces, armors, &c., (swords and rapiers, and sword and rapier blades excepted) on pain of seizure, one moiety to the informer, the other to his Maj. use. And being now informed that great quantities of powder, &c., have been lately brought into this Kingdom from foreign parts, and sale made to all sorts of people, so as many loose kearnes and idle Persons of lewd behaviour, &c., being armed with powder, peces, &c., do not only make great spoil of red and fallow deer and other game within the upper lands of sundry noblemen, but are rather emboldened to commit divers in solent riots, bulglaries, robberies, and murders, and many times to run into open rebellion, &c. And that after so many warnings, &c., we may inflict the utmost penalty, yet hoping that by renewing the former proclamations once more, the same will be more strictly observed, we do again in the name of the King, &c., command that no master, &c., of any

ship, or any merchant, &c., shall from henceforth bring into this kingdom. without special license from the Lords of the Council of England, or of this kingdom, any quantity of gunpowder, any musquets, &c., on pain of seizure, &c. And if any person hereafter shall have any gunpowder, or any musquets, &c., in his possession with intent to sell same, within one month after the date of this proclamation, on pain of seizure, &c., he shall bring such powder, &c., into one of his Maj. stores of ordnance, &c., and the owner paid for same. Provided that every City or Town within this realm retain within their stores such powder for the necessity of defence of such cities, so that within forty days they certify to the Lord Deputy, &c., the quantity of powder they have in their stores. And further, that if any nobleman, &c., of any city, or owner of barque or ship going to sea shall occasion to use any reasonable quantity of powder, or any musquets, &c., that they shall, by the warrant of the Lo.-Deputy, be furnished with such quantity of powder at such easy rates as his Majv. doth usually issue the same to the army; and we do charge all Governors, Mayors, &c., within every port, &c., to seize on such gunpowder, musquets, &c., as shall be brought to this kingdom to be sold. And it shall not be lawful for any person wearing any Irish Mantles or Trowses to keep any musquets, &c., on pain to forfeit same. And it shall be lawful for every nobleman and gentleman conforming themselves unto the English fashion of apparel to seize and carry same to the next Justice of peace, to be delivered into his Majs, next magazine; and whereas heretofore many instructions have been given, as well to the Lord President, the Justices of Assize, &c., for abolishing the use of Irish apparel and reducing all men to wear and use a civil and comely attire according to the laws of this kingdom, &c., yet, although they have endeavoured to take away the barbarous custom of wearing Mantles, Trouses, Skeines, and such uncivil apparel, we see the use of them rather increased than abated, to the disgrace of this kingdom amongst civil nations, &c. We hereby once more give notice that as his Majy, hath recommended the care to us, we intend to inflict the utmost penalty upon such as presume to wear said barbarous attire, or suffer any within their families or rule to wear same. And we command, that after 1 Aug. next no man do wear any Mantle, Trowses, or long Skeines, &c., and that they attire themselves, their children, servants, and followers as the civilest subjects of this kingdom, in default to be proceeded against for contempt

in the severest manner, and that from henceforth no person use any Irish apparel or weapon to the intent to sell the same, &c., and that no person wearing Irish apparel shall presume to come or be admitted at the Council table, or any Court of Justice, nor before any Judge or Magistrate, on any cause of private complaint. And we command all Sheriffs, &c., that if they find any man (after Penticost) that shall wear any long Skeyne, to take same and break them, and such as they shall find wearing Mantles or Trowses out of their own houses, to take same from them, and before their faces to cut them in pieces. Provided always that it may be lawful to wear same within their own houses.

A Proclamation containing the Laws and Orders of War, for the good conduct of the Service of Ireland.

Henry Lord Viscount Falkland, one of the Lords of his Maj. P. C. of England and Lo.-Deputy of Ireland, to all colonels, captains, &c., to whom these laws shall concern, as no good service can be where no military discipline is observed and rules laid down, I have set down these laws follow-

ing, that all persons in this army, or within my charge man of the penalties for the breakers of them:

- 1. First, we owe our highest duties to him from whon as from the first fountain, and must receive our successes Lord of hosts. I do straightly command all command the army to see, that Almighty God be served, that sern evening prayer be diligently frequented, and that the absent themselves be duly punished.
- 2. Let no man speak impiously and maliciously aga Blessed Trinity, or any of the three persons, that is to s &c., or against the known articles of the Christian i death.
- 3. Let no man blaspheme God's holy name or use execrations, or commit any irreligious act to the derogati upon pain of loss of his pay, imprisonment, and such as a Martial court shall think his offence deserves.
- 4. No man shall use any traitorous words against royal authority, upon pain of death.
- 5. No man, whether he be soldier or other English conference or intelligence with any enemy or rebel the against his Majy, or receive any such within the camp, o Castle, or Garrison, or send any victual, munition, or enemy or rebel in action, on pain of death, except those in command of the army in my absence, or speaenemy or rebel.
- 6. No man shall run to the enemy or rebel that is the army without license, or from the garrison or co death.
- 7. No man shall commit any murder, or kill any per any, or draw any sword in private quarrel, to offer viole or garrison, upon pain of death.
- 8. No man shall force or ravish any woman upo adulterers and fornicators shall be punished by imprifrom the army, or such other penalty as by the M thought meet.
 - 9. No man shall steal or take by force any treasur

Majr., or take by force from any person any money, arms, apparel, &c., being value of 12d., in marching, &c., on pain of death.

- 10. No man shall deliver any Town, Castle, Fort, &c., without warrant, or depart from any straight or passage, which he is commanded to make good, or take pasporte of the enemy or any rebel in action from any troops, or make any ignominious composition with the enemy, on pain of death.
- 11. No man shall throw away his arms, or abandon his Ensigns or Guidon, or fly away in any battle, &c., upon pain of death.
- 12. No man being set sentinel shall sleep, or appointed by the officers of the guard, &c., to place him, shall depart without warrant, on pain of death.
- 13. No man shall offer any violence, or disobey his commander, or do any act, or speak any words which are like to breed any mutiny in the army, &c., or impeach the obeying of the general, &c., on pain of death.
- 14. No man shall outrage or do violence to any that comes with victuals to the army, &c., on pain of death.
- 15. No man that carries arms, or pretends to be a soldier, shall remain three days in the army after it is on foot, except he be enrolled in some company, on pain of death.
- 16. No soldier shall burn any house or lodging, or burn or spoil any corn, ship or boat, or carriage, &c., that may serve for the provision of the army, without he be commanded so to do by the general, &c., on pain of death.
- 17. No man shall depart a mile out of the army or camp, except he be lawfully warranted, upon pain of death.
- 18. No soldier shall break his order to follow any route or chase to seek any prey or spoil, except commanded by such as have authority, upon pain of death,
- 19. No man that hath passport for any limited time shall exceed that time, except he was stayed by the hand of God, upon pain of death.
- 20. No provider, or officer of his Maj. victuals or munition shall embezill or give false account to the general, with purpose to deceive, on pain of death.
- 21. No man shall wilfully, or through gross ignorance fail in coming to the rendesvous or garrison assigned to him by the General or other principal officer, upon pain of death.

- 22. No soldiers in musters shall act for another, or muster in a false name to defraud his Majy, upon pain
- 23. No Captain shall through corruption, wilful, c suffer his company to grow weak, or practice to deframuster, on pain of imprisonment and ignominious baarmy.
- 24. No Captain, &c., shall give passport to any, or once enrolled, without warrant from the General, &c., or place and imprisonment.
- 25. No soldier shall depart from his captain, or serve without licence, though he serve still in the army, on pe
- 26. It. That no soldier do sell or lay in pawn his hany part of his furniture, arms, or apparel, on any prepain of death.
- 27. Nor, that any inhabitant in Town or country shapawn any part of same on pain of imprisonment at the Lo.-Deputy, and forfeit double the value of any such laid to pawn.
- 28. It. That all bands of footmen shall in passing to ther countries in obedience, to go to any garrison, man holding the direct way to same; and that no Captain, & of want commit any waste, spoil, &c., or extort any vicin lieu of victuals, but content themselves with meat ar not taking any allowance for dead pays, but for the nu have in their company for a supper and a breakfast in pain of such punishment as the Lo.-Deputy shall think. Sheriffs, &c., shall provide such diet and lodging for them fit, for which the Captain is to give ready money, and f deliver his ticket to be satisfied by the Captains or Sold as all occasion of offence shall be removed from all good
- 29. It. If any horseman shall loose his horse or he any part of his armour by negligence, &c., so as to be this duty until he receive the same, he shall re-serve in pioneer, and receive such further punishment at the disc Deputie.
 - 30. It. When any prey or spoile shall be taken from

when the army is in the field, or residing in garrison upon the borders. That no officer or soldier do attempt to purloin any part upon death, but shall endeavour to keep the same together, to be disposed of at the direction of the Lord Deputy or other by me authorized.

- 31. It. That no Captain, &c., that shall take any prisoner shall presume to deliver upon ransom, but that within 24 hours he shall make same known to the Lo.-Deputy, and deliver the prisoner to the Provost Marshal on pain of death.
- 32. No inhabitant in City, &c., shall receive any soldier into their service not having authority, neither shall any conceal any such runaway, or use means to convey them out of the kingdom, &c., but apprehend all such, and deliver them over to the Provost Marshal on pain of imprisonment, or such other punishment as the Lo.-Deputy shall authorize.
- 33. That no Magistrate of any City, &c., shall presume to imprison the body of any soldier above 24 hours, or inflict any punishment on him for any offence, but deliver all such to the Provost Marshal to be tried by speedy course of Marshal law.
- 34. All captains shall be diligent in training their companies, careful in governing them and in providing for them, that they do the duties of soldiers as they hope for favour, &c.
- 35. All captains, &c., that have command of companies, shall see they do orderly quarter, and to entrench and fortify as much of the quarter as they are commanded, upon pain of loss of their place.
- 36. No man shall spoil or take the goods of any that dieth, or is killed in service, on pain of restoring double the value. But the goods of such as die in the army, if they make a will by writing or word shall be disposed according to the will; if they make no will it shall be distributed to the hurt, sick and poor of the company whereof the soldier was, or go to the Hospital of the army.
- 37. No man shall go out of the army but by ordinary ways, upon pain of imprisonment.
- 38. No man shall give any disgraceful words, &c., in his army, on pain of imprisonment, public disarming and banishment from the army, as men for ever after disabled to carry arms. And as I forbid all men under my rule to renew any old quarrels, or begin any new, so I acquit all men that have quarrels offered to them or challenge made to them of any disgrace,

since they do but their duties as soldiers, who ought to set to Marshall discipline, and they that provoke them set as breakers of all discipline and enemies of the go service.

- 39. And because drunkeness is the mother of many of orders in armies, every soldier or officer that shall be be committed to prison for the first offence, for the second soldier he shall besides his imprisonment forfeit two officer, he shall loose his place; the third time, shall have as the Marshal court shall set down.
- 40. Every private man and soldier upon pain of it keep silence when the army is to take lodging, or when embattling, so as the officer be heard and their comman
- 41. No soldier serving on foot shall carry any boy, no be suffered to follow the army, upon pain of such pun by the Lo.-Deputy.
- 42. All Captains, &c., shall do their endeavours to d punishment all offenders, shall assist the officers, &c., their slackness and be censured at the Marshal court.

A Proclamation concerning the plague, to prevent the same.

By the Lo.-Deputy and Council of Ireland.

Henry Falkland.—Forasmuch as the infection of the plague is at this present very great, and dispersed very far as well in the Cities of London and Westminster, as divers other parts of the Kingdom, We, the Lord Deputy, &c., taking into consideration that great peril might ensue not only to the City of Dublin (being the chief seat of state), but other of this Kingdom, by reason of the continual trade, &c., between the two kingdoms, and especially between the City of London (where the sickness now chiefly reigneth) and this City of Dublin, if people of all sorts should be suffered freely to resort hither without control, and merchants bring and open their wards within the cities, &c., of this Kingdom, before trial be made whether they be free from infection or not. For prevention of such lamentable events we have ordered, that no passengers, merchants of what degree soever shall be suffered to land or come ashore from any parts beyond the seas into any harbour, &c., within this Kingdom, without special license of the Mayor, &c., of the City, &c., when the ship in which they are brought shall come to an anchor, on pain of imprisonment, &c. And we further charge that no Mayor, &c., of any town shall give leave to any persons coming from beyond the seas to land on shore or unlade any wares, &c... within their jurisdictions, before they have first manned a boat unto them to enquire from what parts the ship shall come and what wares she hath on board, and whether any part come from London, the Low Countries, or any other suspected place of infection, and in what condition the passengers, merchants, skippers within said ship, and state of health; to be examined by the corporal oath of the master, owner, &c., of the ship before some person that shall have authority, and if they discover the persons or wares were brought from any infected place, they shall not suffer them to be brought within the site of any City, &c., until said have been aired for 30 days, and the passengers by the space of 20 days, on pain of imprisonment and fine. And to begin a good example unto other parts of this

kingdom, we, the Lord Deputy, &c., order that two conv deal boards be erected for the port of Dublin, a convenie the city, at the charge of the fermors of the customs, the r bursed by the collectors of this Port, one of which hou keeping all wares coming from beyond the seas to this hart &c., for 30 days, the other for the entertainment of such come from beyond the seas to be lodged, &c., for 20 days, admitted into the city, (such persons only excepted as have show of sickness or urgent employment concerning his Majo said house to be provided with meat, drink, and lodging, & abode there, upon reasonable rate, &c., requiring all Mayors, forthwith take care to have two like houses built within ev at like distance from the city or town, &c., as from the waters to be likewise allowed by the fermors of the customs, &c., f airing the goods and entertainment of the passengers. A Proclamation to declare that all ships carrying corn, &c., or any munitions of war to or for the King of Spain, or any of his subjects, shall be esteemed a lawful prize.

Forasmuch as the many injuries, &c., obtruded upon the King's Majv. and his most dear and only sister and her children, and his royal father of ever blessed memory, dec., by the King of Spain, under the colour of treaties, &c., and violences offered by him to divers of his subjects, in taking, staying, &c., divers of them in a hostile manner, whilst they intended only their merchandize at sea. The King of Spain's ambition to aspire to an universal monarchy, discovered to the whole world, to the disquieting of that peace which other princes and states his neighbours would gladly rest in and enjoy, have out of necessity drawn his Most Excell. Majv. to take up arms against the said King, for the defence of himself and his dominions, &c., forseeing that whilst the said King of Spain continueth in these courses of hostility it is neither agreeable with the rules of policy or law of nations to permit the said king, &c., to be supplied with corn, victuals, arms, &c.,

A Proclamation against the transportation of Cattle.

Henry Falkland.—Forasmuch as since our last restraint of carrying some kinds of cattle out of this kingdom, and that restraint released upon some reasons, especially that no new venture would ensue, all manner of persons have so applied themselves to that kind of transportation, now by general complaints from all parts of the great scarcity of Cattle, as well in the country as in all markets, so much as the inhabitants of the kingdom cannot for money be duly furnished with ordinary diet, and that the store of

THE CHURCHWARDENS TO DESTROY HOGS FOUND IN THE CHURCHYARD. 133

Whereas a complaint was made of the great number of hogs that are kept within this town, and the little care they have to restrain them within their yards, but do suffer them to range up and down the streets, lanes and byeways, insomuch that they are accustomed to enter into the churchyard, to the great incomodity of same, it is therefore decreed that it shall be lawful for the churchwarden or any other by him authorized, to kill or destroy (for a reasonable redemption) any hog which he or they shall find in the churchyard, provided there be six days warning given by the drum, whereby the neighbours may take notice.

Mem. Thomas Stoute, gent., promised before the Mayor, &c., in facie curia tunc sedentis, to pay 500li. if he shall fail in this condition following, viz., That neither he, Tho. Stoute, nor Mathew Brewnning, Esq., shall buy, &c., any malt or corn with intent to brew from any person, but only the inhabitants and freemen of this town, market-days only excepted, and then an affidavid to be made that it was not engrossed beforehand, and to this effect they are to enter bonds of 500li. to be made to one of the Alden, to the use of the Corporation to continue during the restraint of Bristol beer. It. That whatever innkeeper, &c., that useth to keep an ordinary that shall presume to ask for any extraordinary for their ordinary meals, shall be fined 10s. being correspondent to a decree by the Lord President, &c., 20 July, 1626. It. That Richard Bluett, in consideration of his decrepid old age and good service, shall have 40s. yearly, being now blind and destitute. It. John Challenger is to have 20s. yearly to relieve a fatherless orphan that was left on this Corporation.

Copy of Lo.-President's letter to the Mayor, concerning building a battery at the old Block-house.

Mr. Mayor, my Lord of Corcke, and I, meeting yesterday, about the dispatch of Ensigne Steward, well weighing the draught of your proposition, do find cause to make some alteration thereof in form though not in matter or substance, and do send you here enclosed a draught, as we conceive it fit to be presented to the hands of his Majy., and do pray you to cause the same to be ratified and subscribed by as many as was the former, and sent

to me with as much convenient speed as you can, for that we find Mr. Steward very hasty of his despatch. And so I bid you farewell. Your loving friend, &c. W^m. S^t. Leger. Mogoly, 1 March, 1627.

The enclosed being engrossed and signed as the former, I would have it speedily returned by an express, and you to meet me on Wednesday, at Tallagh, without fail, and to stay a ship for Mr. Steward, if in case the wind stand fair for England, of which as yet there is no likelihood.

The answer made by the Mayor, &c., to the proposition, grounded on His Majys letters made unto us by the Lo.-Pres. of Munster, &c., the Earl of Cork for a Fort, at their own proper charges, &c., for the better securing of said town and harbour.

Seeing your honour, &c., zealous of the safety of this town and harbour, do find by judicious survey that some better fortification than we have at this present is absolutely necessary, and not satisfied with such primative answers as we have been forced to make, do urge us to debate with ourselves, and set down our answers to your Lops. propositions for such a Fort, sufficient for a defence and prevention of any foreign attempt in a time so dangerous.

We, the Maior, &c., to give testimony to the loyalty inherent in us from our ancestors, by a ready assent, &c., for furtherance of his Majr. service, do submit unto your Lops. opinion that a battery which we undertake to erect and maintain at our cost, and defend against all his Majr. enemies to the expense of our dearest drop of blood may be sufficient.

And as much as our uttermost ability can effect for our safety and defence, the rather in regard of the uncertain shifting and shallowness of the barre viewed and sounded by your honors, and remonstrated unto your Lops. by pilots, this day there being no danger of any great fleets or armies neither needs there so huge a provision to confront the approach of those whom nature itself hath already denied access. As for attempts by land, the harbour can be no better secured by a great Fort than by such a battery as your Lop. proposed to have erected without charge to his highness whereby will be avoided the taking away our Petty Customs, Keyage, and other grants of the Crown, the aggrievance of us and of all strangers and merchant traders, the disproportion of trades which will be drawn on us

by embracing the former propositions, which of all our whole estates were able to make and finish, yet is not our whole revenue sufficient to uphold and maintain. So consequently it would be abandoned and fall to ruin, and in conclusion would produce the depopulation of this corporation and hold, so ancient and convenient for his Majys. occasions, &c.

For command of the whole harbour, whereby no ship may come into us, or ride safely in the same, we approve of your Lops. judgements, that the mouth of the Key of Youghall, where now standeth the old blockhouse, to be the most convenient place where we, in approbation of your Lops. appointment, do undertake with the said old Blockhouse and new work, such as you have prescribed, to erect a battery 50 feet square, cast into such a model and built in such strength and form as your Lop. shall direct as fittest for offence and defence, with a parapet of thickness 6 feet and a curtain also of same thickness next the key wall, on the backside of said battery, of height to defend it from such land attempts as may be made upon it, the other three sides being invironed with the sea.

Only in this we humbly entreat your honour to become suitors unto his Majy. for us, that unto the two pieces of brass ordnance we have already, his Highness will be pleased to add other six pieces to be employed in said battery for our defence, and that his Majy. withdraw not from us our poor revenue, &c., of our key and harbour, without which our ports, walls and keys cannot be upheld, nor suspect the confidence his Maj. royal father hath reposed in us. Whereunto these considerations following, besides many others, may be no small motives to induce.

First, for our encouragement, in regard our readiness to undergo this charge and costs to render this harbour of Youghal as convenient a chamber and receptacle for landing of his Majys. forces out of the west of England, as Ireland hath.

Secondly. The experience of our loyal service and affection unto his Maj^{ys} imperial crown, witnessed upon the death of Queen Elizabeth, by our entertainment of King James' forces, when divers the most remarkable cities of this province did deny to receive them.

And Lastly, that for the most part we and all English conformable to his Maj⁷⁸. laws, as well ecclesiastical as civil, and for the natives amongst us they are such affection, good proof hath been had. In all which we

commit our humble suit to your honors, &c., and have hereunto subscribed our hands, 11 Feb. 1627.

Copy of His Majys. letter to Earl of Corcke, Sir Wm. St. Leger, Lo.-Pres. of Mounster, concerning building of a Fort at Youghal.

Charles Rex. Right trusty, &c. We have considered a proposition made to us by Francis Steward, Ensigne, to Capt. Will. Steward, concerning the erecting a Fort at Youghall, and defending same without charge to our cessors, he hath represented unto us many inconveniences already happened to our subjects trading there, the dangers threatening the town for want of such to secure the harbour. It is our pleasure that you consider such proposition, that you view the town and fittest place for erecting a Fort, make an estimate of the charge, what ward may be put into it, and lastly, how the whole charge may be borne without charging our coffers, which for the present are in no sort to be burdened therewith; hereof we require you to report what you find, and advise, &c. At our palace of Westminster, 20 Dec., 3rd year of our reign.

The proposition made by Francis Steward to the King, for the maintinance of a Fort at Youghull being built, is by way of imposition to be laid upon these particulars following:

First, whereas the Fort will be the honor and safety of the harbour, and commerce, and traffic of the town, that it may please his Majz. as a most fit perquisite to give order that all customs, duties, and demands now imposed by the Corporation of Youghull to be levied, &c., for the Key of Y., with the anchorages, &c., formerly collected, may be laid to for the yearly maintenance of said Fort, and that his Majz. may grant to the town some reasonable satisfaction for what they have disbursed for said quay.

And that there may be an imposition upon every cow, of 6d.; upon every sheep, 1½d.; upon every decker of hides, 12d.; upon every sack of wool and hops, 12d.; on every barrel of barrelled goods, 6d.; upon every tun of bar iron which shall come over the barre of Youghull, not made in this realm of Ireland, 5s.; upon every tun of bar iron transported out of the harbour, and shall be made in this kingdom and carried to any other port within this realm, 12d.; upon every tun of bar iron transported out of the realm, which shall be made in same realm, 2s.

The answer of the Corporation of Youghull, it being required of them by Sir W^m. St. Leger, Kt., Lo.-Pres. of Mounster, and Rich^d. Earl of Corke, to signify their opinions touching the proposition made unto the King's Majv. by Ensign Francis Steward, for the erecting and maintenance of a Fort in the harbour of Youghull.

We, his Majys. most humble subjects of this Corporation cannot express our thankfulness for his Most gracious care of our traffic and commerce, intended towards us, by the erecting of a Fort for the defence of this town and harbour; nor is it a small earnest of his princely favour towards us, that not only the end which is strength is prescribed, but also the means whereby it may be effected is considered, and your honor, who best knows the estate of this Corporation and dependencies of our commerce, &c., is appointed to report.

Besides that nature hath stamped in every creature a care of its own preservation, so doth also our loyalty unto his Majv. cause in us a most hearty desire that not only this harbour, but all others of his highnes'

kingdoms were fortified to the invincible strength of his Maj. and terror of his enemies, whereunto should never be wanting the estates, and if occasion require, the lives of the ever known loyal inhabitants of this Corporation, &c., and for our own safety, not to speak of anything to the diminution of his Maj. forces, against the building of a Fort, so where an excessive charge with safety and convenience may be spared the town, which if these propositions take place will be utterly ruinated, &c.

Wherefore, if the first proposition in particular whereby it is thought necessary that all customs, duties, and demands now agreed upon by the Corporation to be received for the Key of Youghull, with anchorages, &c., formerly collected, should be laid to for the yearly maintenance of said Fort, that by special priviledges of Charter granted by many Kings of England, and confirmed the keyage of Youghall, &c., hath time out of mind been held by this Corporation in right of said grants. And we are confident that our most royal Sovⁿ. will confirm unto us our priviledges and grants, and chief of them our keyage, &c., there being no example in any maritime port of his Maj⁷⁸. dominions to whom keyage hath been granted, that it hath been taken away upon any occasion, they not having infringed their priviledges.

Furthermore, that the said key was built at the cost and charges of this Corporation, and within this twelve months newly re-edified to our charge, near 500li. ster., and that the revenue and perquisites belonging unto it having paid the arrear it now oweth, will scarce defray the charge of the yearly reparations that the key itself will require, which revenues being otherwise disposed of, the said key must needs be left to ruin and the trade of the town which dependent thereon.

To the proposition propounded, viz., upon every cow, 6d., on every sheep, 1½d., &c., we say that thereby will arise a disproportion of trade betwixt us and the whole kingdom, nay, betwixt us and our neighbouring ports as convenient as ours for outlet of these commodities, that we shall be utterly relinquished and left by all shipping and merchants, by which means our town in short space will be depopulated and utterly ruinated, and the means proposed for maintenance of the Fort, though it were built, would fail, and further, you require us to elect some propositions of our own for the furtherance of so good a work as the fort newly built. We are sorry our poverty affords us no better answer to give you than this, that we can-

not conceive how so great a work should be effected in so poor a place without charge unto his Maj^{ys}. coffers. This much we signify unto your hon¹³, and remain your's humble to be commanded.

The Report of the Pilots and others skilful in the harbour of Youghull.

We, John Griffin, John Hussey, and John fz. Thomas, pilots, belonging to the Town and Harbour of Youghull, required by the Rt. Hon. Lo.—President of Mounster, and the Earle of Corcke, to declare our knowledge in answer to several questions touching the barre of Youghull, do truly certify.

That there are three channels over the barre into the harbour within these two years, but that now by the shifting of sands the eastern channel is quite choked up and made inaccessible for any ships to enter.

The western channel is not for shipping at all, but small boats only take their advantage to enter the harbour upon south-west winds.

The middle channel, which we describe as being only useful for shipping, before you come into it, hath a dangerous rock to seaboard. The breadth in the broadest place of the channel—as near as we can guess, may be one hundred and fifty feet—wherein we are persuaded we speak of the most. The ordinary depth at low water upon a spring tide and fair weather is four feet. At the first quarter flood, the wind being off the shore, seven feet. At half-flood, ten feet; at three-quarters, thirteen feet; at full sea, sixteen feet. But if the wind be from the sea, and blow east, it may rise two or three feet higher, yet by reason of heaving and settling of a ship in stormy weather, the danger of the barre is not a whit the less in such a high tide than in a lower that is smooth.

And this we do aver to be told to our utmost knowledge.

Whereas divers Bye-laws have been enacted for the reformation of the hucksters of this town, yet daily example doth demonstrate that their residence doth much damnify the weale publick of this town by their intolerable forestalling of provision, &c. It is therefore ordered, that there shall be no hucksters tolerated to use their trade within this town, &c., two or three at the most who are first to enter into sufficient bonds for their good behaviour, and whatsoever huckster shall do contrary to this Bye-law shall forfeit 40s. It. Forasmuch as advancing money beforehand to buy corn doth much prejudice this corporation, as well to the great loss of the inhabitants of this town (who afterwards cannot buy corn for their provision at any reasonable price, the same being forstalled by greater purses) as also to the undoing of the poor, who loose their right thereby.

It is therefore by the Mayor, &c., ordered that whosoever shall advance any money, &c., beforehand to the intent to buy corn in the country before the same doth come to market, and then be sold without fraud, shall forfeit 5/2. ster, to be levied by the Mayor. It. That every one that shall dig stones in any quarry within the common land of Y. shall first obtain license from the Mayor, &c., and shall leave said digging place clean and fit to dig in, or forfeit 40s. It. As complaint has been made by the countrymen who bring com into this town, as also by the poor of the Alms-house, that divers kee p false measures for corn, to the great detriment of the poor and this Corporation. It is ordered, that whosoever shall buy or sell corn or grain, with any other measures than those in the custody of the poor of the Alms-house, being sealed with the town mark and paying duty, shall forfeit 5li. as often as they offend. It. That the Market-house shall be reserved for the measuring corn and keeping such sacks as remain unsold coming to the market. It. That the sixpence which was heretofore allowed to the Schoolmaster of Youghal, for teaching to write and read, shall be given to William Freby and George Browne (portion alike), schoolmasters appointed by the Mayor, &c., to teach the puisne children of the town. It. That there shall be a certain number of porters (who shall attend the key, &c.,) and be swom to be true to their merchants, &c., without fraud. Their names to be entered on the town books. The Town Clerk is to administer the oath, and they being sworn to elect a Master who shall rule them, paying 5s. to the corporation, and no other stranger shall be admitted but such as shall be sworn. It. That the porters of the three gates shall be careful in expelling strange beggars and other vagrant persons that used here to resort, to the disturbance of the townsmen; and whatsoever porter shall be remiss shall at the next D. H. be put out of his place. I. H. S. Mem. That, this day Henry Gosnold, Esq., Chief Justice of Mounster, was sworn Recorder of this town, to own said office during his natural life. Et sic finitur hoc curia. Guliel. Gough.

H. concluded, that whatsoever servant of this town shall in future be found faulty, shall be deprived and his mace delivered to another, and that there shall be yearly an election for said servants. Henry Falkland. — A proclamation for the bringing in of Corn to serve the market, and for the punishing of sturdy beggars.

Whereas we are informed, that by reason of the small store of Corn and grain usually brought into the market the price is grown excessive great in all parts of this kingdom, which is conceived to arise not so much out of scarcity of the store itself as out of the ill affection of the Corn Masters, who keeping in their corn do cause a seeming show of dearth, &c., which is not to be endured. These are to charge, that all persons having any wheat, barley, rye, beans, oats, pease, pulse, &c., within their barns, &c., more than will serve their own turns for the provision of their families, that they cause a portion of the residue to be brought to some public market weekly, there to be sold for such prices as the market shall afford. And know ye, that we, reposing special trust in the wisdom, &c., of the Mayor, Samuel Martyne, Perce Meigh, Rich. Gough, Thomas Ronan, and James Reeves have appointed said to be our Commissioners through the County of —, and give them free power to enter all manner of hagarths, ricks, yards, granaries, &c... within said county of ----, to examine what quantity of wheat, rye, beans, barley oats, mastlin, pulst, malte, &c., is in any such hagarth, &c., to make a

reasonable estimate of the number of barrels in the same, likewise what number of persons are depending on every such corn master, what is fit to be allowed for the provision of their houses and families until next harvest, and for the overplus you take present order that a rateable proportion be sent into the next market weekly, or that of some city in the county, as to said commissioners shall be thought fit, and there openly set down until the market bell shall be rung, and requiring all merchants, owners, &c., of any corn, &c., to suffer said commissioners to quietly enter these haggards, &c., and cause those who refuse to be apprehended and committed to the common gaol, without bail, until they shall give way that their corn, &c., shall be viewed, &c., requiring all gaolers, &c., within the liberties of Youghal, to receive and detain the bodies of all such persons as shall be committed unto them. &c.

And whereas vagabonds and beggars have of long time increased in great numbers by idleness, the mother and root of all vices, whereby daily ensueth continual thefts, murders, &c. These therefore require all Justices of the peace, &c. of every city, &c. within the said county of ---- to make diligent search of all aged or poor persons compelled to live by alms, in every household, city, &c., and to authorize them to beg within such city, &c., and not without the limits appointed, to register the names of such impotent beggars by them appointed, in a roll indented, one part to remain with themselves, the other to be certified before the Justices of the peace at the next sessions; and said Justices to have power to make so many seals to be engraved with the names of the city, &c., within which they shall limit such impotent person to beg, such to have a letter sealed with such of the seals as shall be engraved with the names of the limits within which they shall be appointed to beg, to be subscribed with the names of said Justices, &c., and if any do beg in any other place, said Justices, &c., shall punish such according to statute 33 Hen. VIII.

Henry Falkland. — Forasmuch as we cannot but take notice of the late intermission of legal proceedings against popish pretended or titularie Archbishops, Bishops, Abbots, Deans, Vicars-General, Jesuits, Friars, and others of that sort, that derive their pretended authority, and others, from the See of Rome, hath bred such an extraordinary insolence and presumption in them, as that they have dared here of late, not only to assemble themselves in public places to celebrate their superstitious services in all parts of this Kingdom, but also have erected houses and buildings, called public Oratories, Colledges, Massehouses, and Convents of Friars, Monks and Nuns, in the eye and open view of the state, and elswhere, and do frequently exercise jurisdiction against his Majestie's subjects, by authority derived from the See of Rome, and by colour of teaching and keeping schools in their pretended monasteries and colledges, do train up the youth of this kingdom in their superstitious religion, to the great derogation and contempt of his Majys. regal power and authority and great offence of many of his Majys. good subjects, contrary to the laws and Ecclesiastical Government of this Kingdom, and the impoverishment of his Majys. subjects. These are to require, &c., that all manner of such pretended titular Archbishops, &c., deriving power from the See of Rome, that they forbear to exercise such in this Kingdom, and that all such Abbots, Priors, &c. do forthwith break up their convents, &c. where they assemble together, and that all the orders before named, &c., forbear to preach, teach, or celebrate their services in any church, chapel, or within this kingdom. And we command all owners of such houses of Friars, &c., to expel all such Friars, &c., and convert the same to more lawful uses, on pain of having said houses seized to his Majys. use, and both proceeded against, for their unlawful assemblies and corrupt nurture of children, in the severest manner the laws may be extended, &c. That John Bassett, chandler, shall use his trade without trouble from any chandler there resident. It. That no chandler shall buy any tallow in this town but such as shall serve for owne trade to be made into candles and sold to those of the Corporation, neither shall they ingress any tallow or trie the same for any foreigner, or make use of any foreigners stock under colour of their freedom, &c., or forfeit 3li. It. That no man shall heap up in ricks or stakes any furz, brush faggots, &c., on the Key of Youghal, or forfeit 40s. &c. Et sic finitur, Curia del D. H. Michæl Forest, Dep. Towne Clerk.

Mem. That 24 April, 1629, Domk. Forest was admitted an Attorney of and in the Tholsell and Court of Record of Youghal.

Whereas there hath late fallen out an interruption between the King's Maj. and the most Christian King, which the ancient allies of both crowns have earnestly laboured to repair, &c. The king considering how pleasing it is to Almighty God to have concord, &c., hath renewed the ancient amity betwixt the two crowns, their realms, &c., and subjects by land, sea, and freshwater. And that said Kings, and their subjects shall live in peace, &c., and exercise their trades and commerce in each other's countries, as in former time, &c. And further, in regard there are many ships at sea with letters of marque, which cannot so soon take knowledge of this peace, &c., that whatsoever shall be done during two months after 17 April last shall not hinder said peace, and what hath been taken within aforesaid time shall be restored as well on the one side as the other, &c. 10 May, 1629. That every inhabitant, before Mich. next, provide sufficient weapons to keep in his house, or forfeit 10s. It. That no hucksters shall be admitted within this town, except four within the gates, two out of the South gate, and one out of the North gate, who are to buy no manner of huckstry ware in the market until after four of the clock in the afternoon, nor to forestal the market in any way, &c., or forfeit 5s., &c. It. That in regard the river and harbour of this town is very much pestered with stakes, blocke wreakes, which may be an impediment to the herring fishing and looseing of nets; whatsoever six or seven of the mariners of this town shall take up and land all such stakes, blocks, &c., shall have out of every boat, as well of the town as strangers that come to the fishing 2s. per boat or barque, or if they can take up any boat or lighter there sunk, the owner is to give them satisfaction as they shall agree. It. That Richard Streete, baker, is by the Mayor, &c., licensed to make full use of his trade within this town without molestation of the bakers there resident. It.



That Catherin Wailsh, ats. Roch, widow, relic of James W., be allowed for herself and children 40s. yearly. It. That Mr. Nich. Gallwan, Ald., and Mr. Richd. Gough, Ald., are appointed to view the park of the Chantry lands in the occupation of Teig O Deyner, broguemaker, and what they shall praise same to be worth yearly, to be passed for same to Mr. Edw. Gough, Ald. It. That Joane Nogle, ats. Gerald, is admitted in forma pauperis, to sue Michæl Bluett for what rent he holdeth from her due out of a shop and sellar. It. That Margt. Shoas, widow, be admitted to have the first place that falleth in the alms-house, same being now full of poor.

12 July, 1629. III., for avoiding deceit in buying and selling corn, it was enacted, that there should be only one measure of corn and grain throughout the whole kingdom of England, which being found to be reasonable was confirmed by divers Acts of Parliament, and also by special statute, yet through the greedy desires of crafty people, &c. it falls out that there is scarcely to be found the same measure in two several towns, by reason of the mixed use of English and Irish measure and the unequal proportions of either of them; there is buying of corn, &c. by one measure in one place and selling by another in another place,

to the impoverishing of the simpler sort of people, which abuse tends to the great displeasure of God, who hath laid a curse on such abuses. It is ordered, &c., that no person within the limits of Munster shall after the feast of John the Baptist, presume to buy or sell any kind of corn or grain by any other measure than that called the Bristoll B. Barrell, Bushell, half bushell, peck, half peck, after the rate of 32 gallons to every barrel, the same being stricked, &c., forbearing hereafter to use any of the Irish. measures called sives, pecks, skippets, &c., under pain of imprisonment, fine, and forfeiture, &c.; and that all Mayors, Clerks of Markets, &c., shall take a view of the corn measures now in use within the province, and finding them otherwise than is hereby required, to take present order for reforming same either by altering same to the proportions of said Bristow bond, bushel, peck, &c., or breaking or burning them, and also put upon every measure one general mark, and their owners deprived of any pretence of ignorance, &c., being at any time questioned, whereof the magistrates are to render an account before the Lo.-President, &c. C. of England, how intolerably the excessive multitude of Irish beggars incumber that kingdom, for remedy whereof, &c., present order is taken not only for their severe punishment there, but present transporting back again into this kingdom; and whereas, in this province of Munster the number of beggars and vagabonds, by means of extreme idleness and wilful neglecting of trades and husbandry is so infinitely increased, that the more industrious people are no longer able either to relieve their wants or endure their stealths, which intolerable mischief hath happened partly through thre great neglect of magistrates and officers of said Province in not conveying them home to their several parishes, to be there relieved by those that are best acquainted with their several qualities, partly through the indiscretion of those that have been overforward in granting passes to such beggars and vagabonds as had no cause to travel, and partly through the greed of divers masters and owners of ships, barques, &c. For remedy, &c., the Lo.-President, &c., do straightly charge, first, that all high and petty constables within the province of Munster shall not hereafter suffer any wandering vagabonds to abide within their several limits, &c., but take them and punish them by whipping, and carry them to the next constable in their way homewards towards the next parish where they last dwelt, till by degrees they be brought home to be settled in some honest course of life, otherwise relieved by the parish; next, that the Mayors, &c., shall have a special care of said inferior officers to enforce them to discharge their duties, or inform the Lo.-President, &c., who shall inflict on them such punishment as shall seem reasonable. Next, that no magistrate, &c., shall presume to grant any pass, &c., to any person, either of going up or down to beg in this kingdom, or of travelling for that purpose into England; and lastly, that no master or owner of any ship or barque shall dare to take any on board for the purpose above, under pain of imprisonment; also, requiring all H. M. officers in the several ports of this province to be exceeding careful in the execution of this last branch, &c.

Whereas the mechanical tradesmen of this town and liberties are daily occupied—leaving their trades—to buy all manner of wool, floxx, cloth, linnen, and woollen, by intercepting the parties in blind ways and holes as they are coming to the market, whereby the market cannot be supplied, and also going to fairs and buying the like, and to sell the same unto foreigners within this town, to the great prejudice of merchants and freemen; to prevent the great harm, &c., it is concluded, &c., that henceforth no mechanical tradesman not free of this town shall sell any wool, floxx, or cloth within this town, &c., to any person but to freemen, on pain of forfeiting such wool, &c.

8 Oct. It. That as the pentices and stales standing in the King's Street are a great nuisance, &c., every person having such so standing in the street shall take the same down before All Saints next, otherwise the Mayor to break them down at his pleasure. It. The grand jury to bring in their presentments at or before All Saints next, or be fined by the Mayor, &c. It. That no man of what quality soever shall buy any victuals, corn, or ware, upon any Market-day before the market bell shall toll at 9 in the forenoon, and that no huckster shall buy such wares, &c.—with intent to sell same—until after 2 of the clock in the afternoon, or forfeit 20s., to be levied by the Mayor, &c. It. As the excessive number of hucksters in this town by their daily regrating the market and buying by the great do sell same at excessive rates, against the rules of good government, &c., it is

agreed to reduce the number, viz., three hucksters within the town, two out of the South gate, and one out of the North Gate, to be nominated by the Mayor, and no other, on pain of 10s., to be levied by the Mayor, &c. It. That Jasper Wailsh shall be Master of the Porters of the Key for shipping of Cattle and Wool, &c., either aboard or from aboard, and they shall be obedient unto him and sufficient to discharge their places.

By the King.

Whereas it is found meet, &c., upon weighty considerations moved to His Majr., by the intervention of some of his friends to lay aside hostility with the King of Spain, and so remove by peaceable means the cause of war, which bred interruption to the amity betwixt the two Crowns, to make known, &c., that peace, &c., being so established, not only all hostility and war is to cease on both sides, but the former trade, &c., as it stood in the use, &c. of the treaty made by H. Adam Lostus, Rich. Corke.—Whereas upon the earnest desire of many of H. Majr. subjects in England, grounded upon the dearth of grain there, and the opinion of plenty here, The Lords of H. Majrs. P. C. had given direction for warrants to be made for importing of corn into England, which warrants their Lops. thought fit to suspend upon such advertisements as they then had received from us, whereunto we were induced out of an apprehension of the ill-effects of your former times of scarcity and dearth, which again fall upon if the store of this year should be exhausted, &c., nevertheless a license lately granted by their Lops. for ten thousand quarters of corn to be exported from hence for the relief of the City of London, H. Majr., &c. do esteem to be grounded upon necessary considerations, regard of the want wherewith the capital city of his kingdom and usual place of his abode is pinched, and those evil consequences of sickness and infection

which accompany dearth and famine. H. Majy. thought fit to confirm the licence, with direction unto us to hasten the performance hereof, resolving not to give a warrant for further exportation of any corne from hence upon any pretence; and whereas the price of corn is grown excessive great in all parts of this kingdom, which is conceived to arise from the evil affections of the Corn Masters, and partly by the engrossers of corn, who keeping their corn in great quantities do cause a seeming show of dearth, far more than in truth it is, thereby to enhance the price of all manner of grain at their pleasure; and as H. Majr. hath required us in making that provision for the City of London, so to order the price of corn as it may prove a relief to said City in this time of their necessity. These are to require all manner of persons having within their barns, rickyards, haggards, granaries, sellers, &c., more than will serve their own turns for the maintenance of their own families, that they cause the overplus to be brought to some convenient market to be sold for such price as like corn was sold about 13 Jan. last, &c., and for better observance, know ye that we, placing special trust in the persons nominated in the schedule annexed, have appointed them to be commissioners for the several cities, counties, and towns of the kingdom as expressed, and give them power to enter into all manner of haggards, &c., and search, &c. what quantity may be in any such, and make a reasonable estimate of the quantity of barrels that may be in them. what number of persons are depending on such commaster, what is to be allowed for the provision of their houses until next corn harvest, the overplus to be sent to the next market weekly, or city, or corporate town, to be set down in open market without any forestalling, until the market bell be rung, requiring all commasters, &c., that they allow said commissioners to enter their haggards, &c., for estimating the corn in same, &c., and if any refuse they cause them to be apprehended and committed to the common gaol. And we command all persons not to presume to export any corn, grain, meal, flour, baked or otherwise—except for provision of sea out of this kingdom, at their peril, also requiring all officers of the different ports and creeks, &c., to take special care that no corn, &c. be put on board any ship, &c., other than bread for their reasonable provision, &c.

Whereas the King out of his care, &c., for the general quiet of his loving subjects, and conceiving there is no stronger motive to unite them or make them opulent and rich, than by securing their estates, &c., and finding that many petitioners resort from this kingdom into England for securing them by new particular patents, and that there are daily suitors in England to his Majv. for grants of lands in this realm, upon pretence of concealments or defective titles, for obtain-

ing which the suitors offer large considerations by way of fine and increase of rent, and other services to the Crown, to his Majys. great advantage, and of those, persons have of late obtained letters under the privy signet, to pass part of the premises by letters patents under the great seal of this realm of Ireland in fee. His Majy seeing how full of trouble it might be to his subjects to give way to such private suits, &c., although some profit should accrue thereout unto his crown, it hath pleased him not only to make stay of passing the premises, and all other lands within this realm, and of all suites of that nature, &c., but also secure their several pretended estates by a commission of grace under the great seal of England, and that if any of his subjects of this realm of Ireland do fear their estates to be subject to His Majys. just law or equity, they before last of Nov. next are either in person or by their attorneys to repair into England, where they shall find His Majys. Commissioners ready to entertain their several suites, &c., who shall settle their estates, &c., and on such gracious conditions as the commissioners shall think fit, &c., and His Majy, will give his royal assent, as well to confirm the same at the next Parliament, as also the statute 21 Jac., for limiting his highnes title to 60 years, shall be then enacted, same to extend only for the benefit of the Patentees. His Majy. doth further declare, that he will take his just advantage against all persons as shall neglect by the time prefixed to repair into England and compound for passing their lands, and upon neglect, His Majy. resolves to disposethereof for his best profit, either to such as shall be suitors or otherwise at his pleasure, and that until said last of Nov. next, and as long as said commission shall be continued in England for this service, no person shall presume to make suit to his highnes for grants of estates of any lands, or pass any of the premises but upon said commission. Adam Loftus, Canc., R. Corke. Whereas the King's Most Excellent Majs, in the sixth article of his instructions sent hither by the Agents, did declare, that as it appeared that the grant for licensing the selling of ale and beer hath ne ground of law, that the grant should be resumed into his hands, and all proceedings should cease until next parliament, and that in the parliament such course be laid down wherein his Highness' profit in the subsidies may be advanced, observing, that in the course now held, many mischiefs do arise from the excessive number of alehouses, from the erection of them in woods, bogs, and other unfit places, and many of them not in townships, but dispersedly and in dangerous places, and kept by unknown persons, not undertaken for, whereby they become receptacles of rebels and other malefactors, and harbours for gamesters and other idle, disordered, and unprofitable livers, not fitted to lodge travellers in any decent manner. His Majy. minding the redress, &c., resolved to reduce these Alehouses to lesser numbers, more fit persons and convenient places, and according to certain directions from the lords of the P. C. by letters dated 9 June last, and an Act of Council made at this board conforme thereunto.

We the Lords Justices, &c., do charge as followeth: That no manner of person shall keep any alehouse in this kingdom, but such as shall be licenced according to this proclamation, by persons authorized. It is therefore ordered, &c., that commissioners shall be awarded under his Majys great Seal unto every county of this kingdom, and to be nominated by the Lords Justices, &c., with the consent of the council, and to be chosen of the Justices of the Peace, &c., the Custos Rotulorum of every county to be one, who shall consider the number fit to be allowed for keeping of Alehouses, as the places where they shall be licensed to keep same, which commissioners shall assemble at the quarter Sessions next after Easter yearly, and there make choice of such persons as well for their good behaviour as for conveniencies of houses, furniture, and dwelling, able to entertain travellers dwelling in Market towns, villages, road ways, and towns wherein are parish churches, and not in bogs, or woods, or other unfit places, to license such persons to keep houses for one year to enter into recognizances of 10li., &c., the condition to be that the party licensed

shall observe the assize of bread, ale, and beer, and shall sell same for travellers, &c., at reasonable rates, and utter no unwholesome bread, &c., and keep two beds at the least well furnished for lodging strangers, nor to use or suffer any drunkenness or common diceing, carding, or other unlawful games, to keep good order in their houses, nor harbour suspected persons or any of the neighbours' servants or strangers, unless in way of sickness, &c., above 24 hours, &c., each alehouse keeper to pay His Majy. 38, 6d, into the hands of a collector appointed for that purpose, &c., to return such to the Exchequer; and if any collector conceal the names of any persons so licensed, or any money received, he shall suffer by fine, imprisonment, &c., as the Justices, &c., shall think fit. And we command that no person after this Proclamation shall presume to keep an ale house, &c., without license, &c., or he shall suffer such punishment as the Lords Justices, &c., shall think fit. Provided always, &c., that such persons as shall sell ale or beer only in places where the general assizes or quarter sessions shall be kept, or at fairs, without further license, shall not be impeached, and that every Collector shall have 6d out of every license, and every one so licensed shall have some sign, Stake, or Bush at his door, to give notice to travellers where they may receive meat, drink, or lodging for their reasonable money. And further, that any person offending against this proclamation shall forfeit his recognizance, and be proceeded against in his Maj. Court of Exchequer, &c. Given at H. Majys. A Proclamation upon the New Book of rates.

Whereas for the better answering of the customs of our late Sovn., &c., in the Kingdom of Ireland, and for the ease of the merchants, there was a commission in the eleventh year of his reign for rating and valueing goods, &c., brought in and carried out of this kingdom, by virtue whereof certain goods, &c., were rated, &c.; and whereas divers goods fit to pay custom were omitted out of the first book of rates, did by his letters given at Westminster, 31 Dec., 20 year of his reign, declare that said goods so omitted, had been rated, &c. And whereas his Majy. by letters patents, dated 10 March, 7 of his reign, did for his heirs, &c., appoint that there should be levied and taken to the use of his heirs, &c., the like, and great sums of money, after the same rates for and in respect of all wines, goods, wares, and merchandizes in said book of rates imprinted 1624, brought in and carried out of this realm, according to the values thereof-excepting living cattle, hides, wools, linen yarn commonly called Irish yarn, tallow, herrings, butter, pilchers, salt, ruggs called setts, and wines-upon which excepted goods, to be carried forth of this realm and brought into the same, it is expressed in said letters patents, that his Majys. pleasure is to lay such addition of payment, as together with the sums of money by said last book of rates, to be paid for same, shall in the whole amount to the several sums hereafter mentioned, viz.: 2s. for every live beast, 4d. for every stone of wool containing 8lbs.; 20s. for every pack of linen yarn, called Irish yarn, containing 400lbs, at six-score to the hundred; 18d. for every hundred of tallow containing 112lbs.; 2s. for every barrel of butter; 12d. for every barrel of herrings; 6s. for every tun of pilchers; 12s. for every score of ruggs called setts-containing 20 in number; for every hide to be transported into England, Scotland, &c., 6d.; and 12d. for every hide to be transported into any foreign kingdom under his Majys. obedience. And for wines of the growth of Spain, and other wines of the parts of the Levant, commonly called sweet wines to be brought into this kingdom of Ireland, or any of the ports, havens, islands, or any other parts thereof, at any time or times. [Unfinished.]

Whereas the Mayor, &c., considering the manifold prejudice that doth befal the town, &c., by permitting the retailing of Bristow and English Beer and Ale within their jurisdictions, insomuch the great plenty of corn, which God out of his abundant favour hath bestowed on this kingdom, this year; that there is little of any ale or beer brewed within said town, how good or strong soever it be, nor any use made of the malt made by the inhabitants, it being the means of the greatest number, and for which some of them have engaged their estates and others bound themselves in good sums of money, which they are not able to satisfy by reason of the great fall of corn, and the rather said malt lying upon their hands unsold, being a commodoty subject to manifold danger and corruption, and all this in tolerating the victuallers, &c., to sell English and Bristowe beer and ale in that daily abundance, when better beer—conceit being removed—is daily here brewed in the towne. For reformation of future grievance, &c., the Mayor, &c., have agreed in this D. H. by virtue of H. Maj. letters patents, and holden 3 Aug., 1632, that whatsoever freeman, &c., within this town &c., from henceforth shall presume to sell by retail any Bristow or English beer in any place within this towne, shall forfeit 10s, for every barrel so retailed, and so rateably for every smaller vessel, to be recovered by distress, &c., and that no one may pretend ignorance, the Mayor, &c., have caused an authentic copy to be affixed in imminent places.

It. As the public revenues of this Corporation are now exhausted, as well in repairing the town walls as in suits of law in defence of their customs, yet, notwithstanding the Mayor, &c., hath lately required to erect a platform at the Key head, at their own costs, it being correspond [sic] to a former promise made unto his Maj. Therefore it is ordered, that every freeman, &c., shall contribute towards digging and drawing stones towards the erection of said platform, &c.

In manner following, viz., the richer sort to contribute towards both labourers and horses, in drawing stones, &c., the meaner sort to find labourers only towards the drawing and digging of the stones, to be taxed equally, according to the tallage book, to be assessed by the overseers undernamed, and whosoever shall refuse the overseers shall forfeit double the value levied, &c.

It. Thomas Bluett, a native of this town, and an Ald. being fallen to extreme necessity, being aged and impotent, and lately for same reasons made porter of the South Gate, shall enjoy the Castle late in the possession of John Fine, during the pleasure of the Corporation. It. Ellin-ny-Eny, widow, being a decrepid old woman, is admitted into the Alms-house of this town during life.

After our very hearty commendations, &c. Whereas His Majy. by his letters of 27th of June last, hath signified unto us, that His Maj. Attorney-General in England hath commenced suite in the Exchequer against Sir Saml Smith, Knt., concerning the licenses for the sale of wine, and the making and selling Aqua Vitæ and Usquebaugh within this kingdom; and whereas in said letters he hath taken notice that his Atty. General had formerly exhibited a Bill in the Exchequer here against said Sir Sam! Smith concerning same, and that Sir Saml being advertized hereof, departed into England, to avoid the answering of it, and to gain time, &c., before the ordinary course of trial convict him, which is intended by the Attorney, with all expedition. And to the end that said Sir Samuell may take no benefit to the prejudice of the Rt. Hon. our very good Lord the Earle of Carlile-who is interested herein-by delay of the ordinary proceedings of law, His Majy. hath required of us to cause the possession thereof to be delivered to such assigns of the said Earl of Carlile as he should appoint, upon sufficient guarantee (?) by him to be given, that the profits thereof shall be clearly answered to the said Sir Samuel, or so much as upon the ending of the suit shall be decreed of right to belong to said Sir Samuel, and that we should give order for all rents, &c., due from the commencement of the patent past to said Earl, to be paid by said assigns, &c. These are to publish throughout that county, that it is our commandment that all persons, by whom moneys are due concerning said license at any time since Lady-day last, do forbear payment to said Sir Sam! Smith, &c., and that he pay said moneys to Sr Mathew Derenzie, Kt., the assignee on behalf of the province of Munster, and appointed by the Earl of Carlile. And lastly, that all who claim any interest under said Sir Sam! Smith, or of the assignees of Sr George St. Pollam, Sr Henry Yelverton, in any the said licenses, do presently after Mich. next repair hither, bringing the deeds, bonds, articles of agreement, &c., passed between them, and at the same time bring the rents, &c., due by them for said licenses, &c. Adam Loftus, Canc., R. Corcke.—Whereas the King, &c., did by his late proclamation, 20 June, 7th year, give notice to such of his subjects as did fear their estates to be subject to his Maj⁵⁵. just advantage in law, that they should repair into England in person, or by their attornies, before 30 Nov. last, where they, with his Maj⁵⁵. Commissioners, should be received upon commission of grace to make settlement of their estates which were defective or doubtful, for a reasonable composition, and what should be passed his Maj⁵⁵. would give his royal assent, as well to confirm same at the next parliament, as that the statute 21 Jac., for limiting his highnes' title for threescore years should be then enacted for the benefit only of the patentees that should pass without prejudicing any such future plantations as should be found just, &c. For the better exportation of those that were to resort into England to compound for their defective estates, which were to be imparted unto all such as should repair unto us for that purpose. And as most of those who have lately gone into England to

compound were not prepared to give information, &c., in making their compositions, nor could without great expense and travail prepare these informations, so as they had not such ease and expedition as was desired. And albeit many have neglected the partaking his Majys grace, &c., for passing their lands on said commission. Nevertheless his Majy. now by his second proclamation, &c., doth require them to take notice that for their more ease before 10 Nov. next, they may repair to the City of Dublin, either in person, &c., to settle their estates, &c., and if they neglect, his Majy. declares he will take his just advantage against them, and he will dispose of their lands, &c., for his best profit to those who shall be suitors for same, &c.

Forasmuch as there hath been several great complaints made, as well by the townsmen as other strangers and passengers repairing to this town, and perceiving the uncivil, disordered, and dangerous custom of the butchers of this town in slaughtering cows and other beasts within the gates of this town—the like being inhibited in other places, cities, and towns of good government, some complaining that themselves and their children were often like to be killed by reason of the sudden assaults of mad cows ranging up and down the streets in furious manner, pursued by barking dogs and blood-sucking curs, some alleadging that by means of driving the said cows through the streets of this town, the same would never be kept clean, and all in general exclaiming that the effusion of blood and the quantity of stinking excrements, that usually cometh from such slaughtered beasts, was like being putrified to engender contagious sickness, &c., for the taking away of which manifold abuses and preventing sickness, by consent of the Mayor, &c., and by virtue of his Maj. letters patents, it is ordered that whatsoever butcher shall kill or slaughter any beefe, cow, steer or ox, within the walls of this town, shall forfeit 40s., &c. And that said butchers may procure slaughter houses without the gates and pretend no ignorance, the said Mayor, &c., have sent for the Master and Company of said butchers, and declared unto them in open Court the effect of this bye-law, and caused an authentic copy to be fixed on the Market Cross, &c-It. That from henceforward no cowes, &c., shall be sould or have any standing-place of sale within the gates of this town; and whoseever of the porters of the town shall let in such cows through the gates and not drive them out, but suffer them to stand in the streets, shall forfeit his office, &c.

A Proclamation for the current passing of good farthing token.

Wentworth.-Whereas divers complaints have been made unto us, the Lord Deputy, from several parts of this kingdom, concerning the stop and refusal of farthing tokens, proceeding as well from the abuse in counterfitting the same, as in causing the same to pass in payments, either for commodoties or for wages to workmen and labourers, in greater quantities than was intended, which abuses are become a great burden and grievance to his Majys. people in many parts of the realm, for reformation whereof and that said farthing token may be used only for exchange in small sums, but not to be put in great payments. These are to declare, &c., that it is contrary to his Maj. letters patents, &c., that any such farthing tokens should be forced upon poor labourers or workmen, and in any payment either of great or less sums, and that no person should pay above two pence in farthings to any other person at any one time, and that it is unlawful for any man to buy or barter for any farthings at or for any lesser rate than they are usually rented to his Maj. patentees, to whom the sole making is granted and upon whom their change lieth. All persons hereby to take notice that when they shall bring to Edward Lake, agent for said patentee, who is resident in the City of Dublin, any sum of lawful farthings, said Lake will pay like sum in silver, and if any person shall forge, &c., said farthings, tokens, or shall cause such to be brought into this kingdom, or make payment of such knowing same to be counterfeit. Such persons so offending shall receive such censure by loss of ears or other corporal punishment as by the Court of Castle Chamber shall be thought meet. And further, we command all Mayors, &c., to apprehend any person whom they shall suppose to be such conspirators, and seize on such counterfeit farthings and engines or instruments for the making or forging the same, and them to break in pieces and utterly deface, and to bring such before some of his Majys. justices of the peace, &c., who are to commit such to the next shire gaol, there to remain until they put in security to answer said offences in the Castle Chamber, and from time to time monthly to return to H. Maj. Attorney General, with the names of such as continue in prison for want of securities to appear in the Castle Chamber. Given at His Majys. Castle of Dublin, 16 Sep., 1634.

Proclamation concerning Gun powder and munition.

Wentworth.—Whereas for prevention of such disorders and rebellions as in this realm might grow by loose and disloyal people having means to

arm themselves to do mischief against his Majesty, divers proclamations have been published by several Lords Deputies, &c., commanding that no master or owner of any ship, &c., nor any merchant, &c., should bring into this kingdom—without license from the Lords of the Council of England or Lord Deputy—any quantity of gun powder, &c., upon the penalties mentioned, wherein also is provided that such persons as had any gun-Powder, &c., should bring same into his Majs. stores of ordnance, and also that some have presumed daily to bring into this kingdom great quantities of powder, &c., from foreign parts, and to make sale thereof to all sorts of People, so as many loose kearnes and idle persons of lewd behaviour being armed with powder, do not only make havoc of red and fallow deer and other game, within the proper grounds of noblemen, &c., but also are emboldened to commit divers and insolent riots, burglaries, robberies, &c., and of any times to run into open rebellion, &c., do declare that no master, &c., of any ship, &c., shall bring into this kingdom, or make within the same, without special licence from the Lords of the Council in England or Lo. Deputy, any quantity of gunpowder, or sell, buy, &c., any gun powder npon pain not only of forfeiture of said powder, but also incurring his indicate only of forfeiture of said powder, but also incurring his Majs indignation with such punishment by fine, imprisonment, &c., as that if any nobleman, &c., or any may be inflicted, &c. Provided always that if any nobleman, &c., or any berson of good, &c. Provided always that if any nobleman, &c., or any Person of good behaviour of any city, &c., or master of any barque, &c., going to sea shall have occasion to use any reasonable quantity of gun powder, that snall Powder, that such Person, &c., shall by warrant of the Lo. Deputy be supplied, &c., provided Person, &c., shall incur any contempt for having plied, &c., provided that no person shall incur any contempt for having any gun powder that no person shall incur any shall before 1 July any gun powder contrary to this proclamation, that shall before 1 July next bring same in the same in next bring same into any of his Majs. stores of ordnance, or that upon certificate by him man any of his Majs. stores of the ordnance, shall from the Lo. tificate by him made any of his Majs. stores of ordinance, of the Lo. A Proclamation concerning Linnen Cloath.

Whereas it is found by experience that the narrowness of the breadth of the linnen cloaths now made in this kingdom, is the only reason they are not vendible in other kingdoms, whence it cometh to pass that the makers thereof raise not that profit thereby, which otherwise they might do, those who would transport it and raise good benefit thereby in other kingdoms, forbearing to adventure on that commodity, by reason that they find the narrowness of the breadth to hinder the sale thereof abroad, we therefore in our desires to advance the profit of the makers, and encourage the merchants to export that native commodity, as well for their own benefit as that of the kingdom, and for increase of his Majys, revenues, do declare that all weavers of linnen yarn shall after the feast of St. Michæl next weave, &c., all their linnen in breadth three quarters of a yard or more, unless such as shall be woven in chequer work for towels or napkins, and if it be found after 1 Feb. next, that any of said linnen cloath shall want said breadth, it shall be lawful for any person to apprehend such in whose custody same shall be found, and convey him to the next Justice of the Peace, who is hereby required to examine said party, and discover, if he can, the maker, weaver, owner, seller, or buyer, of said cloath, and on discovery of their names to commit such to the shire gaol, there to remain till they put in security, to be taken by bond, to appear, if it be in any county in Leinster, at his Majs. court of Castle Chamber, and if in any of the provinces of Munster or Connaught, to appear before the Lord Pres. of the province, and if in Ulster, then to appear before such commission under his Maj. great seal, to determine causes of that nature, and not depart without license, and his Majys. Att. Gen., if it be in Leinster, and his Majys. Atty. of any of the other provinces, within which the case may happen is required to proceed against them by information in the Court whereof they shall have appeared, and that it may be lawful for any person to apprehend any weaver that after the feast of St. Michæl shall make any linnen cloath of narrower breadth than as mentioned, and after 1 Feb, next it shall be

lawful for any person to apprehend any that shall sell linnen cloath of any narrower breadth than herein mentioned, and convey such persons to one of the next Justices of the Peace, whom we require to commit to the shire gaol until they put in security, &c., and we command all Mayors, &c., to be assisting. And as it is observed that there is great deceit used by Gray merchants and others that use Ban-laws and Slatt and divers other uncertain measures, buying said linnen cloath and other cloath to the deceit of the subject, we strictly charge the clerks of the market to do their duties in enquiring after that abuse, and that all men buy and sell by the just ell and yard and by no other measure.

The copy of the Lord Pres. and Earl of Cork's way about the erection of a fort at Yougha

We have received his Majys. commands date directing us to consider a proposition made by Fr

Capt. Will. Steward, for erecting a fort at Youghull, and signifying that we should view the town and fittest place for building a fort, and make an estimate of the charge it will amount unto, and what ward may be put into it; and lastly, how the whole charge may be borne without charging his Majre revenue. And in regard we perceived his Maj. warrant had Passed through your hands, we made choice of you humbly to present unto his Majy, an account of our proceedings and opinions herein. First, we have made a personal and exact view of the town and harbour, and do find thereabout many places for the raising of a fort-royal, but no fit place to raise any small fort upon that may command the town and harbour, but such as are overtopped and may be looked into by high hills, except one only place, the foundation whereof must be laid upon deep and sliding sands, and in regard the harbour is so well strengthened and defended by nature, who hath secured the town with a barre not above five foot deep in the channel at the low water, and that the barre doth often shift and remove, thereby making the channel dangerous and uncertain to strangers. And in respect the said Francis Steward's proposition is in part to the deduction and taking away of those Petty Customs, duties of Keyage, and priviledges which your Majys, late father, by free charters granted to the Corporation of Youghal, for the maintenance of their walls, keys and other public works, where it is necessarily expended, and that the rest of his proposition, if it should proceed, would be an addition of charge upon merchandises exported and imported, above the rates and customs of other maratime towns as near and commodious as that is. The Maior and townsmen consisting most of English, find cause to foresee in the decay of their trade, and consequently their own impoverishment, when their town and harbour by this increase of charge, will be neglected and abandoned, neither do we find any means to raise the moneys to be necessarily expended for such a work, nor any necessity for the waste of so much treasure as the building and maintaining such a fort there will require, seeing the place may be as well secured by as safe and a more frugal way. To which purpose we have made this use of his Majys. letters and command, And have so far wrought and prevailed with the Maior and Corporation, as they are willing to build a battery opposite to the harbour's mouth upon the foundation of a ruinated fort or block-house, which will command the whole harbour, and to keep and maintain the same at their own charge, &c., as by the enclosed overture

A Proclamation declaring certain moneys coined in the Kingdom of Ireland, to be current in this Kingdom. Whereas the Lords Justices and Council of Ireland did publish in our name a proclamation the tenor whereof ensueth.

Jo. Borlace, Hen. Tichborne. — We, the Lords Justices, having received His Maj⁷⁵, letters 25 May, 1643, the tenor whereof is, &c.:

Charles R. Right trusty, &c., that by reason of this most barbarous and bloody rebellion in Ireland, our good subjects are reduced to that extreme penury, that now-as their last help and refuge-they are enforced and desirous to have such little plate as they have left them to be coined for their relief, into some small pieces of money, that might pass current in exchange both here and in England. And that the quantity of plate or bullion there so to be melted down and coined is of so small value, that it is not worth the charge of erecting a mint there, according our former intentions, which would take up more time than their present and pressing necessities will permit. We are pleased for the relief of our good subjects there to authorize you to issue forth one or more commissions under our great seal unto such as you shall think fit, to melt down such plate, coin, bullion, or silver as shall be brought unto them into small pieces to the value of five shillings, half-crowns, twelve-pences, and six-pences, or of any less value, of same weight, value and alloy as our money now current in England, and stamp the same on the one side with these letters, C. R. for Carolus Rex, with a crown over these letters, and on the other side with the values of the said pieces respectively, and the same so made and stamped to re-deliver to the bringers of the plate, &c., and that you appoint such allowance unto the persons for coining said pieces as you shall think convenient, and take good security for their true melting, making, and delivery of same in weight, value, and alloy, as good as our money, &c. I pray your Lop. to negociate this effectually with the townsmen, and to obtain their consent for the billetting of the soldiers until the latter end of Easter week, by which time I shall be able to supply the soldiers out of such moneys as I have a fair possibility to acquire at Limericke, whither I am now going on that occasion. I cannot but be confident that this treaty of yours will be successful, when they understand how advantageous to his Majy. to keep together for a few days so many men, which otherwise will be in danger of disbanding, or to leave ordnance there and nobody to defend or man them if occasion offered. The Presentment of the Grand Jury at the Court and year aforesaid, and also what acts and statutes public good of this incorporation, they in their ju confirmed at this Court, being the first after the inhabitants, the consideration and confirmation who by the consent of the foresaid Mayor and Ball assistants:

- 1. We think that the Statute made in Anno 150 —freemen excepted—to sell or retail any goods, & liberties, upon pain of forfeiture, the moietie to the use of the Incorporation.
- 2. We think fit that all freemen upon election d peace, gaol delivery, and all courts of D. H. shoupon the sword and wait upon the Mayor, &c. order, &c., in their gowns or cloaks, or in default is
- 3. We present that if any freeman hereafter s goods, contrary to his oath, he be disfranchised : of the Mayor.

4. That the Court of D. H. should be kept at certain days, as formerly; that same be kept yearly so often and at such times as occasion may require, or as the Mayor shall hold fitting, or as same be directed by the council, for reformation of abuses, &c.

5. That according to ancient custom, all gifts, grants, leases, &c., from the Corporation are not to pass without the Common Seal thereto affixed, either in public Court of D. H., or in a solemn meeting of the Mayor, &c.

6. That if any Alderman, Burgess, or Freeman shall privately confer with any merchant foreigners for buying any merchandizes, &c., without license from the Mayor, he shall forfeit 40s. and suffer imprisonment and utterly loose the benefit of his bargain, &c., according the ancient custom.

7. That if any Ballive being Justice of the Peace, and gaol delivery, and Judges in the Courts of Record held in this town, by virtue of divers ancient charters, shall omit the civil order here formerly used in sitting in the execution of his office, in either the said Courts, without his gown, for every default shall forfeit 2s. 6d. to be levied and paid to the poor, as the Mayor shall dispose.

8. We present, that if any Burgess shall be elected Mayor by plurality of Freemen, shall refuse to take said office, &c., that he shall bring into the Court 10 Li. a fine for his refusal.

Then the eligees shall get forthwith to a new nomination, and the Town Clerk call over the panel, and so elect another. But if the Court shall refuse to accept said fine, then, notwithstanding the foresaid tender, the said eligee must serve in said office for next year, according to ancient custom.

Right Hon!.—Upon receipt of your Lordship's letter I called together the Ballives, &c., of this Corporation, and imparted unto them the contents thereof, and urged all I could the great necessity of their compliance to your Lordship's proposition, and found in them a willing readiness to consent thereunto, but their abilities so weakened, as they alleadge, by reason of their former disbursements and loans towards support of the army, and the extreme present scarcity of corn and excessive prices thereof, and of all other victual, that they are not able with competent means to support themselves and their families. Tyrconnell.—Whereas we find it requisite for his Maties. service, That the forces he is obliged to maintain for the preservation of the peace of this his Kingdom, be kept in good order and discipline, And that his subjects may not suffer by any disorder or misbehaviour of any officer or soldier within his pay or entertainment, We have thought fit hereby to declare his Maties, will and pleasure. That in what place soever any of his forces within this kingdom shall pass or remain, they shall duly pay their quarters at the usual and agreed rates, and shall not upon any pretence whatsoever refuse or avoid the same. And, to the end, that all disputes upon this account may be avoided. We did command all officers in their respective quarters strictly to charge and publish that the soldiers do not exceed their ordinary weekly allowance, and that no innkeeper, sutler or other person, presume to give them credit for more; and that if any shall transgress herein, we shall not hold our soldiers obliged to see them satisfied. And we do likewise strictly forbid all officers and soldiers to use any violence or reviling language or threatening words to any person whatsoever, or to give any other offence or just cause of complaint. And in case any of the said officers or soldiers shall presume to commit any spoil or disorder, or use any violence, threatning or reviling words, or otherwise misbehave themselves, We do hereby require all his Maties, loving subjects forthwith to make known the same to their superior officers, who are to cause satisfaction to be same to their superior officers, and if such officers faction to be made immediately to the person injured. And if such officers to whom complaint is made shall forbear or delay the causing due satisfaction to be surroug is done faction to be given as aforesaid, the persons to whom the wrong is done are then to present their complaint to us, that we may order speedy

justice to be done them, by reparation of the in officers or soldiers so offending to be forthwith capunishments to be inflicted on them as the natoffence shall deserve. And we do further deck soldiers in their march as well as in their quarter they have, and shall not demand or exact money if any shall dare to do the contrary, they shall hand loss of their pay. It being his Maties, roys that all officers and soldiers in his service, behall things.

And whereas, we are given to understand the Army do frequently absent themselves from the do hereby strictly charge and require all officers within ten days, there to reside, and take care if soldiers under their command do their respectively in the discipline of war, as in their sober towards the rest of their fellow subjects, His M. Whereas, the Town of Youghall had formerly a considerable Corn trade, that many merchants made opulent fortunes by; but that by the death, &c., of many merchants, with the neglect of the Magistry for some years past, and want of regulations, said Corn trade has been insensibly stole away to Dungarvan, where every encouragement to the exportation has been given; and their schemes so far prevailed, that two years ago there was paid at this Custom House 6 or 800li, by virtue of an Act of Parliament for the increase of tillage by the exportation of Corn, tho' our merchants had at the same time commissions offered them by several merchants in this Kingdom, England, and Scotland, but could not venture to buy a single barrel for exportation, as they and their shipping were opposed by wanton mobs, and the magistrates not exerting their power for suppressing such risings, for which reason the Dungarvan merchants, we may rather call them hucksters, availed themselves of our confusion, and sent their agents to our very Gates to buy corn, and had it conveyed from hence over the ferrys of Temple Michael, Dromore, &c., and shipped it at Dungarvan,

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which will be of greater utility than if we distributed 100li. per annum amongst them, as it will keep the price of provisions down.

Recorder's Opinion.—"I suppose the Law under which Mr. Rogers would protect the corn from the Corporation toll or duty is the Act of last session for the encouragement of Tillage, which directs the Collector of the Port to pay premiums on the exportation of corn, without taking any custom fee or reward for such corn; but I apprehend the word custom in that Act means only the duty payable to his Majv. before the making of the Law, which the officer of the Port ought to have required; but the Toll payable to the Corporation is collected by their own officer, and not by the officer of the Port, who is the person to pay the premiums. Therefore I am of opinion that the right of the Corporation to Tolls or Dutys is not affected by that Law. I could not answer your first question, whether Justices of the Peace for co. Cork are restrained by any of the Charters granted the Corporation of Y. from acting as Justices of the Peace within the Liberties of that Town, in matters cognizable by the Charter Justices without reading the Charter of James I., which recites the former Charters. The first paper I read after the rising of the Court of Chancery was that Charter, and my opinion is that the Justices of the co. Cork are excluded from exercising within the liberties of Y. any jurisdiction which the Charter Justices are impowered to exercise. But by some Acts of Parliament jurisdictions are given to Co. Justices, which were not meant to be exercised by Charter Justices. I think the proper way to restrain the Co. Justices from intruding upon the franchises of the Corporation, will be to apply for a Quo Warranto, or bring an action in the name of the Corporation against the

FROM THE MS. LETTER BOOK OF LORD BROGHILL, GOV. OF YOUGHALL, 1644-49. BRITISH MUSEUM, ADD. 25287.

To the Lo.-Lieut. In obedience to the last part of your Lord-Cork, Aug. 12, ship's letter, we have removed out of the City of Cork and Town of Youghal all the Irish, as we conceive ourselves able to master, and in the Town of Kinsale have caused hostages to be taken. In the City of Cork, we suffered every man to carry forth his goods, plate, money, and household stuff, such provision of corn and victual as were necessary to support the army, only excepted.

In Youghal we caused the goods of such persons, as were removed, to be restored, albeit they were warned to depart suddenly without their goods for

quicker expedition.

What conditions your Lop. shall insist on the behalf of H. Maj. ve subjects we shall not prejudicate, but what the adverse party publickly boast to have obtained, we are not ignorant. Excepting that the use of the churches, as Mr. Richard fitz-Gerald of Rostellan, who was conversant with the agents in England, did confidently affirm unto me, adding that though they had not a grant of those, yet they would have them or nothing. The charity of those pious people of Amsterdam came to this town, in a season, when our necessities did much rise the value of the gift, for truly when it came, we were reduced to that extremity, that I could not propound any possible way of subsistence for ten days. But our cause is so just, that we could not dispair, neither could we desire a relief from any that could bring us a more real contentment than from the Hollanders. For besides the satisfaction of having another nation, so sensible of our wrongs and miseries, as to send us their relief,

their discontentment is little inferior to our joy.

All the return that the poor Protestants of this place can make, is their prayers and thanks, which I must confess is too small a payment for so great a debt, but I hope the reality and heartiness with which this is rendered, will make you value it something the higher, and yet our poverty makes your piety the more perfect, for to favour, where you can hope for no return is true charity. I shall earnestly desire you to represent to these godly people that have relieved us, how thankfully they are received, as also that they shall be punctually distributed, as

it has so much perplexed and dis-animated the Irish Rebels, that the greatness of

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
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
